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# State eyes billions in revenue from T6, T7 oil fields

The Cabinet Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning, John Mbadi, has defended the fiscal and macroeconomic foundations of the proposed Field Development Plan (FDP) for Blocks T6 and T7, assuring Parliament that the project will not create any explicit or implicit public debt obligations for Kenya.

Appearing before the National Assembly Departmental Committee on Energy and the Senate Standing Committee on Energy, Mbadi outlined the fiscal projections, tax implications, cost recovery framework, and risk mitigation measures tied to the oil development plan spearheaded by the Ministry of Energy and Petroleum.

“The FDP does not create any explicit or implicit public debt obligation for the Government. The financing of exploration, development, and production

remains solely the responsibility of the contractor under the PSC framework,” Mbadi told lawmakers.

The Treasury projects that Kenya could earn between USD 1.05 billion (Sh136 billion) at \$60 per barrel and USD 2.9 billion (Sh371 billion) at \$70 per barrel over the life of the project.

Direct revenues will accrue from profit oil splits and government participation, while indirect revenues are expected to benefit key State agencies.

The CS further announced that Kenya Pipeline Refinery Limited (KPRL) is projected to earn Sh42.3 billion in storage and handling fees, while the Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) is expected to generate Sh41.9 billion from the New Kipevu Oil Jetty.

In addition, the Treasury estimates that the project will generate over 3,000 direct, indirect, and induced jobs, boosting PAYE collections and social security contributions.

“Oil revenues are expected to contribute positively to GDP growth through upstream, mid-stream, and related economic activities,” he stated.

The CS also disclosed that contractors have sought fiscal concessions amounting to USD 1.331 billion (Sh173 billion) under Project Specific Fiscal Terms (PSFTs).

At a base oil price of \$60 per barrel, Mbadi noted that government net cash flow would decline from USD 3.485 billion under the existing PSC terms to USD 1.047 billion if all tax concessions and harmonisation adjustments were granted.

Conversely, he mentioned that the contractor’s net free cash flow would shift from negative territory to a projected USD 497 million, enhancing project bankability.

However, Mbadi emphasized that tax waivers or exemptions can only be granted within constitutional limits.

“Article 210 of the Constitution provides that no tax or licensing fee may be waived, varied or exempted except as provided by legislation,” he noted.

Under Kenya’s Production Sharing Contract (PSC) regime, contractors recover petroleum costs subject to ceilings and regulatory oversight as Mbadi

defended the framework as consistent with international practice.

“Exploration and development operations are high-risk and capital-intensive. The contractor bears all the risks and costs asso-



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ciated with operations,” Mbadi explained, adding that robust safeguards are in place, including approval of annual work programs and budgets, audit rights, ring-fencing of costs and phased development tied to commercial viability.

He said the Government begins earning revenue from first oil, with returns increasing as recoverable costs decline while further clarifying that the FDP does not automatically increase Kenya’s public debt.

According to the CS, exploration and development financing remains the contractor’s responsibility. However, should the Government exercise its 20 percent back-in rights, it would contribute approximately USD 1.228 billion through the normal approval process.

Additionally, Government-funded enablers – including land, power, water, roads and crude oil handling infrastructure – are estimated at USD 433.4 million (Sh56.3 billion) with Mbadi highlighting that these are either already budgeted or undergoing planning and feasibility stages.

Importantly, services such as power, water and crude handling infrastructure will be offered to the project at commercial tariffs determined by regulators as the CS acknowledged that revenues remain highly sensitive to global oil prices.

“At US\$50 per barrel, Gov-

ernment revenue would stand at USD 411 million, rising sharply to USD 2.856 billion at US\$70 per barrel,” he illustrated, adding that mitigation measures include conservative price assumptions and continuous market monitoring.

On crude transportation, Mbadi maintained that the Treasury backed a phased approach including; Phase I: Trucking as an interim measure to minimize upfront capital costs and Phase II: Transition to rail transport for greater efficiency and cost control.

“This phased approach ensures logistics arrangements are matched to production levels while protecting Kenya’s share of oil revenue from excessive transportation costs,” affirmed the CS.

He pronounced that the projected decommissioning cost of USD 331.8 million, plus associated interest, will be managed through a Decommissioning Fund as provided under the Petroleum Act insisting that contractors will progressively provide financial guarantees to prevent liabilities reverting to the State.

“This approach aligns with international best practice and ensures that adequate resources are set aside to meet end-of-life obligations,” Mbadi assured

Reflecting on the Early Oil Pilot Scheme (EOPS), which generated USD 28.3 million in revenue against USD 62.7 million in expenditure, Mbadi argued that the pilot was not intended as a commercial venture.

