KPA sets aside Sh2.1b for new Shimoni Fishing Port

Kenya Ports Authority Board Chairman Benjamin Tayari says the construction of the long-awaited Shimoni Fishing Port Project was part of the efforts by Government to promote fisheries in the coastal region.

Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) has set aside Sh2.1 billion for the construction of the Shimoni Fishing Port Project in Kwale County.

The construction of the port is expected to have a positive impact on trade and economic

growth through large-scale exploitation of the fish industry bolstered by a ready market and value addition which will spur the creation of special economic zones.

KPA Board Chairman Benjamin Tayari said the construction of the long-awaited Shimoni Fishing Port Project was part of the efforts by Government to promote

fisheries in the coastal region.

Tayari said so far Sh2.5 billion has been set aside for the industrial fishing port adding that more funds will be injected in the project as time goes by.

He revealed that basic infrastructure development of this new modern fishing port will

KTDA to produce value added orthodox tea for increased revenue

The Kenya Tea Development Agency (KTDA) has launched a programme to support the processing of orthodox tea in all its allied factories countrywide.

The KTDA Chairperson David Ichoho said they will install orthodox tea (pictured) processing machines in thirteen factories in vari-

ous places in the country.

Addressing tea directors in Murang'a, Ichoho noted that the national government has pledged to give Sh800 million to assist in the procurement of the processing machines.

"The money will help us procure eight machines while the agency will buy another five to make a total



of thirteen.

"The machines will help process orthodox tea which has high demand in the international markets and will eventually enable farmers to get more returns," the chairperson said.

Ichoho noted that various varieties of orthodox tea, which include green, white

be financed using KPA resources entirely.

Mr Tayari said Kenya does not have a dedicated fishing port and that the Shimoni Port, which will have a market hall, cannery, storage facility and a wastewater treatment facility, will be the first in the country.

The KPA Boss said they are investing huge sums of money in port development infrastructure that will boost fishery activities in the Indian Ocean and attract more investors in the value production chain.

Tayari noted that the initial funds will be used for Phase I of the civil-related infrastructure works including buildings, pavement works, roads and storm water construction of

the fishing harbor.

Speaking when he paid a courtesy call on Kwale Governor Fatuma Achani, Tayari indicated that the strategic project which is a top priority will spur growth of the blue economy sector.

He said the new fishing harbour will not only act as a growth engine of the coastal region's economy but also boost the livelihoods of thousands of fisherfolk.

“We thank President William Ruto who has given us

priority to fast track construction of Shimoni Port. We already have a contractor on site and we want to ensure the project is undertaken within the set time frame,” said Tayari.

He said the construction of a fishing port facility including piers, integrated cold storage and ice block machines will enable local fisherfolk to use the well-equipped fishing port thus increasing the value-added marine products.

During the visit, Governor Achani handed over the title deed for Shimoni Port to the KPA Board Chairman.

She committed to ensure the successful development of the Shimoni Fishing Port spearheaded by KPA, which is expected to be completed within a period of 24 months.

“As a county we are ready to give all the required support to fast track construction of the Shimoni Port,” she said.

and black tea have a high demand and that KTDA has sourced for a market that requires over two million kilograms annually against a local production of about 500,000 kilos.

Currently, KTDA factories produce a tea variety commonly known as Cutting, Tearing and Curling (CTC) that generates less income as compared to orthodox tea.

“Our plan is to increase our production of orthodox tea because the demand is high and some factories have already procured the machines using their own resources,” Ichoho said.

He noted that over 95 per cent of the locally produced tea is exported while only five per cent is consumed locally which, he said, exposes the produce to global market fluctuations.

He cited as examples, the political instability

experienced in countries such as Pakistan and Iran which are some of the biggest consumers of Kenyan tea.

The official further observed that KTDA is eyeing to tap a wider market in the African continent.

In 2021, Kenya was ranked third among the largest tea producers globally after China and Sri Lanka.

“If we are able to open tariff and non-tariff barriers and approach individual countries diplomatically, we will be able to expand our market,” he said.

The Chairperson however decried poor tea production which was attributed to drought experienced in the country since last year.

For the last six months Ichoho said the country produced 542,000 kilos of green leaf as compared to 605,000 kilos that were produced between January and June 2022.

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Nutrition commodities included in Essential Medicines List 2019

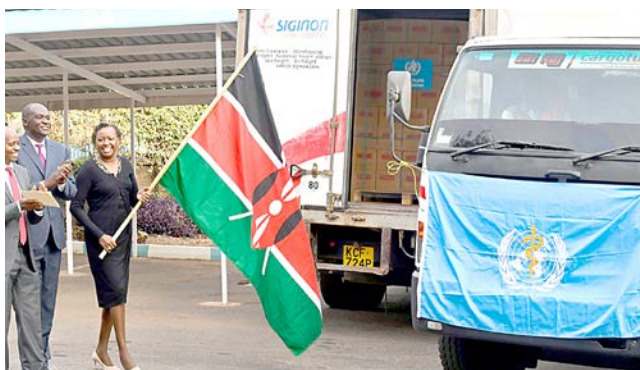

The Ministry of Health has included nutrition commodities in the Kenya Essential Medical List 2019 which will enable KEMSA procure and stock them and facilitate easy access by county governments.

The inclusion of these is part of the Government's efforts to recognize the importance of lifesaving commodities for Kenyans in pursuit of Universal Health Care (UHC).

The Ministry has also initiated discussions with the National Treasury on sustainable measures for its strategic programmes which are currently funded by development partners.

The announcement was made by the Principal Secretary (PS), State Department for Public Health and Professional Standards, Dr. Josephine Mburu when she received 5000 cartons of Ready to Use Therapeutic

tic Foods (RTUF) worth Sh 26,389,440 from the World Health Organization (WHO).

