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PSC to release compliance report on Values and principles Friday

The 2021/2022 Annual Report on the Status of Compliance with Values and Principles in Articles 10 and 232 of the Constitution will be released to the public on Friday.

The report which has

been compiled by the Public Service Commission (PSC) is in compliance with Articles 234 2(c) and (h) of the Constitution, which requires the Commission to promote, evaluate and report to the President and Parliament, the extent to which

the values and principles have been complied with throughout the public service.

The Commission conducted the compliance survey for the July 2021 to June 2022 Financial Year and compiled the report.

The event will be graced by President William Ruto this week at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC).

The report presents evaluation of the measures taken, progress realized, and challenges faced in

implementing the national values and principles of governance and the values and principles of the Public Service.

It recommends corrective interventions on the compliance levels of public service.

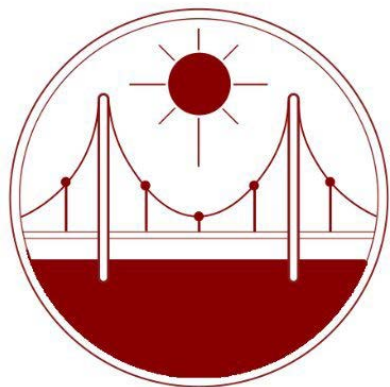
The report presents findings from a survey of 477 public institutions out of 525, representing a 91 per cent response rate.

The evaluation focused on the extent to which public

Agency now launches virtual market for young innovators

Young inventors in Kenya will now have a ready avenue to commercialize their innovations following the recent move by Kenya National Innovation Agency (KeNIA) to launch a digital platform designed to link and connect startups, innovators, researchers, tech hubs, partners and investors.

The launch of the Kenya Innovation Bridge (KIB) was held at the LakeHub Foundation in Kisumu.

The digital marketplace will make it easier for the aforementioned groups from especially Western Kenya to network and scale up their innovations.

The platform further provides startups and businesses with the opportunity to access mentorship, capacity building and training.

Strathmore University developed KIB which seeks to enhance

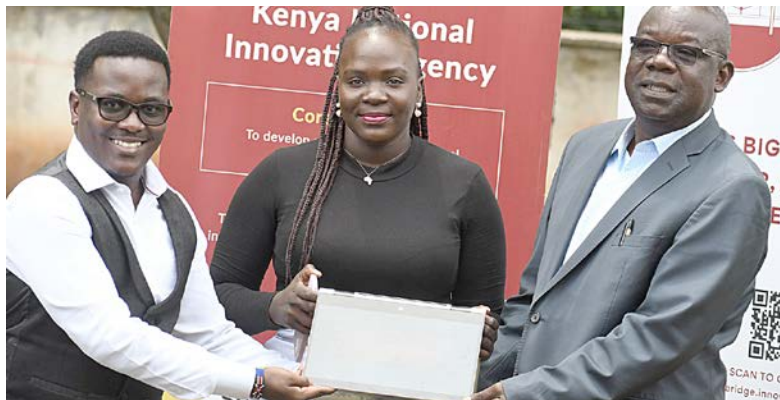
the discoverability of young innovators and connect them to a virtual marketplace. The initiative is funded by the UK government through the Foreign Commonwealth Development Office (FCDO).

The KeNIA CEO Dr. Tonny Omwansa, said in a speech read on his behalf by Mr. George Masila that the linkages in form of investments, partnerships and capacity-building opportunities would catalyze the process for the youth to commercialize their talents.

“The KIB Platform aims at bridging the skill gap among innovators through capacity building which will be offered by hubs, universities, and other stakeholders,” stated Omwansa.

At the same time, he stressed that the KIB will work to bridge the inclusivity gap by ensuring that innovators in the whole country get access to funds, partnerships, and customers for their innovations.

“We established this platform to address the needs of people who don’t have access to potential partners, but can access the digital market to link and network

with various collaborators like the county governments,” stated Omwansa.

In addition, he revealed the Agency’s plan to upgrade all 260 Youth Empowerment Centers (YECs) across the country into Innovation Hubs. The Agency, in partnership with other stakeholders will set up programs and capacity-building activities in these innovation centers to attract the youth. “KeNIA working with the Ministry of Youth Affairs, Arts and Sports is keen to ensure

innovators from all regions of the country get exposure through this platform,” he added.

The process was initiated in 2020 and in the initial stage, it attracted participants from 20 counties.