# Kisumu set for major textile boost as Sh1.2-billion factory nears completion

A Sh1.2-billion textile technology factory under construction at the Kisumu National Polytechnic is 98 per cent complete and is set to be commissioned in April this year to help develop skills and competencies in the textile sector.

State Department for Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) Principal Secretary Dr Esther Thaara Muoria expressed satisfaction with the progress of the works, despite delays occasioned by a number of challenges.

The project is funded by the World Bank through the East Africa Skills for Transformation and Regional Integration Project (EASTRIP).

The facility includes a production unit for spinning, weaving, and garment making to boost the regional cotton industry. The regional flagship centre for textile technology project is part of a broader regional programme aimed at strengthening technical skills, enhancing industry linkages

and promoting value addition across participating East African countries. The construction of the textile technology factory at Kisumu National Polytechnic began with a groundbreaking ceremony in February, 2022 and was expected to have been handed over in early 2025 but

experienced a few bottlenecks that caused some delay that led the PS to cancel the contract of the sub-contractor. To this end, she cautioned her teams in the department to be vigilant and closely supervise projects being undertaken in the department and ensure value for money.

# State releases Sh2 billion to compensate over Mtwapa Bridge construction

The Government has released Sh2 billion to compensate Project-Affected Persons (PAPs) along the Mombasa-Mtwapa-Kilifi (A7) road corridor, clearing a major hurdle that had delayed construction of the 340-metre Mtwapa Bridge and the broader dualling project, Transport Cabinet Secretary Davis Chirchir has said.

Addressing journalists during a site visit at Mtwapa Bridge, Chirchir said the

National Land Commission (NLC) is finalising payments to affected traders and property owners, with Sh838 million released to the commission to facilitate the relocation of businesses within Mtwapa town.

“We have provided all the funding to the National Land Commission, and the commission is in the process of finalising payments. About Sh838 million was released today to ensure that traders along this corridor, particularly in Mtwapa town, can be relocated,” he said.

The CS noted that PAPs are given 30 days’ notice before any demolition is undertaken, adding that construction through Mtwapa town to open up the dual carriageway will commence once the notice period lapses.

Chirchir said the Mtwapa-Kilifi section, the second lot of the project, was largely complete, with approximately 7.7 kilometres of dualling finalised on one side. He added that a presidential directive had been issued to extend the dualling to

the Export Processing Zone (EPZ) in Vipingo, with design work for that section currently underway. On the Mombasa-Mtwapa Lot 1 section, covering about 13 kilometres to the bridge, the CS said land acquisition challenges had been resolved, with four of seven major junction bridges already built

and open to traffic. Work on the remaining three bridges is ongoing. “What was a challenge yesterday in the compensation of project-affected persons is not a problem today. We will see accelerated work through the entire corridor and have traffic flowing as it should,” Chirchir said.

To minimize disruption

to motorists, the CS said the contractor had been advised to prioritise the Bamburi side of the road, from kilometre zero to four, which falls within a single large land ownership. Opening the service road on that side would allow traffic to be diverted while work continues on the opposite carriageway.

# Government unveils plans for major overhaul of Thika Stadium

The Government has finalized plans for the construction of a Sh850 million modern stadium to promote talent development in the region.

The project will involve transforming the town's aging stadium, located at the heart of the town, into a state-of-the-art sports complex built to modern standards.

The refurbished facility will feature a new playing turf, modern changing rooms, a swimming pool, basketball courts, improved spectator terraces,

floodlights, and other supporting amenities aimed at enhancing both competitive and community sports.

Speaking during the ground-breaking ceremony, Cabinet Secretary for Sports Salim Mvurya said the stadium will have a seating capacity of 10,000 and is scheduled for completion within nine months.

"This project is part of the government's broader commitment to expanding and modernizing sports infrastructure across the country. The Thika stadium will provide a critical platform for nurturing young talent

and growing sports in Kiambu County," Mvurya said.

He added that the facility will play a strategic role in preparations for the African Cup of Nations, noting that Thika's proximity to Nairobi makes it a suitable venue for some matches.

"Given its location near Nairobi, this stadium will be instrumental in supporting the hosting of AFCON 2027. Some games can be staged here, helping to ease pressure on the main venues while spreading the benefits of the tournament," he said.