The donation, which is enough to treat 10,000 children aged 6 to 59 months with severe malnutrition, will go a long way in complementing the government's ongoing drought response efforts in food insecure areas.

Dr. Mburu noted that adequate nutrition is ideal for

proper growth and development.

"Nutrition is especially important for child health as it plays a crucial role in growth and development and to ensure optimum child health, it is important for children to consume a balanced diet that includes a variety of nutrient-dense foods", said the PS.

The PS commended the WHO for the gesture and re-affirmed the govern-

ment's commitment in tackling acute malnutrition especially in the 23 counties currently affected by the on-going drought.

Dr. Mburu disclosed that over the past decade, Kenya has made significant progress in reducing the prevalence of malnutrition among children under five years of age. "In the recently released KENYA Demographic Health Survey, stunting reduced from 26 per cent in 2014 to 18 per cent in 2022, underweight from 11 per cent in 2014 to 10 per cent only, wasting showed marginal

increase from 4 per cent to 5 per cent over the same period due to the prolonged drought situation." she noted. According to the survey, nearly 1.13 million children under 5 were stunted; 315,066 were wasted and 630,132 were underweight in 2022.

The PS added that counties in the Arid and Semi-Arid areas are disproportionately affected by high levels of acute malnutrition often as a result of cyclical droughts that affect food security and livelihoods of the communities. "The Inte-

grated Phase Classification for Acute Malnutrition (IPC AMN) analysis conducted in July 2022 shows the nutrition situation has deteriorated compared to the same season last year with Turkana North, Turkana South and Laisamis slipping into an extremely critical phase where more than 30 per cent of children are acutely malnourished. This translates to about 884,464 children aged 6 to 59 months and 115,725 pregnant or lactating women who require treatment for acute malnutrition," she noted.

Government to commercialize its robust ICT infrastructure, says PS

The government will soon start creating value from its ICT infrastructure by fully commercializing it and allowing other government services and the private sector to benefit from the same.

The Principal Secretary for ICT and the Digital Economy, Eng. John Tanui (Pictured), said the department is focused on promoting the growth of the ICT sector in the country, ensure the protection of personal data in compliance with global standards and to guarantee the digitization of government services.

He was speaking during a live interview with a national television station.

The PS said the process of digitizing government services was underway and that the ICT Ministry has reached

out to all state departments to understand the service they offer to enable the Ministry know how to automate all their functions.

“We are now building our capacity to be able to know how many records and services can be digitalized and automated within the shortest time possible.

“We also want to give opportunities for more players to come and help in digitizing the government. The journey is long but we aim to digitize all citizen-facing services in six months,” said the PS.

The State Department has confirmed taking stock of all Government ICT assets, systems and applications that will identify the existing gaps and areas that require interventions and has already developed a report-



ing survey tool to collect the data.

PS Tanui noted that Kenya, and Africa by extension, missed out of the three industrial revolutions that marked the transition of economies but noted that with the ongoing fourth industrial revolution, that is marked with the convergence of technologies and a digital space that defines the future of work, Kenya will take full advantage of the opportunities presented for its youth.

“The plan of the govern-

ment to set up an additional 100,000 kilometers of fiber in the country is to ensure that global opportunities can be accessed from anywhere in the country. Our youthful population can gain employment through IT Enabled Services (ITES) where they can work for a company in another continent. We look forward to not only be consumers of technology, but participate in the development of applications,” said Ps Tanui.

Verified information from the State Department of ICT and the Digital Economy indicates that the government plans to rollout universal broadband countrywide in five years by implementing 100,000 km of fibre with 52,000km facilitated by the government and 48,000km by the private sector.

Multi-billion gravity fed project in Tana River to be ready in April

The Bura Irrigation and Settlement Scheme Rehabilitation Project which will convert the Bura Irrigation Scheme from a pumped system to a gravity-fed system will be complete by April this year.

To achieve the completion timelines, the National Irrigation Authority (NIA) has placed the Sh7 billion Food Security Project, which has

taken 10 years since its inception, under the 100 days Rapid Result Initiative (RRI).

The NIA Chief Operations Officer Joel Tanui revealed that the contractor is at 90 per cent in terms of work done in the system, assuring that in the next three months the project will be complete.

"It is one of the programmes that we have put under RRI. We have been able to address the chal-

lenges that the projects had in terms of contractual arrangements with the contractor who is on-site. We have agreed that by April the contractor should be able to hand over the project so that it can benefit the Bura Irrigation farmers," said Tanui

Speaking during a field visit to Tana Irrigation Scheme, Tanui said the project involves the rehabilitation of irrigation works, provision of equipment, ex-

tension, and credit to allow reliable irrigation of an extra 15,000 acres. The area under irrigation will increase to 25,000 acres from the current 12,000 acres.

The gravity project will ensure the availability of irrigation water by abstraction of 11 cubic meters per second of irrigation water throughout the year as opposed to the current 2.7 cubic meters per second through pumping.

KFCB to review licence fees to attract youth into creative arts

Film regulator, Kenya Film Classification Board (KFCB) is reviewing all the applicable licence fees across all market segments of the film sector in order to encourage young people to venture into the creative economy.

Wambua who was speaking during the Covid-19 and Digital Employability Graduation Ceremony at the AFRALTI Centre in Nairobi said the framework is in tandem with the Ministry of Information, Communication and the Digital Economy's strategic objective of ensuring creatives earn from the talent, dubbed 'Talanta Hela'.