The Agency is committed to expanding the uptake of KIB across the country and it is in this regard that the team has held regional launches in Nakuru for the Rift Valley region and Kisumu for the Lake and Western region.

institutions mainstreamed the National Values and Principles of Governance and the Values and Principles of Public Service, grouped in seven thematic areas.

The thematic areas are service delivery improvement; high standards of professional ethics; good governance, transparency and accountability; performance management; equitable allocation of opportunities and resources; public participation in policy-making; and efficiency, effectiveness and economic use of resources and sustainable development.

The overall compliance index was 41.7 per cent, an improvement of 1.7 per cent from the previous financial year, meaning that the public service has progressively improved on mainstreaming the values and principles in service delivery.

The results indicate that while the public service is rendering services to citizens in many quarters, there is need for strict observance of the na-

tional values and principles of governance in Article 10; and the values and principles of public service in Article 232.

On 31 December 2022, the PSC submitted the report to the President and Parliament as required by law.

The Commission further disseminated the report findings through webinar forums to heads of human resource of the evaluated institutions in the six service sectors.

The sectors include Constitutional Commissions and Independent Offices (CCIOs), Ministries and State Departments (MDAs), Public Universities, State Corporations and Semi-Autonomous Government Agencies (SAGAs), Statutory Commissions and Authorities and Technical and Vocational Education Training institutes (TVETs).

During the webinars, the Public Service Commission Chairperson, Amb. Anthony Muchiri called upon the institutions to ensure compliance with the values and principles of public service enshrined in the Constitution.

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Relief for Maralal town residents as Sh 1.4b Yamo dam nears completion

At least 64,000 households in Maralal town, Samburu County, and its environs will soon have access to clean and safe water as the construction of Yamo dam nears completion.

Phase One of the Yamo dam, which has a capacity to hold 1.2 million cubic meters of water is complete and the dam can be filled in the two seasons of normal average rainfalls which occur in the county annually.

The project, which is being implemented by the Northern Water Works Development Agency at a cost of Sh1.4 billion is expected to serve the immediate township up to the year 2038 beyond which experts expect new sources to be identified.

Speaking after an inspection tour of the project, Water and Irrigation Principal Secretary Dr. Kiprono Rono said the dam has an output

of about 6,000 cubic meters per day which will be sufficient for the Maralal town residents.

"The phase one construction works of the dam are complete and the second

phase will include construction of a treatment plant which requires Sh1.5 billion which the government will allocate in the next budget so that this project can be completed," Kiprono said.

"Together with the county government, we will also map other water projects in the county and give priorities to which a budget will be allocated in the coming years," he added.

The PS further assured the country that the government has come up with comprehensive plans for water conservation going forward, through a sustainable model by constructing 100 mega dams, construction of smaller dams and drilling of boreholes in the country.

"From the weatherman, there is an indication that this rain will not last long, and as a government we have put measures in place to ensure that we store this water for use especially during dry seasons" the PS said.

Samburu Governor Jonathan Lelelit on his part said the main challenge to access to clean water is to get a safe water source which can be piped to the residents.

"We thank the government for choosing to host the World Water Day here. There have been water challenges in this county and we hope this day brings brighter days ahead in terms of provision and access to clean water by the people of Samburu," Lelelit said.

Homa Bay, Charity in deal to build sports talent academy

Homa Bay will soon bring football home after the County Government signed an agreement with a Non-Governmental Organisation (NGO) Acakoro Football Academy for the establishment of a sports development academy in the area.

This partnership will see the construction of a state-of-the-art sports academy and an academic institution in Kanyamwa-Kosewe Ward, Ndiwa Sub-County to benefit children of ages six to 14 years.

The premier academy will be established on a 20-acre piece of land provided by the County Government and funded by the NGO at a cost of 3.5 million US dollars.

Speaking after signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with Acakoro General Manager Mr. Lucas Mott, Governor Gladys Wanga said the agreement outlines a

long-term partnership for the development of talent for the entire region.

"This project will open up Homa Bay to opportunities in hosting major sporting events. We are happy that out of the 47 counties, Acakoro, with the support of the Austrian people have chosen Homa Bay for setting up the academy," Wanga said.

Founded in 2013 through Kenyan-Austrian partnership, Acakoro has over time become Kenya's leading football academy that combines quality education alongside sporting activities.

Once established, the academy will offer both sports and education to the children until university level.

"This partnership is unique as Acakoro does not just set up an academy alone but also an education institution to allow children to learn as well as engage in sports," Wanga noted.