Mvurya noted that the Thika stadium will complement other key facilities within Kiambu County, including Kirigiti Stadium and Gatundu Stadium, strengthening the county's sports ecosystem and decentralizing access to quality venues.

Defense Cabinet Secretary Soipan Tuya said the project highlights the government's collaborative approach to national development, revealing that the Kenya Defence Forces will partner with the Sports Ministry in construction and technical works.

# Kilifi health officer launches campaign to tackle diaper pollution

A Public Health Officer with the Kilifi County Government has launched an initiative to distribute special diaper storage bags to residents in a bid to curb environmental pollution caused by the improper disposal of used diapers.

Speaking to journalists in Kilifi town, Kelvin Anungo, alias “Diaperman,” said the move was prompted by the rising cases of indiscriminate disposal of diapers in rivers and open spaces.

“We have witnessed an increase in the improper disposal of diapers, especially in rivers and open areas, which has greatly contributed to environmental pollution,” said Anungo.

He explained that to demonstrate the magnitude of the problem and sensitize the community on proper disposal practices, he recently conducted an exercise that collected 2.2 tonnes of used diapers within 72 hours.

“Out of the 2.2 tons collected, about 1.5 tons was human waste. This shows how serious the situation is and why we must act urgently,” he said.

Anungo warned that improper disposal of diapers poses a significant public health risk, particularly during the rainy season.

“When it rains, the waste is washed into water sources and residential areas, increasing the risk of disease outbreaks,” he cautioned.

The Public Health Officer faulted diaper manufacturing companies for failing to provide clear disposal guidelines to consumers.

“Manufacturers must take greater responsibility by giving strict guidelines on proper disposal and supporting waste management initiatives,” he added.

He also called on county governments to collaborate with the national government to acquire incinerators for safe disposal of diaper waste because improper disposal leads to land degradation.

“Incinerators will provide a sustainable solution to this growing menace and help protect our environment because these diapers take over 400 years to decompose and even when burnt they do not burn completely,” he said.

Anungo noted that the initiative would significantly reduce environmental degradation, particularly in coastal areas, and urged stakeholders to develop policies and incentives to curb improper disposal of diapers.

Meanwhile, environmentalists led by Steven Otieno called on the government to formulate a policy framework compelling diaper manufacturers to take responsibility for

post-consumer waste.

“We need a clear policy that holds manufacturers accountable for the waste generated by their products,” said Otieno.

Residents led by Amina Mwaruwa appealed to the municipality to increase designated waste disposal sites.

“We urge the municipality to allocate more dumping sites and provide a permanent solution to this challenge, especially during the rainy season when disease outbreaks are common,” said Mwaruwa.

However, Kilifi Municipality Manager Mwango Kalu urged residents to utilize designated collection points for disposal of used diapers.

“It has been a great challenge even to our municipality officers on the ground. Residents must dispose of diapers in designated areas to enable efficient collection by municipal officials,” said Kalu.

He emphasized the need for joint efforts among manufacturers, government agencies and the community to address environmental pollution linked to diaper waste.

# Government unveils Sh3bn plan to revamp Nairobi's aging water infrastructure

Over 300,000 residents in Nairobi's western corridor are set to benefit from improved access to clean, safe and reliable water supply, as well as enhanced sanitation services, following the signing of the Western Nairobi Water and Sewerage Project contract at the Athi Water Works Development Agency (AWWDA).

Funded in partnership with the French Development Agency (AFD) to the tune of Sh3 billion, the project seeks to address long-standing infrastructure gaps in some of the city's fastest-growing areas while strengthening Nairobi's urban water security.

Speaking during the contract signing, the Chief Executive Officer of Athi Water Works Development Agency, Eng. Joseph Kamau, said the project is part of the government's broader commitment to ensuring sustainable and equitable water and sanitation services for all.

"The project builds on the gains made by the Northern Collector Tunnel to optimize storage infrastructure and strengthen bulk transmission capacity within Nairobi Metropolitan. "By expanding trans-

mission lines, increasing storage and extending sewer networks, we are improving network stability and preparing the system to meet growing demand. Our priority is disciplined implementation, adherence to technical standards and delivery within the 24-month timeline," said Eng. Kamau.

The Western Nairobi Water and Sewerage Project will serve residents in Kangemi, Kawangware, Dagoretti and Riruta and will extend to the growing areas of Uthiru, Kinoo and Karen Plains, as well as Kabiria, Ngando and Kirigu. These areas have experienced rapid urban growth, placing increased pressure on existing water and sewerage infrastructure.