ECD centers in Samburu County receive food

Nakuru County adopts new technologies to curb water wastage

BY ESTHER MWANGI AND CHARLOTH CHEPKEMOI (KNA)

The County Government of Nakuru has invested in new technologies including new modern pipelines and advanced metering (Smart meters) to reduce non-revenue water generated from its three Water Service Providers (WSPs).

This is aimed at reducing

water wastage and enhance the economic sustainability and viability of water utilities in the County. Non-Revenue Water (NRW) refers to water lost through illegal connections, inefficient or rundown supply infrastructure and malfunctioning meters. Water Services and Regulatory Board (WASREB) defines levels of Non-Revenue Water of under 20 percent as good, 20-25 as

acceptable and over 25 percent as not acceptable.

County Executive in charge of Water, Environment, Energy, Natural Resources and Climate Change, Dr Nelson Maara regretted that the country was losing about 430,000 cubic metres of water, equivalent to Sh12.2 billion, per year due to unnecessary wastages and said the County government intended to reduce the

Non-Revenue water levels from an average of 54 percent to 20 percent which will help fix inefficiencies in water supply systems and save a huge portion of public finance.

Dr. Maara said a Non-

Cubic metres of water country loses per year

Revenue Water (NRW) audit revealed that the three Water Service Providers lose more than half of their treated drinking water to leaks, theft and meter inaccuracies, resulting in monthly losses of over Sh 40 million and resulting to scarcity of the commodity.

He however said plans were underway to rehabilitate and upgrade old wastewater treatment, water

supply and sewerage systems managed by the three water providers including Nakuru Water and Sanitation Services Company Ltd (Nawassco), Nakuru Rural Water and Sanitation Company Limited (Naruwasco) and Naivasha Water, Sewerage and Sanitation Company Ltd (Naivawasco), a move he said, was aimed at ensuring safe and adequate water supply.

Migori farmers turn to soil management experts as harvests decline over time

Farmers in Migori County are turning to soil management to increase their crop harvests that have been declining fast in consecutive seasons.

They have embraced crop rotation techniques to maintain soil fertility in their farms.

“Year in and year out, we have ploughed the same land like our forefathers. Farmers have also used the same fertilisers and pesticides on the same land for years with the end result being tired soils,” said a farmer, Mr. Charles Mwita from Ntimaru, Kuria East Sub-County.

He cited decreasing soil quality as a major cause for decreased land productivity within the county. For instance, in 1977, an acre of land in the region would produce over 60 bags of maize, he said.

“The soils were very productive then. But the same cannot be said today as the same acre now yields below 20 bags,” he explained.

His sentiments were echoed by Mr. Pius Onyango, a farmer, and chairman of Ulunja Farmers Group in West Kanyamkago Location in Uriri Sub-County.

“We have been planting and top-dressing fertilisers and herbicides for a long time. This has exerted stress on the soils,” he said.

But with the help of experts, they are turning their fortunes around. Mr. Thomas Owiti, an agricultural expert who retired from the civil service recently said years of cultivating the same crops on the same land had resulted in poor soils and low yields.

“Farmers have tilled the same crops on the same land for years with the end result being tired soils,” he said, adding that it is time that they took a paradigm shift and start rotating different crops on their farms to save soil fertility and get good yields.

Rising inflation, he explained, has triggered a serious spike in the costs of fertiliser, land leasing, fuel, labour, pesticide and subsequently eroding earnings of local farmers drastically, a situation that has made it difficult for the farmers to secure food security.

Pursuant to her statutory mandate under section 72 of the Water Act 2016, WASREB sets, monitors and reviews rules and regulations to ensure water services provision is affordable, efficient, effective and equitable.

- submit vendors health certificates - vendors handling the water should be regularly checked for any communicable disease by public health units to ensure no pathogenic contamination takes place,
- file annual reports according to a reporting format approved by the Water Services Provider.

This notice applies to the following categories of water vending systems:

- Water kiosks
- Water tankers
- Hand or donkey drawn carts
- Water points (shallow wells and springs)
- Private boreholes

This public notice is issued by WASREB:

- To ensure uniformity of standards in the provision of rights, as envisaged by Articles 21 and 191 of the Constitution of Kenya 2010
- In the interest of ensuring that water service standards are adhered to in terms of quality, cost and customer service
- To safeguard the health and safety of consumers.

State, World Bank to launch projects geared towards boosting incomes of fishermen

The Government in partnership with the World Bank and the International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) will establish projects designed to improve and increase the incomes of poor households involved in the aquaculture sector.

This policy resonates with a commitment made by the government to provide cooling storage systems, transform Beach Management Units (BMUs) into SACCOs and Cooperatives and construction of landing sites to ease fishermen’s management and access funding from financial in-

stitutions. Speaking during a consultative meeting between the Blue Economy Committee of the Council of Governors and Development Partners in the sector held at a Mombasa hotel,

“We want to ensure the resources we are receiving are utilized to achieve the socio-economic wellbeing of the citizens” -Otuoma

Busia Governor Dr. Paul Otuoma said the meeting’s goal is to align the sector’s objectives to ensure teamwork towards achieving value addition in the blue economy sector.

“We are working together to ensure the resources we are receiving are utilized to achieve the socio-economic wellbeing of the citizens as far as the blue economy is concerned,” Dr. Otuoma said. The governor noted that the sector is focusing on two major initiatives to be implemented with support from development partners such as, the Kenya Marine Fisheries and Socio-Economic Development

(KEMFSED) Project and Aquaculture Business Development Programme (ABDP).

KEMFSED is a Government of Kenya and World Bank-funded project whose objective is to improve the management of priority fisheries and mariculture and increase access to complementary livelihood activities in coastal com-

munities. This development target is intended at tapping on massive resources in the Blue Space and contributing to the development of the sector.