Devolution Principal Secretary Ms Teresia Mbaika has expressed the State Department's commitment to a people-driven and deliberately inclusive participatory process where citizen participation is at the core of policy and strategy development, selection and implementation of projects and programs.

Speaking during a Familiarization Retreat for Agencies and Departments under the purview of the National Assembly Departmental Committee on Regional Development in Naivasha, Ms Mbaika noted that the meaningful participation of the people in decision making processes at both levels of government has gone a long way in enhancing service delivery to the citizens in the country.

She also emphasized that devolution is working for Kenyans despite serious challenges that have been experienced and documented "including attempts at clawing back to centralization and re-centralizing at county headquarters.

The PS, however, stated that the State Department is alive to such challenges and has put in place various mitigation measures adding that it shall continue to "provide policy leadership, facilitation and coordination through continuous and sustained stakeholder consultation, collaboration and cooperation".

She urged the Departmental Committee on Regional Development to support the devolution sector in getting the necessary resources as the success of devolution requires huge resources for continuous civic education, structured capacity building initiatives, highly committed personnel, institutions and

organizations.

The PS thanked the Departmental Committee for the existing cordial relations adding that to further enhance the relations between the two, a Liaison Officer has been appointed so as to create a seamless link for timely consultations with the National Assembly and the Senate

Speaking during the meeting, the Chairperson of the Department Committee on Regional Development, Peter Lochakapong, said the familiarization retreat had been organized so as to create synergies between the Committee and the Agencies and Departments under its purview.

He added that the Committee seeks to understand the operations and the strategic direction of the MDAs especially their goals, strategies, key priorities, new projects, challenges and emerging issues like the ongoing drought.

Mr. Lochakapong added that the Committee also seeks to explore opportunities and lay the groundwork for future cooperation and support.

He noted that his Committee was aware of the challenges faced by the agencies among them underfunding in terms of resource allocation, which has negatively affected their operations; stalled projects and huge historical pending bills.

The chairman noted that the implementation of programs and projects remains the cornerstone for citizen engagement and assured the agencies of the Committee's continued support in addressing the challenges they are facing.

State to set up drought tolerant cashew nut in ASALs

Crops Development Principal Secretary Kello Harsama has directed the Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Organization (KALRO) to establish cashew nut nurseries in Arid and Semi-Arid Land (ASAL) counties for economic diversification.

Harsama launched four new varieties of cashew nuts that are drought and disease resistant, and only take one and half years to mature as opposed to the traditional varieties that take five years.

The new varieties expected to increase farmers’ earnings due to their short maturity have been named Kkrosho75, Kkrosho81, Kkrosho82, and Kkrosho100.

The PS termed the development of the varieties “a big breakthrough in the agriculture sector” since farmers plant, harvest, and sell within a short duration.

The PS encouraged farmers and leaders from ASAL counties to grow cashew nuts as an alternative source of income.

“I have directed KALRO to start nurseries in other parts of Kenya where there is drought in Marsabit, Wajir, Isiolo, Samburu, Turkana, Elgeyo Marakwet, and Baringo. I will solicit funds for KALRO to set up nurseries in the ASAL counties so that people in those areas can start benefiting from cashew nuts because the market is available abroad and in Kenya,” Harsama said.

“It is a good opportunity for Kenyans who want to cultivate in arid areas. This crop does not require a lot of rain, and it is drought tolerant. People should take advantage and plant it in abundance to get profit,” he added.

Kenya, as a signatory to the Paris Agreement having ratified it on the 28th December, 2016 is obligated to prepare and submit her Nationally Determined Contributions (NDC) towards the fulfilment of the Paris Agreement's objective of keeping the increase in global temperature to well below 2°C with respect to the pre-industrial era, and further aim to limit it to 1.5°C.

Article 4.2 of the Paris Agreement, states that each Party shall prepare, communicate and maintain successive Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs) that it intends to achieve. Parties shall pursue domestic mitigation measures, with the aim of achieving the objectives of such contributions.

Kenya's updated NDC, submitted to United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) on 28th December 2020, commits to abate Green House Gas (GHG) emissions by 32% (46 MtCO₂eq) by 2030 relative to the Business as Usual (BAU) scenario of 143 metric tonnes of carbon dioxide equivalent (MtCO₂eq); and in line with Kenya's sustainable development agenda and national circumstances. In the updated NDC 2020, Kenya has explicitly expressed her intention to use voluntary cooperation under Article 6 of the Paris Agreement, when applicable, with the guidance adopted by Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA). Further, it indicates that Kenya will develop domestic legislation and institutional frameworks to govern her engagement in the carbon market and non-market mechanisms.