The project, awarded to the Joint Venture of Zhongmei Engineering Group and Hunan Construction Investment includes the construction of a 19.7-kilometre high-capacity transmission pipeline from Kabete to Olesereni. A 5,500 cubic metre reinforced concrete storage tank will also be constructed in Karen to stabilize pressure and enhance water distribution across the western corridor.

In addition to the water supply component, the project will deliver 63 kilometres of sewer reticulation network to improve sanitation services for approximately 250,000 residents.

The upgraded sewer system is expected to reduce public health risks.

## County rolls out solar energy initiative in low income homes

# IFAD plans expansion of projects across four ASAL counties

The International Fund for Agricultural Development (IFAD) is seeking additional funding amounting to \$54 million to finance its projects in four arid and semi-arid lands (ASAL) counties.

IFAD Country Director Mariatu Kamara stated that the funding is intended to improve and upscale existing programmes under the Kenya Livestock Commercialization Project (KELCOP) in areas where they have not been effectively implemented.

Speaking during a courtesy call on Baringo County Commissioner Stephen Kutwa, the Country Director said that if the funds are approved in September this year, they will also be used to increase the number of wards and counties covered by IFAD. Ms Kamara said that the IFAD mission is visiting the counties of Nakuru, Marsabit, Baringo and Samburu to review and understand the challenges farmers face to enable the organization to do additional funding for the ongoing and new projects.

"The review which the mission has already carried out in the county of Nakuru is being done in order to understand the challenges benefiting farmers face. We are also collecting their views

from the respective communities on how best to implement the projects located in their areas," the Country Director stated.

She pointed out that among the projects being implemented under the five year KELCOP programme operating in ten counties of Kenya and specifically in smallholding and commercialization projects include drilling of boreholes, pasture growing, poultry keeping and apiculture.

The officials in the mission delegation included Director of Livestock Production Bishar Elmi and KELCOP Project Coordinator Dr Moses Kembe.

The KELCOP project, which is funded by IFAD in conjunction with the national government, is one of the key drivers of the Bottom-up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), by transforming traditional livestock rearing into commercialized climate-resilient systems. The County Commissioner in his remarks thanked IFAD for initiating critical projects especially in water scarce areas of the county aimed at improving value addition in the livestock chain.

**KELCOP project is one of the key drivers of BottomUp Economic Agenda**

Kutwa added that his office was glad to collaborate with IFAD in ensuring that the identified projects were implemented successfully through close supervision.

Governor Benjamin Cheboi who hosted the IFAD delegation in his office expressed his appreciation for the noble initiative saying that if possible 20 more boreholes should be done particularly in areas experiencing acute water scarcity to assist in growing more pasture to mitigate the effects of drought.

Cheboi noted the impact of development partners like Kelcop who have invested in infrastructure, disease control and market access for farmers is so immense saying that improvement in livestock chain last year saw farmers selling a record 8,300 goats during the annual Kimalel Goat Auction.

The governor, flanked by his deputy Eng Felix Kimaiyo and Agriculture County Executive Committee Member Risper Chepkonga called for more partners to chip in and support farmers in areas such as water accessibility and capacity building on best management practices to ensure increase in productivity.

The IFAD project in the country which started in March 2021 is expected to come to an end in March 2027.

# Fish farmers call for more support in aquaculture

Farmers under the Namalenge Irrigation Project in Matayos Sub-County have urged both the county and national governments to increase investment in fish farming.

Speaking after harvesting four tonnes of fish, the project's chairman, Melitus Odongo, said the success of the initiative demonstrates the need for greater government support, particularly in the provision of fingerlings, fish feed, and the construction of additional ponds.

"We have harvested four tonnes of fish and, based on the feeding program, we expect to sell each kilogram at between Sh350 and Sh400. This is not an individual project but a community initiative that benefits many families," said Odongo.

He noted that fish farming has created employment opportunities for young people and improved household incomes, enabling families to meet their basic needs.

Odongo also called on residents living near wetlands to embrace aquaculture, either individually or through groups, in order to attract government support.

"Let us form groups and establish fish ponds so that we can access

support from both levels of government. Fish farming is one way of achieving self-sustainability and improving our livelihoods," he added.

Phylis Makokha, a farmer at the project, said the irrigation scheme has transformed their lives by ensuring constant water supply for both fish farming and crop production.

"This project has given us an opportunity to sustain ourselves. Apart from fish farming, we grow vegetables because of the reliable water supply. From the fish harvest, we are able to pay school fees and cater for our daily needs," she said. Makokha challenged women in the area to take an active role in aquaculture, saying it is a viable and profitable venture. "As women, we should come together

in groups and engage in fish farming. It will help us become financially independent. The county government should continue supporting women and encourage more to join because the returns are good," she said.