Cabinet Secretary for Mining, Blue Economy and Maritime Affairs, Salim Mvurya, pledged to officially launch cooling storage containers for the BMUs

along the coastal counties. “We have programmes in aquaculture that integrate research and implementation; Kabonyo Kanyagual will be implemented by the Government of Kenya in collaboration with the Government of Hungary which will provide 7 million fingerlings to the counties participating in aquaculture activities,” said Mvurya.

The CS said marine fisheries can create at least 60,000 direct jobs and 180,000 indirect jobs in the next five years. In order to achieve this, more investments in fishing, value addition and mariculture is required, he said.

The chairman of the Blue Economy Committee at the CoG, who is also the Lamu County governor Issa Timamy promised that they shall eradicate the stereotypical culture of fishermen living a hand to mouth life and make their lives better.

Nakuru County, tech firm in deal to turn Giotto trash into revenue earner

BY ANNE MWALE (KNA)

Nakuru County will soon revolutionise its waste management system if the Government approves Giotto Dumpsite—a planned waste-to-energy plant that will transform the gargantuan eyesore.

For 50 years, the Giotto dumpsite has been the only landfill in Nakuru and as the town population increases, the site, which has become part of the urban landscape, sprawling over 30-acres will assist manage the city's waste.

The plant, whose construction is due to begin once a proposal submitted to the Government through the Ministry of Energy is approved will incinerate 3,000 tons of waste every day – roughly 60 per cent of the city's garbage, while supplying Nakuru with 15 per cent of its household electricity needs and meeting international standards on air emissions.

According to an official report by the National Environmental Complaints Committee, an average of

45 per cent of waste goes uncollected in Nakuru.

The report states that Nakuru City generates an estimated 6,000 tonnes of waste daily. However, only 3,962 tonnes are collected while over 2,000 tonnes remain uncollected.

It also states that 85 per cent of waste generated in urban centres in Nakuru is domestic.

According to County Environment, Energy, Natural Resources and Climate

Change Chief Officer Kennedy Barasa, the devolved unit's administration will make available the land within or around Giotto dumpsite, while KEW Technology, a United Kingdom-based sustainable energy solutions company will fi-

nance, develop, and operate the power plant.

"KEW Technology did a study back in 2016 with support from the UK-AID on waste analysis in Nakuru County which led to the discovery that the amount of waste generated has high value content which could generate valuable landfill gases and steam.

"With the sustained increase in waste production in Nakuru, the firm seeks to establish material treat-

ment centres that will not only promote the production of clean energy but also boost our county's economy as waste is a public hazard," the Chief Officer noted.

Mr Barasa indicated that over the years, KEW Technology has developed a unique technology that tackles climate change by efficiently converting all types of non-recyclable resources and low-grade biomass into a wide range of sustainable energy vectors such as hydrogen, power, heat and advanced fuels for a zero-carbon future.

"Our partnership with KEW Technology is just one component of Nakuru County's broader strategy to address pollution and embrace renewable energy across all sectors of the economy. We hope that this will serve as a model for other counties in the region," he added.

The implementation of the project is however subject to the approval of a feasibility study which will take at least six months to prepare.

The study will set out both the viability and cost of the project, among other issues.

In the waste-to-energy incineration plants, rubbish is burned in a combustion chamber. The resulting heat is used to boil water until it

turns to steam, which drives a turbine generator that produces electricity.

In cities where land is in short supply, "waste-to-energy" incineration is a quadruple win: it saves precious space, generates electricity, prevents the release of toxic chemicals into groundwater, and reduces the release of methane – a potent greenhouse gas generated in landfills into the atmosphere.

Incinerating waste to generate energy is popular in Europe, where nearly one quarter of all municipal solid garbage is used for "waste-to-energy" purposes. France alone boasts of 126 waste-to-energy plants, while Germany has 121 and Italy 40.

Mr Barasa indicated that once the "waste-to-energy" power plant is complete, it will operate within the strict emission limits of the European Union and that it will adopt a modern back-end flue gas treatment technology to drastically reduce the release of heavy metals and dioxins produced from the burning.

The plant is expected to sustainably solve Nakuru's garbage problem and at the same time create a new income stream for the County Government.

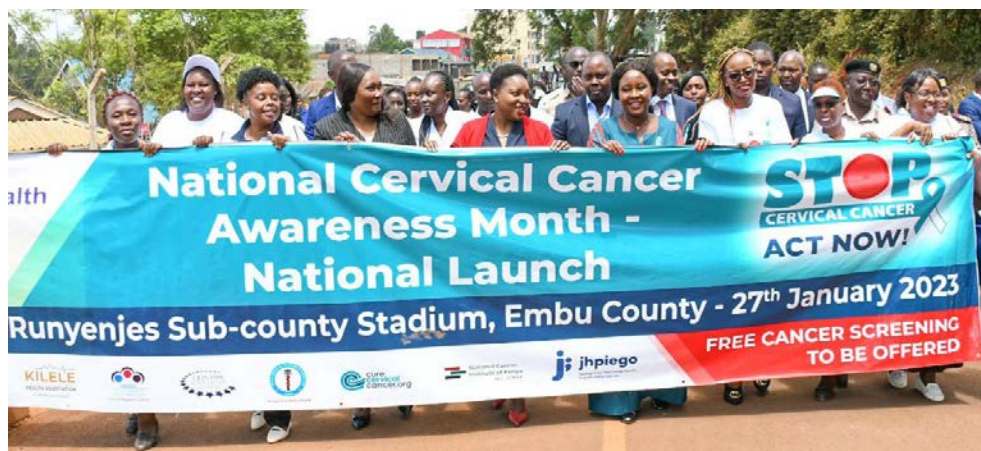
"It is gratifying to note that Mitunguu Technical Training Institute, which has today released 937 graduands to the job market, offers diverse aca-

Cancer ranks second in Non-Communicable Diseases table in Kenya

Cancer still remains the second leading Non-Communicable Disease (NCD) in Kenya after cardiovascular diseases with 42,000 new cases recorded every year as per World Health Organization (WHO) statistics.