The Climate Change Act, 2016, which is an Act of Parliament, provides for a regulatory framework for enhanced response to climate change, a mechanism and measures to achieve low carbon climate development, and for connected purposes. The Act, however, does not make provision for engagement/participation in carbon markets.

The Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Forestry has identified this gap, among others, in the operationalization of the Climate Change Act, 2016. Therefore, the Ministry has considered to incorporate carbon markets, among others in the Climate Change Act, 2016 through the Climate Change (Amendment) Bill, 2023.

The objects and purpose of the Climate Change (Amendment) Bill, 2023 is to provide for, inter alia: -

- The development, management, implementation and regulation of mechanisms to enhance climate change resilience and low carbon development for the sustainable development of Kenya;
- The guidance in the development and implementation of carbon markets and non-market approaches in compliance with international obligations;
- The guidance and policy direction on carbon markets to the national and county governments, the public and other stakeholders.
- Benefit-sharing mechanisms in carbon markets;

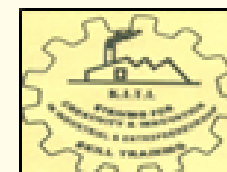

Kenya tops Africa in laboratory quality management systems training-PS Public Health

The Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards Dr. Josephine Mburu has hailed Kenya as a leader in laboratory quality management systems training across the entire African continent.

Speaking while opening a training program on Laboratory Quality Management Systems (LQMS) in Nairobi which attracted laboratory specialists from 21 countries across the African continent, Dr. Mburu described Kenya as a trailblazer in this specialized field where her peers come for benchmarking.

The program, Dr. Mburu noted, which was held in Nairobi is designed to equip laboratory specialists with the knowledge and skills necessary to implement and sustain External Quality Assurance (EQA) schemes in their respective countries.

The PS noted that since the establishment of the Kenya External Quality Assessment Scheme (KNEQAS) in 2007, the country has made significant strides in improving the quality of essential diagnostic services in clinical laboratories.

“KNEQAS is mandated to improve the quality of essential diagnostic services in clinical laboratories and

it has been expanded to include HIV Serology, Malaria, HPV, SARS COV-2, Bacteriology, Viral Load and EID plus Tuberculosis”, said Dr. Mburu.

The KNEQAS scheme, the PS noted, began by offering one cycle per year and then increased to two cycles per year in 2009 and in 2011, it shifted from site-to-individual provider-based proficiency testing to closely monitor the quality of testing for every HIV testing service provider.

Dr. Mburu said one of the achievements of KNEQAS is the National Public Health

Laboratories (NPHL) receiving accreditation under ISO 17043:2010 as a Proficiency Testing provider, offering HIV Serology to over 20,000 testers/participants.

“The scheme coverage has been scaled up with participation of over 95 per cent which has contributed to a reduction in misdiagnosis, increased confidence in test results, and improved quality of services and turnaround time,” she said.

Dr. Mburu emphasized the need for a well-functioning laboratory system that aids the clinician in arriving at the correct diagnosis and

for monitoring the patient's recovery.

She also noted that laboratories play a crucial role in public health security through laboratory-based surveillance, particularly in detecting harmful pathogens that can pose significant threats to public health.

Dr. Mburu stressed that the quality of laboratory results must be assured to instill confidence in clinicians and public health experts that the decisions made based on these results

will do good and not harm to patients and the general public.

The PS commended the Global Fund for its support provided through its regional grant, which has enabled the East Central and Southern Africa (ECSA) Health Community and the Uganda SRL to provide support to many countries in the region to strengthen their laboratory systems.

The workshop, the PS said, will provide a golden opportunity for peer-to-peer

learning and sharing of best practices among African public health practitioners which gave participants from all the 21 countries represented a chance to learn from each other, share successes, and address the challenges faced.

“The intended outcome is that participants will be able to plan, implement, monitor, and follow up on Laboratory Quality Management Systems against the ISO 17043 standards”, Dr. Mburu noted.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION ON THE FILM AND STAGE PLAYS REGULATIONS AND GUIDELINES

The Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports is vested with the responsibility of developing the film industry through policy and legislative interventions. To this end, the Ministry is conferred with the responsibility of developing Regulations under Section 35 of the Films and Stage Plays Act, Cap 222, Laws of Kenya.

The Kenya Film Classification Board is established under the Act to regulate the local film sector with a view to creating an enabling regulatory environment and to protect children from exposure to inappropriate content.