Busia County Director for Climate Change Dan Opilio said the Sh15 million Namalenge Irrigation Project is funded under the Financing Locally Led Climate Action (FLLoCA) programme, supported by the World Bank in partnership with the county and national governments.

"This project is meant to empower the local community and improve resilience to climate change. Today's fish harvest is a clear indication the project is achieving its objective," said Opilio.

# Schools in Lamu to get access to learning materials without internet

Shela Primary School in Lamu County is set to become the first in the coastal region to adopt a digital library system, enabling learning without internet access. Students and teachers at Shela Primary can now access Wikipedia and thousands of educational resources offline, thanks to the installation of Kiwix for Schools, a digital library system designed for use without an internet connection.

The initiative, launched this week by Knowledge Empowering Youth (KEY) Libraries in partnership with Wikimedia Kenya and Kiwix, comes

as Wikipedia celebrates its 25th anniversary as the world's largest free online encyclopedia.

Kiwix is a software application that stores digital content offline, allowing users to browse Wikipedia and other educational materials on local devices without requiring internet connectivity that is a critical feature in areas like Lamu where internet access remains limited and unreliable. "The lack of Internet access should not be seen as an impassable barrier to internet content," Gladys Kerich, Programs Manager, KEY Libraries stated. The programme included hands-on training ses-

sions for teachers at Shela Primary, equipping them with skills to integrate Wikipedia into their classroom instruction. During the function teachers learned how to use the platform to support digital literacy, guide pupil research, teach fact-checking, and increase learner engagement across subjects.

Kerich also emphasized the role of libraries in supporting education in under-served communities. "Libraries are at the heart of student learning, strengthening both educational outcomes and the communities students are part of, especially in under-served areas," she said.

# Mathioya Junior Secondary Schools adopt portable science laboratories

Public Junior Secondary Schools (JSS) in Mathioya Constituency have received a major boost in science education through the introduction of mobile laboratory units designed to support practical lessons under the Competency-Based Education (CBE) curriculum. Since the rollout of CBE, many JSS centers—most of which are housed within primary schools—have struggled to deliver quality science instruction due to the lack of fully equipped laboratories. As a result, learners have often had to walk to neighboring secondary schools for practical lessons, disrupting schedules and limiting hands-on experience. The newly introduced

mobile laboratory units provide a practical and immediate solution. Unlike conventional laboratories that require permanent buildings, these units are portable, fully equipped science workstations that can be easily moved from one classroom to another within a school. Each unit contains all the essential apparatus needed for CBE-aligned practical lessons. Speaking during the rollout on Tuesday, Elijah Poshenei, chairperson of the School Equipment Production Unit, noted that a single mobile laboratory unit is sufficient to serve an entire school. He explained that CBE places strong emphasis on practical learning, making such innovations critical for schools that have yet to establish permanent laboratories. “This unit can be used by one class in the morning, moved to another mid-morning,



and still serve a different group later in the day,” Poshenei said, adding, “It is fully equipped, and teachers require minimal preparation to conduct practical lessons.” He emphasized that the initiative is part of broader efforts within the education sector to ensure that lack of infrastructure does not compromise the quality of learning. The project has been championed by Mathioya MP Edwin Mugo Gichuki, who explained that the decision to adopt mobile laboratory units was driven by both cost considerations and urgency. According to the MP, setting up conventional laboratories would cost millions of shillings and take years to complete. “Each unit costs about

Sh250,000, which is far more affordable than constructing a full laboratory,” He said. Mugo continued “Using the National Government-Constituency Development Fund, we have ensured that 20 selected primary schools in Mathioya each receive their own complete lab unit.” Mugo described the move as a smart, cost-effective intervention that allows schools to conduct science practicals immediately without waiting for long-term infrastructure projects. The initiative has also received support from Yusuf Ndumo, chairperson of the NG-CDF Board, who noted that many schools across the country still lack adequate learning facilities. He said that since the fund’s establishment 20 years ago, more than 3,000 new schools have been set up, many of which require support to become fully functional. “Even older schools still have gaps in infrastructure. NG-CDF has played a key role in constructing classrooms, dormitories and laboratories and innovations like these mobile units help bridge remaining gaps,” Ndumo remarked.