Health Cabinet Secretary Susan Nakhumicha said 27,000 cancer related deaths are also recorded every year with leading cancers being breast, cervical, prostate, esophageal and colorectal.

She said most of these cancers can be prevented through screening and early diagnosis which was not the case as the majority of patients seek medical attention in late stages when it is difficult and expensive to treat.

Speaking during the launch of National Cervical Cancer Awareness Month in Runyenjes Stadium in Embu, the CS said the narrative could be changed if all Kenyans adopted good health-seeking behaviour including going for regular medical checkups.

She noted that the government had acquired all the necessary tools to fight the disease with cervical

cancer being the first one marked for elimination.

The CS noted that Human Papillomavirus (HPV) was the main cause of cervical cancer with its infection causing up to 99 percent of all cervical cancer cases.

She, however, said there was a ray of hope in preventing the spread of cervical cancer as it takes 10-15 years for the changes in the cervix caused by HPV to develop into cancer.

"This gives us an opportunity to screen and treat to prevent the disease," she said, noting that the vaccine targeting HPV infections was available that was safe and effective.

She said the vaccine was available free of charge in all facilities providing routine immunization for children across the country.

"We are working towards vaccination of 90 percent of girls from the ages of 10-14 years, screening of 70 percent women between 35-49 years and providing treatment and care for 90 percent of women identified with cervical cancer," the CS said.

In collaboration with Clinton Health Access Initi-

ative, She said that the Ministry has distributed over 800 thermal ablations for treatment of pre-cervical cancerous lesions to health facilities across the country.

CS Nakhumicha also said for the first time the Ministry had introduced HPV-DNA testing in 27 county referral hospitals which was the recommended standard method for cervical screening.

She said the government will continue empowering Community Health Workers (CHWs) on cancer using the training materials developed to educate communities and mobilize them for screening and HPV vaccination.

The CS reported that as the government seeks to transform NHIF to a social insurance, it will look into the packages so that screening, diagnosis and treatment for cervical cancer was well covered for all Kenyans.

Embu Governor Cecily Mbarire said since the launch awareness month early this month, they had managed to screen only 1,797 women which she said was a small number compared to the population of women in the county.

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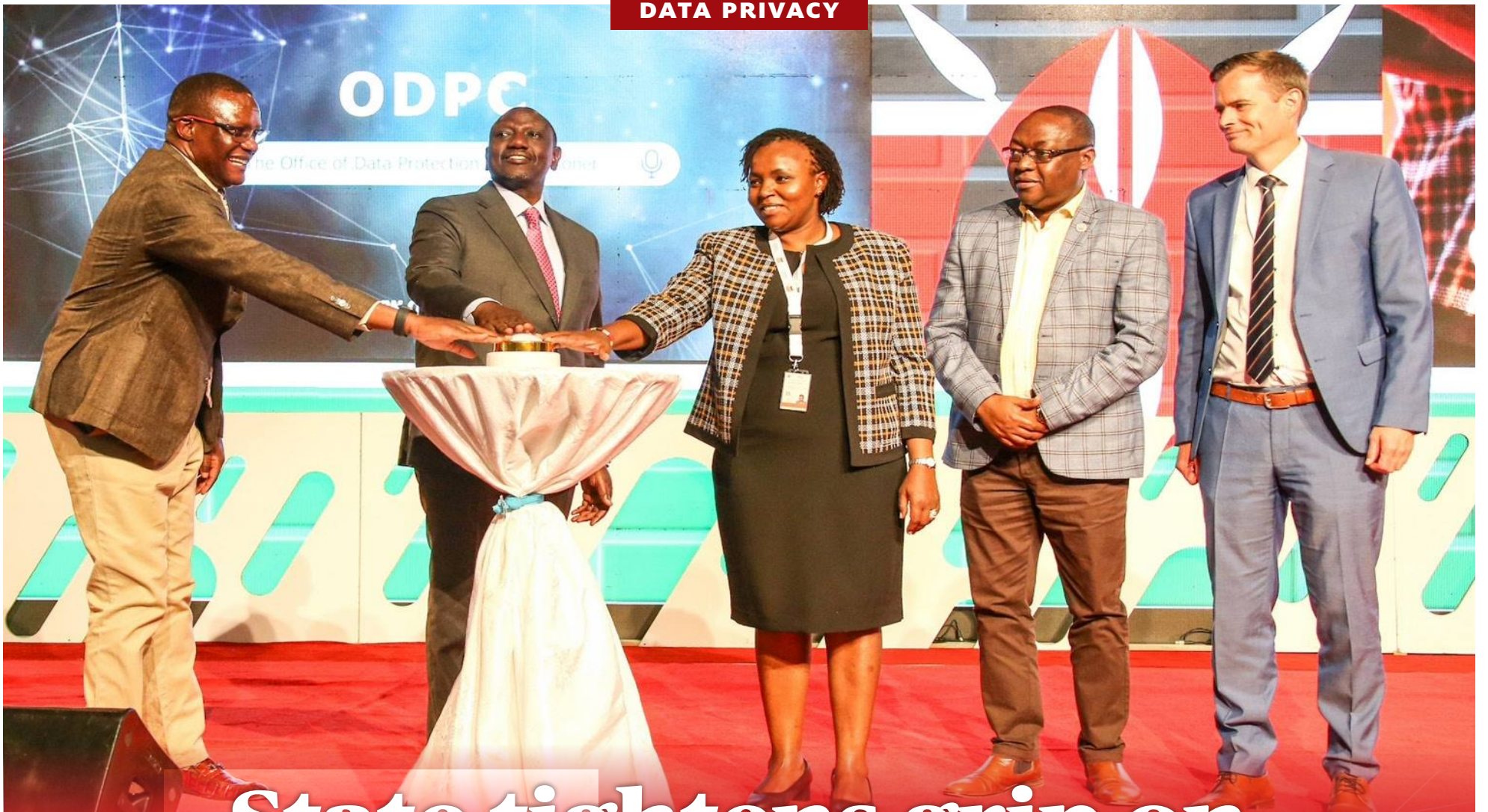

Government pushes to protect data as digital economy thrives

You must have logged onto a website and it asks you to accept cookies, and you gladly do so?