To cope with the rapid evolution of technology and the emergence of new services, the Ministry of Youth Affairs, the Arts and Sports is reviewing the regulations below with a view to aligning the legal and regulatory framework with developments in the industry as well as international best practices.

Duale urges MPs to pass regulations on peace support fund

Defence Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale is urging Members of Parliament to pass the regulations on National Peace Support Operations Fund proposed by the National Defence Council.

Duale said the kitty shall be critical in funding peace support operations undertaken by the Kenya Defence Forces (KDF), the National Police Service and any other

security organ as envisaged in Article 240 (8) (a) of the Constitution.

The CS made the remarks while making a brief on National Peace Support Operations when he appeared before the National Assembly Committee on Delegated Legislation in Naivasha.

He informed the Committee that, globally, Kenya has been one of the major Troops Contributing Country (TCC) in peace keeping missions but has over the

years experienced financial constraints which has made it hard to fund peace support operations.

Duale told the Committee chaired by the Ainabkoi MP. Samuel Chepkonga that once the funds are in place, it shall facilitate Force generation and Force projection activities as well as financing capacity building programs in training and infrastructure development.

“Kenya is becoming a regional hub in peace keep-

ing and reconciliation. We are an anchor State in the region and with the regularization of this fund, KDF shall modernize their equipment to help upscale their support operations,” said the CS.

He disclosed that the funding shall further aid in carrying out research, monitoring and evaluation of peace related activities and help the units to attain appropriate levels to participate in United Nations peace

keeping missions.

According to the regulations, Defence Principal Secretary shall supervise and control the administration of the funds.

The CS was accompanied by Chief of Legal Services Brigadier Yvonne Kerubo, peace keeping expert, Brigadier Edward Rugendo and Mr Jonah Wala, the Director of Accounting Services from the Ministry of National Treasury and Economic Planning.

Power generation from solar has tripled in the past years as the country steps up efforts to produce electricity from renewable sources.

The Energy and Petroleum Regulatory Authority (Epra) noted that the country's installed solar photovoltaic capacity currently stands at 210 megawatts (MW), up from 170MW in mid-last year.

With the increase in capacity, monthly solar power generation has jumped from 7.44 million kilowatts per hour (KWh) in 2021 to an average of 27KWh currently.

The rise in solar power output has followed the commissioning of several plants, including a 40MW facility recently.

“Alten Solar Project was commissioned in October 2022 providing an additional 40MW of solar photovoltaic capacity to the power system. This brings the utility scale solar installed capacity to 210MW,” said Epra in its latest industry report covering the second half of 2022.

The increase in production has pushed up the share of installed solar capacity by 1.2 per cent to stand at 6.8 per cent of the total power generated.

“There is a notable increase in solar energy generation following a rise in installation of solar photovoltaic systems for commercial and industrial use. As at December 2022, the authority had licensed captive solar photovoltaic systems with a combined capac-

ity of 53.71MW,” said Epra.

Other plants in Kenya are Garissa Solar (50MW), Cedate (40MW), Selenkei (40MW) and Malindi Solar (40MW).

The five solar plants now contribute 3 per cent to the country’s energy mix, a significant rise from previous years where the source contributed less than 1 per cent.

Millions of Kenyans have also embraced solar energy for lighting and water heating. According to Statista, a global data firm, as at 2018, over 2 million Kenyans were using solar home systems.

One of the major drivers of increased adoption of solar power by households and institutions is to cut rising energy costs.

Kenya has an estimated solar potential of 15,000MW, according to the Kenya Institute for

Public Policy Research and Analysis (Kippra). This is boosted by the country’s position near the equator, which allows it to receive an average of 5-7 sunshine hours each day.

Similarly, power output from wind energy has been on the rise hitting over 200KWh a month.

The country currently has an installed wind capacity of 436.1MW. Major producers are Lake Turkana Wind Plant (310MW), Ngong Wind (25.5MW) and Kipeto Wind Farm (100MW).

“In the period under review, wind contributed 17.2 per cent to Kenya’s energy mix,” said Epra.

Of all the renewable energy sources, however, geothermal and hydro produce the largest share of electricity, with the former

In 2022, geothermal energy accounted for 45.5 per cent of the country’s energy mix, followed by hydro and wind at 21.8 per cent and 17.2 per cent respectively.

Kenya ranks first in Africa and seventh in the world with an installed geothermal power generating capacity of 953.7MW.

The total installed hydropower capacity stood at 867.54MW as at December 2022.