The Ministry of Health and the Ministry of Education have established a joint task force to align existing health training programs with national priorities. This follows a high-level strategic meeting hosted by Health Cabinet Secretary (CS) Aden Duale and attended by Education CS Julius Ogamba. The task force will map current training programs against national health needs, recommend immediate reforms, and develop a clear implementation roadmap with defined milestones aimed at strengthening the country's health workforce.

The engagement emphasized

ensuring that Kenya's health training systems produce skilled professionals capable of delivering the constitutional right to the highest attainable standard of health under Article 43(1)(a). This marks a significant step toward aligning training outputs with national healthcare demands.

Discussions also highlighted ongoing health sector reforms under the Universal Health Coverage (UHC) agenda, including the Digital Superhighway initiative, which is integrating health services nationwide to enhance delivery and address the challenge of unqualified medical practitioners within the system.

Equally, the meeting underscored the central role of human



resources for health as the backbone of sector expansion and a shared responsibility between

the health and education sectors. Participants explored sustainable strategies to support

training institutions in designing and delivering programmes that reflect the country's disease burden and service delivery priorities.

The initiative is aligned with the Government's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), which prioritizes equitable healthcare delivery and the accelerated nationwide implementation of Universal Health Coverage.

Principal Secretaries Mary Muthoni (Public Health and Professional Standards) and Beatrice Muganda (Higher Education and Research), Director-General for Health Dr Patrick Amoth, and technical heads from both Ministries also attended the meeting.

## West Pokot launches new model to transform small scale farming

West Pokot County has stepped up efforts to modernize its agricultural sector, unveiling 140 agripreneurs in a bold push to strengthen agribusiness and boost food system resilience.

Agriculture Principal Secretary Dr. Paul Rono and his Public Works counterpart, Joel Arumonyang, flanked by Deputy Governor Robert Komolle, attended the launch event, which brought together national and county leaders, development partners, and local stakeholders.

The Food Systems Resilience Project (FSRP), a six-year initiative running from January 2024 to August 2029, is funded by the World Bank through the Ministry of Agriculture and Livestock Development (MoALD). It aligns with the broader objectives of

the World Bank-supported Food Systems Resilience Programme, which is being implemented across the 47 counties in Kenya to modernize agriculture and transition smallholder farmers from subsistence to commercial, climate-smart farming.

The initiative marks a significant milestone in the county's journey to empower farmers, strengthen agribusiness enterprises, and expand economic opportunities for youth and women.

The Agripreneur Business Acceleration Model is built on a business-oriented approach to farming. Rather than relying solely on traditional extension systems, the model nurtures independent agripreneurs, who operate as private, sustainable enterprises offering fee-based or commission-based services to farmers.

Through this structure, agripreneurs become crucial intermediaries within the agricultural ecosystem.

They provide advisory and training services on Good Agricultural Practices (GAP) and climate-smart technologies, connect farmers to quality inputs such as certified seeds and fertilizers and link producers

to reliable markets to minimize post-harvest losses.

The model also integrates digital solutions including the Know Your Farmer (KYF) platform, which enables farmer registration, GPS mapping, data collection and production tracking.

This digital integration enhances transparency, planning, and response to emerging issues

such as pests and diseases. The programme targets key agricultural value chains that are critical to West Pokot's economy including dairy, poultry, red meat, aquaculture, indigenous vegetables, potatoes, apiculture and drought-tolerant crops such as sorghum, green grams, and beans.

By accelerating value addition and improving productivity along these chains, the county is positioning agriculture as a sustainable driver of economic growth and resilience.

Agripreneurs are also trained to facilitate access to financial services, working closely with SACCOs and cooperatives to help farmers secure credit and loans necessary for expansion.

They also undergo intensive training in digital tools, business management and technical agricultural skills before deployment. The initiative prioritizes youth and women, creating meaningful employment, while building a new generation of agribusiness leaders.

Unlike short-term support programs, the model is designed to be self-sustaining.

# PS commends Treasury teams for timely mid-term report submission

The Principal Secretary (PS) for Public Investments and Asset Management, Cyrell Odede Wagunda, has reaffirmed the National Treasury's commitment to sustaining and enhancing high performance standards under the current Performance Contract cycle.

During a high-level consultative meeting on the 2nd Performance Contract Cycle Mid-Year Review for the Financial Year 2025/2026 for the National Treasury and Economic Planning, held at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC) in Nairobi, the PS commended departments and units within the National Treasury for the timely preparation and submission of the FY 2025/26 Ministerial Performance Contract mid-term report.