Or visited that government agency website at a cybercafé and filled a form online to get the service you dearly need?

Well, every day when getting into an institution or a gated community, you usually leave your Identity Card without thinking much about it.

And did you forward that information about someone that came through WhatsApp to your friends?

This is the reality of our lives today, as we readily leave our personal data at various places be it digitally or in the physical world.

And as data becomes the new currency, concerns over protection and privacy are rising amid low levels of awareness on the risks of giving out such information or the

importance of safeguarding it once collected.

These concerns are not only coming from the private sector but also from ordinary citizens and the government, which has developed laws to enhance data protection and privacy.

“As a country, we are at a critical time where we are generating plenty of data from everything we do and there are many risks if we don’t protect it,” said Ms Immaculate Kassait, the Data Commissioner, at the first data protection conference held in Nairobi last week.

During the two-day event, President William Ruto launched the data protection registration system as the government tightened control on data privacy.

He said at least 1,700 data processors and handlers had been registered and certified by the system and thousands others are expected to be enrolled.

According to Ms Kassait, data protection

and privacy are crucial to the country’s economic growth. Safeguarding data collected, she added, has become an urgency for Kenya, as most transactions move online and the digital economy flourishes.

“We must uphold a good culture on data protection and ensure the ecosystem is secure to boost economic growth,” she said.

The responsibility of data protection, she observed, falls on data processors and controllers, data subjects and the government.

Data subjects are you and me - the people being asked to provide our details to access services, institutions or information.

Data processors and controllers, on the other hand, are the people asking for the information and using it. These are institutions like hospitals, schools, banks and government agencies as well as websites.

Ms Kassait noted that the law provides that all data collectors must have systems that protect

INFOBOX



The Data Protection Act 2019

- This is an Act of Parliament that established the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner (ODPC).
- It makes provision for the regulation of the processing of personal data.
- It provide for the rights of data subjects and obligations of data controllers and processors.
- According to the Act, it is illegal to collect, process or disclose a data subject’s information without their permission.

The ODPC has come up with three regulations to enhance its work. These are:

- a) The Data Protection (General) Regulations.
- b) Registration of Data Controllers and Data Processors Regulations.
- c) Complaints Handling and Enforcement Procedures Regulations.

the information collected to avoid breaches. On the other hand, the government’s has the overall responsibility in data protection and privacy.

This it has done by coming up with the Data Protection Act 2019, the anchor law that created the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner.

“It is up to the data collectors to ensure all the information is protected from breaches. In the unfortunate event that the data is breached, one will be held accountable,” she said.

Mr Eliud Owalo, the cabinet secretary, Information, Communication and Digital Economy, said that data protection and privacy is at the centre of the government’s transformative agenda on digital technology.

The government is currently registering farmers digitally to enable the issuance of subsidised fertiliser and other initiatives.

Similarly, the government has implemented the Hustler Fund and will soon set up an integrated digital health system to boost primary healthcare.

“We have committed to digitise most services and programmes to eliminate bureaucracy and boost efficiency but this cannot succeed if the data people provide is not secure. We must protect peoples rights to privacy as we build the digital economy.”

The ODPC is expected to issue guidelines on how the data collected from farmers and through the health system as well as other government services would be protected.

Mr Owalo said that in the next six months, the government will be offering up to 5,000 services on the e-citizen platform.

“As we shift to digital services, we are also thinking about cyber security and data protection,” he observed.

Further, he said the government will roll out 100,000km of fibre optic network across Kenya. “We are also going to provide 25,000 free WiFi hotspots to ensure more people access internet and establish 1,450 digital hubs in villages to encourage digital youth employment. All these come with data protection consequences,” he said, adding that Kenya is keen on leveraging on technology to realize her goals to be leading digital economy in Africa.

He assured firms and innovators that the government’s push to protect data is not meant to stifle innovation.

Eng. Daniel Obam, the communications secretary at the National Communications Secretariat, said that the government’s next phase of policy development on data protection is on emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, block chain and creation of digital identity card.

“In terms of policy development, we are working on having a digital unique identifier. This will help to know who has breached data and will curb existence of multiple data IDs online,” he said.

The digital identifier, according to him, will facilitate information sharing so that one doesn’t need to have to give details everywhere they go. “With policy development, this should change. We have to have platform that enables cross-usage of data and enables one-time data collection.” ■

Strategy promises to put more money in farmers' pockets

Ministry says it will establish and develop aggregation centres with appropriate infrastructure

A 10-year marketing strategy launched by the Ministry of Agriculture last week promises to put more money in farmers' pockets, not only by building new markets and aggregation centres, but also through adoption of digital channels to eliminate brokers. The strategy that will take some Sh8.44 billion to implement notes that many areas designated as markets do not

have required agricultural infrastructure like livestock yards and cold chain facilities.

The ministry will, therefore, seek to develop and maintain market infrastructure and facilities that meet the requirements of various agricultural produce and products such as livestock sale yards and fish landing sites.