There was a decrease in hydro energy generation between September and December due to drought, according to Epra.

Mr Daniel Bargarria, the Epra director-general, noted that Kenya’s commitment to produce 100 per cent of electricity from the renewable sources is on course.

“The renewable energy subsector continues to witness positive growth which demonstrates the commitment to promote clean energy,” he said.

Mr Bargarria observed that 87.4 per cent of the total electricity generated in Kenya currently comes from renewable resources.

The government has prioritised the development of geothermal, wind and solar energy plants to facilitate the attainment of 100 per cent transition to renewable energy by 2030.

The installed capacity of renewable energy sources stood at 2,613.1MW at December 2022, accounting for 77 per cent of the total capacity.

Kenya is also working to raise production of energy from sustainable organic matter.

The bioenergy is exploited from sources like biochar, briquettes, bagasse, biogas, syngas, bioethanol and biodiesel.

“The different forms of bioenergy are utilised in open fire cooking, improved biomass cook stoves, industrial biomass boilers, furnaces, internal combustion engines, lighting lamps and in electricity generation,” said Epra.

In August 2022, the institution issued biofuels guidelines, outlining the requirements for businesses to enhance the safe use of products and adoption of the relevant standards.

The guidelines apply to the production, transportation, exportation, storage, packaging and sale of bioethanol as a cooking fuel, biogas or biodiesel.

As at December 2022, the bioenergy installed electricity capacity stood at 89.48MW, derived mostly from biogas, bagasse and biomass plants.

President William Ruto last week met officials of Italian biofuel firm Eni Spa led by its director-general of natural resources, Mr Guido Brusco.

The firm makes biofuel from castor oil grown in Baringo, Makueni, Nakuru and Mombasa counties.

Eni Spa grows the crop on 40,000 acres and plans to scale up production to 200,000 acres, a move that will create more than 200,000 jobs.

The President committed to provide Eni Spa with between 250,000 and 300,000 acres in marginal areas for production of biofuels, adding that the government is committed to creating green jobs and supporting investments in clean energy. ■

President William Ruto launched the product issued by the Local Authority Pension Trust (Laptrust) last week, in a move expected to spur the pension sector, which heavily relies on physical assets.

Mr Hosea Kili, the managing director of CPF Financial Services Group, said pension funds had traditionally been reluctant to invest in real estate but with introduction of I-REITs, they can now access the huge potential of property-backed investments.

Drought leaves 1.1m children, pregnant women malnourished in arid areas

NDMA says 970,214 cases of children under five and 142,179 pregnant women have been reported in 23 counties as drought bites

Over 1.1 million children aged under five as well as pregnant and lactating mothers are acutely malnourished and in need of treatment in the arid areas due to drought, the National Drought Management Authority (NDMA) said in an assessment report. The agency said in its March update that some 970,214 cases of acutely malnourished children have been reported in 23 affected counties as the drought worsens. This number is a rise from 942,000 cases in October last year.

“Acute malnutrition risks across the counties are 970,214 children aged 6 to 59 months and 142,179 pregnant and breastfeeding mothers, who are equally in need of treatment,” said NDMA. The drought situation, according to the institution, continued to worsen in February in the 22 out of the 23 arid counties. “The high temperatures recorded across the country, coupled with fifth failed rains season further exacerbated the drought situation,” said the agency.

The institution observed that the number of people in need of humanitarian assistance currently stands at 4.4 million, up from 4.2 million in October last year.

Affected counties include Marsabit and Turkana, which slid into emergency drought phase in February and Kitui, Kajiado, Kilifi, Makueni, Mandera, Samburu, Tana River, Wajir and Isiolo which are in alarm drought phase. The others, Baringo, Garissa, Kwale, Laikipia, Lamu, Meru, Narok, Nyeri, Taita Taveta, West Pokot and Embu, are in the alert drought phase, said NDMA.

Livestock mortalities across all species namely camels, cattle, goats and sheep stood at 2.61 million, with the numbers rising due to diminished pasture and water resources.

High livestock mortalities have been reported in Samburu, Kajiado, Mandera, Isiolo, Lamu, Marsabit and Garissa counties.

“The current livestock body condition displayed poor and fair conditions in most of the arid and semi-arid counties. Generally, the current body condition of most livestock is below normal in comparison to similar periods during a normal year,” said the institution.

However, the situation is set to improve in asals as heavy rains are recorded in some parts. This comes as a relief to the livestock keepers who will soon have pasture for their animals. ■

I have heard about data protection and data privacy, what's the difference?