Additionally, Wagunda emphasized the importance of maintaining strong evidentiary documentation to support reported achievements, underscoring this as a critical element in performance evaluation.

In remarks delivered on his behalf by the Director General for Public Private Partnerships Kenya, Eng. Kefa Seda, the PS also acknowledged the vital role of technical staff in driving results and called on supervisors to

provide the necessary support to ensure the successful realization of set targets.

He highlighted the collective responsibility shared across the three State Departments under the National Treasury, stressing the need for close collaboration and coordinated efforts in delivering on ministerial objectives.

“Performance and Delivery

Management is a structured approach to planning, monitoring, evaluating, and reporting on institutional results to ensure achievement of Performance Contract (PC) targets,” explained Wagunda, adding that it provides a framework through which Ministries, Departments, and Agencies (MDAs) translate national priorities into measurable outputs

and outcomes, while strengthening accountability, transparency, and service delivery.

He observed that at the core of effective performance management is clear target setting and alignment, noting that Annual Performance Contracts cascade national development priorities, Cabinet decisions, and ministerial mandates into specific, measurable, achievable, relevant, and time-bound (SMART) targets.

“These targets must be clearly communicated to all implementing units and officers to ensure institutional alignment and shared ownership of results,” urged the PS. Equally, Wagunda maintained that continuous monitoring and tracking of progress is essential to maintaining compliance, insisting that institutions are required to establish internal monitoring mechanisms, including periodic performance reviews, data validation processes, and milestone tracking systems.

He added that regular internal reviews—monthly or quarterly—enable early identification of performance gaps and allow timely corrective action before mid-year and annual evaluations.

On the other hand, the PS pointed out that evidence-based reporting is a critical requirement in PC evaluation stressing that all reported achievements must be

supported by credible, verifiable, and well-documented evidence in line with PC guidelines.

“Proper record keeping, data integrity, and documentation of outputs, outcomes, and impact indicators are fundamental to sustaining high performance ratings. Institutions must ensure that evidence is organized, accessible, and aligned to each specific target,” he outlined. In addition, the PS mentioned that leadership and supervisory support significantly influence performance outcomes. He highlighted that senior management is responsible for providing strategic direction, mobilizing resources, removing bottlenecks, and fostering a performance-oriented culture.

“Supervisors must actively guide technical teams, ensure clarity of roles and responsibilities, and promote accountability at all levels,” urged the PS.

Wagunda also stated that risk management and mitigation planning further strengthen compliance, emphasizing that institutions should proactively identify operational, financial, and external risks that may hinder achievement of targets and develop mitigation strategies.

He directed that escalation mechanisms should be in place to address challenges requiring higher-level intervention.

The Children Act, 2022, gives effect to Article 53 of the Constitution that provides for the rights of each child. Every child has a right-

- to a name and nationality from birth;
- to free and compulsory basic education;
- to basic nutrition, shelter, and healthcare;
- to be protected from abuse, neglect, harmful cultural practices, all forms of violence, inhuman treatment and punishment, and hazardous or exploitative labor;
- to parental care and protection, which includes equal responsibility of the mother and father to provide for the child, whether they are married to each other or not; and
- not to be detained.

Section 12 (7) of the Children Act 2022 establishes the Child Welfare Fund to realize the right guaranteed in Article 43(3) of the Constitution with respect to all reasonable expenses incurred in a child's welfare. The State Department for Children's Services shall administer the Fund through coordination with the National Council for Children's Services

Accordingly, a Multi-Agency Taskforce composed of officers drawn from the State Department for Children Services, National Council for Children's Services, the Office of the Attorney General & Department of Justice and the National Treasury has now finalized preparing the draft Public Finance Management (Child Welfare Fund) Regulations, 2026

The draft Public Finance Management (Child Welfare Fund) Regulations, 2026, the Explanatory Memorandum, and the Regulatory Impact Statement have been prepared and posted on the National Treasury website <http://www.treasury.go.ke>.

# Kenya shifts to quality-based payments in dairy

Kenya's dairy sector has long been celebrated as one of the largest in Africa, contributing nearly four percent to the country's Gross Domestic Product (GDP) and supporting over 2 million livelihoods. Yet, despite its size, the sector has historically focused on production volumes rather than the quality of milk delivered.

That paradigm is now shifting, ushering in a new era where value, not volume, defines success. At the heart of this transformation is the Quality-Based Payment (QBP) system.

Livestock Development Principal Secretary Jonathan Mueke, speaking during a farmers' training session in Meru and Tharaka Nithi Counties, explained that unlike traditional frameworks that rewarded farmers solely on liters delivered, QBP ties earnings to milk quality.