It will also establish and develop aggregation centres with appropriate infrastructure and associated facilities for agricultural produce to attain economic volumes.

To enhance compliance to market requirements for agricultural produce and products standards, the ministry says it will develop new guidelines and enhance the capacity

of surveillance institutions at national and county levels.

"It is estimated that over 30 per cent of harvested crops, 25 per cent of fish and 40 per cent of dairy products along the value chain are lost due to poor post-harvest management, inappropriate storage facilities, poor produce handling and poor linkages to markets. The ministry will promote post-harvest and preservation technologies to reduce loss of agricultural produce," says the document.

The ministry will also seek to improve the value of agricultural produce to increase market access, deepen adoption of modern and innovative systems for marketing of agricultural produce and products, develop an efficient and reliable transport infrastructure and logistics for movement of agricultural produce and products to markets.

During the launch, Agriculture CS Mithika Linturi noted that agricultural marketing has not been fully developed to ensure it successfully makes contribution to the socio-economic development of the country.

"This strategy will help to facilitate efficient trade and consequently focus small farmers away from subsistence to commercial farming, while increasing the competitiveness of the country's produce and products," he said. ■

Institutions partner to better services for the disabled at Huduma Centres

Persons living with disabilities will now find it easier to access services at Huduma Centres following discussions between Huduma Kenya and the Kenya Institute of Special Education (KISE).

Officials from the two institutions met recently and agreed on various interventions that can be put in place to make the centres friendlier to the disabled.

Currently, the centres have ramps and wheelchairs to provide support for the physically challenged.

KISE director, Dr Norman Kiogora, and Huduma Kenya Acting Secretary/CEO, Mr Mugambi Njeru, agreed at the meeting to further the partnership through training of

Huduma Kenya staff on sign language and KISE to facilitate sessions during Huduma Kenya's Customer Service Excellence.

Besides those who are physically challenged, other persons with disabilities targeted by the interventions are those with mental, sensory and intellectual challenges.

Other areas Huduma Kenya and KISE agreed to partner are in deployment of sign language interpreters across the 52 Huduma Centres, translation of Huduma Kenya Programme Service Charter into Braille and Audio Visual, Deployment of Services to Huduma Centres, Contact Centre and Huduma Mashinani and Joint Awareness Campaigns. ■

Climate and weather, what's the difference?

When it rains on a particular day or a week, these changes in atmospheric conditions refer to the weather. On the other hand, climate refers to these weather changes for 30 years or more.

Now, tell me about climate change

This is drastic change in weather conditions of a region — including very high or very low temperatures or decreased rainfall — over time.

Is climate change the same as global warming?

Climate change is one of the effects of global warming, which is a build up of excess heat on the earth due to human activities.

How is climate change a man-made problem?

The rapid change in weather patterns is fuelled by human activities that lead to emission of carbon dioxide and other greenhouse gases (GHG) leading to rise in temperatures. In Kenya, temperatures in some parts of the country, especially arid areas, have risen by over 1.50C in the past years.

Why is the government keen on combating climate change?

Effects of climate change like drought and floods undermine a country's economic development. Kenya, for instance, has had to divert resources from other areas to fight drought or help victims of floods.

Should I be concerned about climate change?

Yes, the effects of climate change are affecting each of one of us. For instance, failed rains in the last four seasons have led to higher food prices due to decreased production. Again, you must have been asked to contribute to help save victims of drought.

I have heard about climate mitigation and climate adaptation...

The former means reducing emission of greenhouse gases like carbon dioxide to prevent temperatures from rising further while the latter involves altering the way we do things, for instance, farming or transportation to reduce risks associated with climate change.

How will planting of 15 billion trees help to curb climate change?

Trees absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, therefore, stopping rise in temperatures. They also aid in conserving soil and water and purifying the air.

The tree planting project is being implemented by the Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Forestry, and is expected to create up to 320,000 jobs. The ministry will announce opportunities arising from the exercise. However, you can also plant tree seedlings for sale in your community. But please register your nursery online with Kenya Forest Service for networking, ease of doing business and market linkages.

Where can I get tree seedlings to plant?

Kenya Prisons Service and Kenya Forest Service are some of government institutions that sell a variety of tree seedlings to the public at subsidised rates.

KALRO develops high yielding rice varieties to boost local production

 The Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organization (KALRO) is conducting trials for new climate-smart high-yielding rice varieties after years of research in a bid to bolster food production in the country.

The KALRO rice programme contributes to the National Rice Development Strategy (NRDS 2019-2030) of enhancing food security and income through sustainable rice production.

KALRO Director General Dr Eliud Kireger says the research Agency has released a total of nine improved rice varieties for both upland and lowland agro-ecologies. Three of the varieties are Komboka, CSR36, and 08FAN10 dubbed Mkombozi by farmers because it is early maturing.

The CSR36 rice variety which is long slender grain, non-sticky rice that separates on cooking has passed the national performance trials and is now under distinctiveness, uniformity and stability test. It was recently displayed to Tana River farmers.

The CSR36 variety is climate-

smart and high yielding in that it, can be grown in saline-sodic soils (soils with pH levels more than 8.5). "The grains have long slender and aromatic attributes that match the consumer preference for milled white rice in Kenya.

Wide adoption of CSR36 offers an opportunity to utilize the salt affected areas for rice production and to significantly increase rice production and set the country free from the ballooning rice imports," said

Dr. Kireger in his speech read by the Director at the Industrial Crop Development Institute Mr. Finyange Pole.

Rice is one of the major food crops after maize, and the consumption of rice has been increasing "because young people nowadays prefer rice and potatoes. With that high demand, there is a need to ensure we produce a lot of rice to feed our people," Finyange said at the Tana Irrigation Scheme.