The terms are often used interchangeably, but data privacy defines who has access to data, while data protection provides tools and policies to restrict access to the data.

Is giving false information as a data subject illegal?

Providing inaccurate information where you are required under the law to provide accurate information is an offence.

Talk about the major violators of data privacy such as supermarkets, digital lenders and politicians...

The ODPC is currently working on sector-specific directives, which will offer guidance to such entities on how to comply with the data protection laws as they collect data from their clientele. The office is also working on an awareness campaigns to have data controllers and processors appreciate their compliance requirements under the law.

Does one retain the right to data privacy after death?

The scope of the Data Protection Act, 2019, does not include dead people.

Is an entity required by law to seek my consent before sharing my data?

An organisation collecting your personal data is not necessarily required to seek your consent before sharing it. However, it is required to notify you whether the information collected will be shared, and with which foreseeable entities.

Can a government agency, say the Kenya Revenue Authority, acquire and use my data from another agency?

As long as there is a lawful purpose. The Data Protection Act does not prohibit the sharing of personal information where there is a lawful purpose. But a person can seek recourse where the processing of personal data is carried out in non-compliance of the law.

What should guide the information asked from me?

A data collector should ask for information that is relevant or related to the purpose of processing. This will vary based on the processing activity being undertaken.

Is there a way I can help to protect my data?

Ensure you are notified by the entity collecting your data about the following:

- That personal data is being collected.
- Your rights in relation to the data being collected.
- The purpose of collection.
- The safeguards that the entity will adopt to protect your data.
- Whether they will share the data with other persons or entities.
- The details of the entity collecting your information.

What steps should I take if my data is misused?

The first step is to seek redress from the data collector and if the issue is not resolved, you have a right to file a complaint with the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner via the website, www.odpc.go.ke or physically visit their offices.

WHO to fast-track initiatives to curb global spread of highly infectious TB

The World Health Organization (WHO) will expand the scope of the WHO Director-General's (DG) Flagship Initiative on Tuberculosis over the period from 2023 to 2027 to support the fast-tracking progress towards ending TB and achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC) by 2030.

Tuberculosis remains one of the world's top infectious killer diseases, causing 1.6 million deaths each year, and affecting millions more, with enormous impacts on families and communities.

The COVID-19 pandemic coupled with ongoing crises such as armed conflict, food insecurity, climate change, political and economic instability, has reversed years of progress made in the fight against TB.

Last year, for the first time in nearly two decades, WHO reported an increase in the number of people falling ill with TB and drug resistant TB, alongside an increase in deaths.

"TB is preventable, treatable and curable, and yet this ancient scourge that has afflicted humanity for millennia continues to cause suffering and death for millions every year," said Dr Tedros

Ghebreyesus added that WHO is committed to supporting countries step up their response by expanding access to services to prevent, detect and treat TB as part of their journey towards universal health coverage,

and to strengthen their defence against epidemics and pandemics.

The WHO DG flagship initiative on TB builds on the progress achieved and lessons learned from 2018-2022. It aims to scale up the delivery of quality care to people living with TB through equitable access to WHO-recommended rapid diagnostics, shorter all-oral treatment for infection and disease, increasing their access to social protection and other innovations including digital tools for health.

The initiative highlights the pressing need to increase

both domestic and international investments in TB services, research, and innovation, particularly in new vaccine development.

It calls for TB services and programmes, particularly in countries with a high TB burden, to be recognized as an essential component of health systems, bolstering primary healthcare and pandemic preparedness and response. The move comes against a backdrop of World Tuberculosis Day this year, which is being commemorated under the theme 'Yes! We can end TB!' with the goal of promoting optimism and fostering high-level leadership, increased investments, rapid adoption of new WHO recommendations, and strengthened multi-sectoral partnerships to combat the TB epidemic.

As part of the DG Flagship initiative, a special call to action is being issued by WHO and partners urging member states to accelerate the rollout of new WHO-recommended shorter all-oral treatment regimens for drug-resistant TB. Drug-resistant TB continues to be a pressing public health concern, taking a significant toll on individuals affected by TB, communities, and healthcare systems worldwide.

Respite for the poor as county allocates Sh120m to its bursary kitty

Trans Nzoia County Government has unveiled an ambitious scholarship programme whose main objective is to uplift the academic standards in the County. The programme dubbed "Elimu Bursary Fund" was officially launched in a colourful event at Kitale ASK ground, presided over by Governor George Nitembeya. The devolved unit has allocated Sh120 million to the bursary kitty in this year's budget that targets to pay tuition fees for an estimated 7,000 students from the county. The beneficiaries are spread across public secondary schools, vocational and tertiary institutions and universities.