The country's rice deficit of

around 100,000 metric tonnes is filled through importation, making the country lose in foreign exchange.

The only solution, Finyange said, is to come up with our own homegrown solutions by making sure we increase both production and productivity-production by increasing the area under rice farming in the country, and productivity by coming with the superior variety that is also climate smart.

KALRO has changed its strategy of rolling out new varieties by working backward with farmers to know the variety they want and that suits market needs.

Trials are ongoing in all rice-producing irrigation schemes in the country to come up with a variety that is high yielding. Hence farmers will have a basket full of options and management practices to increase food production.

"Two varieties have been released and others are in the pipeline, all of them with different traits like salt tolerance. If a variety is not salt tolerant, it will not perform," Mr Pole said.

Lobbies unveil anti cervical cancer campaign in Kisumu

The Africa Cancer Foundation, in collaboration with the Matibabu Foundation and the Lake Region Economic Bloc (LREB), has launched a cervical cancer campaign in Kisumu County to create awareness and lower the prevalence rate of the killer disease in the area. The campaign, spearheaded by Kisumu Governor Prof. Anyang Nyong'o's spouse Dorothy Nyong'o, targets at scaling up cervical cancer screening in a long-term effort to eliminate the disease in the area by 2030. Dorothy Nyong'o, who is also the patron of the Africa Cancer Foundation, said the disease, which is preventable and treatable when detected early, continues to ravage families in the area.

She attributed this to the high prevalence of HIV/AIDS in the area saying the two diseases are interrelated. "Cervical cancer is mostly sexually transmitted. We should not be shy but talk openly about this as we encourage our women to go for screening," she said.

Speaking during the launch of the campaign at Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Teaching and Referral Hospital in Kisumu, Nyong'o who was accompanied by her counterparts

Margaret Lusaka (Bungoma), Emily Nyaribo (Nyamira) and Agnes Ochillo (Migori) said the campaign shall be scaled up to cover the LREB which comprises 14 counties.

The campaign, which is the first of its kind in the region, coincides with the global and Kenya National Cancer Awareness month which is marked in January. Through the initiative, free screening services will be offered while medical personnel will benefit from 25,000 pairs of medical scrubs courtesy of Matibabu Foundation and Africa Cancer Foundation. Nyong'o said the medical personnel will be engaged as ambassadors of the campaign so as to scale up screening and treatment.

As a preventive measure, Nyong'o called for intensive administration of the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) vaccine to girls aged 10-14 years to lower the prevalence of the disease. Kisumu County Executive Committee Member in charge of Medical Services Dr. Gregory Ganda decried the poor uptake of the HPV vaccine, which he said was critical in the fight against the disease. *By Jimmy Agoi and Adoyo Immaculate*

US based charity in talks with Murang'a County to revamp coffee and ICT sectors

A United States based organization has initiated talks with Murang'a County Government to revamp the coffee and ICT sectors in the county.

The Mlife Foundation has reached out to the County Assembly and the executive to partner and engage young people in production and marketing of coffee through online platforms.

Mr. Mwangi Mukami, the Head of the Foundation said the use of digital technology can boost coffee farming by accessing international markets through online marketing.

He said this when he led a delegation to meet the County Deputy Governor Stephen Munania and the

leadership of the Murang'a County Assembly.

Mwangi said through a partnership with the devolved administration, young people will be brought on board to search for locally produced coffee markets using digital platforms.

He lauded the high qual-

ity of Kenyan coffee saying it can fetch good returns in the American market.

"Kenya is among countries which produce high quality coffee. What is missing and affecting farmers are good returns. By searching for markets online, the produce can fetch better prices.

"Mlife Foundation with the Murang'a County Government wants to establish ICT hubs in different parts of the county. The hubs will help train young people on emerging developments in the digital world and how they can explore online to access a wide market for local produce," explained Mwangi at the office of the Deputy Governor.

Munania on his part, commended the delegation for their concern over the local youth saying the county government has established coffee demonstration farms across the sub counties targeting the youth.

"The County Government has two acres of land for coffee farming demonstration at Ikundu Farm and another two acres at Iyego Society," the Deputy Governor said.

Gov to tip TVET managers on income generation strategies

Kenya School of Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) has embarked on training managers of technical institutions from across the country on income generating strategies to enhance effective and efficient management of human and financial resources in the institutions. The training has been facilitated by the African Development Bank (AfDB) through the Ministry of Education' State Department for TVET for relevant skills development. The Ministry of Education has contracted the Kenya School of TVET to carry out training of managers on public finance management and governance to improve governance capacity at the institutions, efficacy and professionalism in line with governance policies, frameworks and structures of TVET Act of 2013 and sessional paper No. 14 of 2012. Speaking to the KNA during the official launch of the training at the Rift Valley Technical Training Institute (RVTTI) and the Eldoret National Polytechnic, State Department for Technical, Vocational and Training Principal Secretary (PS) Dr. Esther Mu-

oria, pointed out that the government has established over 120 new TVET institutions to make technical education accessible and affordable.

With the establishment of the new TVET institutions and a new management in place, the PS said it is critical that managers are trained to be more efficient and effective in running the TVET institutions.

"We are training our managers across all our institutions in the country on institutional management because we want to make our institutions as strategic as possible to attract as many trainees as we can because technical training is very important for our country," Dr Muoria said. Dr Muoria further noted that the move by the Ministry was informed by various reports and surveys which revealed gaps in management capacity in TVET institutions.

The Kenya School of TVET Director General Dr Edwin Tarno pointed out that the project which started in June last year targets 3,115 TVET managers across the country and has so far trained about 2,000 administrators.