Addressing the public, among them students, parents, teachers and education stakeholders, Governor Nitembeya reiterated his administration's commitment towards improving academic standards in the area. Describing education as the foundation for socio-economic equilibrium the world over, he vowed to ensure needy students, especially orphans and those from extremely humble backgrounds,

are fully sponsored up to college and university levels by the scholarship programme.

"This will go a long way in ensuring that students from poor families get opportunities to access education at various levels of secondary, vocational, tertiary and university institutions," Nitembeya said. He revealed that 30 per cent of the Elimu Bursary Fund allocation will go to the 20 vocational training institutions in the County in order to boost student enrolment.

"The student selection process was conducted in all 25 wards by the County Bursary Committee led by ward administrators," said the county boss, who termed the selection process transparent and fair. "By providing scholarships to students from humble backgrounds, our long-term goal is to break the cycle of poverty in Trans Nzoia County," he added.

The Governor, who exuded confidence, added his administration's investment in education was also geared towards production of qualified professionals across the fields.

County revives school feeding program to keep learners in class

At least 12,000 pupils in Taita Taveta County will benefit from a school feeding programme after the County Government launched the program which will help keep the young ones in class as food insecurity persists in various parts of the country. Taita Taveta Governor, Andrew Mwadime flagged off 22 tonnes of porridge flour and sugar to 317 Early Childhood Development Education (ECDE) centres throughout the county.

The two trailer trucks flagged off from the county headquarters at Mwatate had sixteen tonnes of fortified porridge flour and six tonnes of sugar expected to reach over 12,000 ECDE pupils.

"We flag off these consignments with the hope that it can keep our young pupils in classrooms and give some relief to parents at home who are struggling to feed their children" Governor Mwadime, said. Swirling dry winds, sweltering sun heat, and cloudless sky have been the dominant weather patterns in Taita Taveta County for the last six seasons and counting. In the wake of one of the most devastating droughts in

Kenya, the county residents who mainly rely on rain-fed agriculture have been left devastated by massive crop failure and the resulting hunger.

"While the drought and hunger cuts across all social classes and age groups, it is the young and early education learners who are severely affected. We have seen high absenteeism records among ECDE pupils and we believe this program will see them come back to classes," said Gloria Monikombo, the County Executive Member of Education. As per the data released by the National Drought Management Authority in January this year, more than 150,000 people in the county are facing starvation with 17,000 of those being children.

According to county nutritionist Pauline Mugo, the ongoing drought has seen a spike in malnutrition cases, with more than 23 per cent of children under the age of five facing malnourishment.

With heavy rains pounding Nairobi, Western, and several other regions; Taita Taveta residents are crossing their fingers for a bountiful rain season any time now.

Agency rolls out programme to promote Science, Technology and Mathematics

The Centre for Mathematics, Science and Technology Education in Africa (CEMASTEA) has rolled out a mentorship and outreach programme to schools to motivate learners to excel in Science, Technology Education and Mathematics (STEM) subjects.

Through the initiative, the State Corporation also aims to empower teachers across the country to deliver on the subjects at the same time spark interest in learners to support the government's development and industrialization agenda.

CEMASTEA National Trainer Martin Mungai, said through working with teachers, the State Corporation domiciled in the Ministry of Education had identified

gaps in teaching methodologies adding that through the outreach program, teachers were being exposed to various models and resources that can be used to teach the

subjects.

The models, he added, have been designed to simplify various concepts in Physics, Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics, robotics and coding, Climate Change and Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) to regenerate interest amongst learners.

CEMASTEA, he said, was empowering teachers with skills to use locally available resources to develop the models to aid in practical learning.

"We realized that the biggest challenge was the lack of a practical approach to teaching STEM subjects. We are therefore demonstrating how teachers can use locally available resources to teach a concept in a very practical

manner," he said.

The goal, he added, was to renew interest in the subjects through demonstrating their importance to students with a view to encouraging as many students as possible to pursue them.

"As a country we may not have an opportunity to advance as fast as countries in the west if we do not embrace STEM subjects. So, there is a need to continually encourage our learners to show them the importance of STEM in the development of the country," he said.

Speaking during one of the outreach activities at Ken Obura Secondary School in Kisumu, Mungai said the hands-on activities with students will enable teachers to unpack concepts in easy and practical ways.