"These milestones were not ordinary achievements. They reflected the dairy sector's strategic shift from prioritizing volume to emphasizing value, where quality forms the foundation of farmer incomes and market competitiveness," said Mueke.

Under the QBP system, farmers' milk will now be assessed based on butterfat and protein content, hygiene and safety standards, absence of adulteration, and low bacterial counts. The model incentivizes better feeding practices, investment in superior breeds, and improved herd management.

"At the moment, two of our milk processors in the country have adopted the QBP system while 12 others, including Meru, are ready for adoption. The two are already enjoying prices above Sh65 per liter due to the quality of their milk," Mueke added.

The system's ripple effects include higher incomes for farmers, reduced losses from rejected milk, and stronger motivation to adopt modern practices. Cooperatives benefit from improved intake quality, reduced spoilage, and enhanced market positioning, while processors gain higher yields for premium products like yoghurt, butter, ghee, cheese, and ice cream, boosting competitiveness both locally and internationally.

During the event, Meru Central Dairy Cooperative Union received ISO Certification from the Kenya Bureau of Standards (KEBS), underscoring the sector's commitment to global standards.

Kenya Dairy Board Managing Director William Maritim highlighted the importance of compliance. "The certificate is very expensive and you must now change your mind on what you normally do to abide by it and conform to its standards. Deliberate efforts should be put on livestock movement control to avoid foot and mouth disease, or else our dairy will collapse," he warned.

Meru Dairy Cooperative Union Chief Executive Officer Kenneth Gitonga urged managers and chairpersons to uphold milk standards. "It is the policy of our union that we don't want to waste time in court cases for failure of compliance. We comply quickly and then we go to do business because all we want is money," he said.

Mueke further added that under the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA), the government aims to double milk production, expand exports, increase value addition, and create sustainable jobs.

"Achieving these goals hinges on prioritizing quality. The future of Kenya's dairy sector will be defined not only by production volumes, but by the quality standards achieved across the value chain," he said, expressing confidence that farmers, cooperatives, and processors embracing reforms will transform the industry into a modern, export-ready powerhouse.

## New facility to boost food preservation at Kitengela market

Traders at Kitengela Market in Kajiado County are set to benefit from improved food preservation methods following the launch of a solar-powered cold storage facility aimed at reducing post-harvest losses and strengthening livelihoods. The project was initiated by

the Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TİKA) in Nairobi, in partnership with Food Banking Kenya and the Kajiado County Government.

It draws inspiration from the Zero Waste Programme championed by Türkiye's First Lady, Emine Erdoğan.

In a speech read by Environment Secretary, Selly Jemutai Kimosop, on behalf

of Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change and Forestry, Deborah Mlongo Barasa, the CS said that the initiative demonstrates how climate action can begin at the community level while delivering tangible economic benefits.


"The facility is expected to play a key role in strengthening Kenya's food systems by helping farmers and traders preserve fresh produce, improve quality, and secure better returns for their labour. It also enhances resilience to climate change and supports the country's food

security agenda," said the CS. According to the ministry, Kenya loses between 30 and 40 per cent of its fresh produce annually due to inadequate storage and weak cold chain systems.

These losses translate into reduced incomes for farmers, higher food prices for consumers, and wastage of critical resources such as water, energy, land, and labour.

While appreciating TİKA for its support, Kajiado County Governor Joseph Ole Lenku said the initiative will go a long way in sustaining local businesses.

## Kenya, Egypt expand cooperation on water, energy and pharmaceuticals

Kenya and Egypt have agreed to elevate their longstanding relations, with fresh commitments to expand cooperation in key sectors including trade, energy, water security, and regional stability.

Speaking during a joint media briefing at the Office of the Prime Cabinet Secretary and the Ministry of Foreign and Diaspora Affairs headquarters in Nairobi, Prime Cabinet Secretary and Cabinet Secretary (CS) for Foreign and Diaspora Affairs Musalia Mudavadi emphasized that Kenya values its long-standing and historic relationship with the Arab Republic of Egypt. Mudavadi welcomed his Egyptian counterpart, Badr Abdelatty, noting that diplomatic relations between the two countries date back to 1964 and have steadily expanded across political, economic, defense and social sectors. He recalled

the January 2025 State Visit to Cairo by President William Ruto, during which Kenya and Egypt elevated their ties to a Strategic and Comprehensive Partnership under the leadership of President Abdel Fattah el-Sisi.

During that visit, the two governments signed 12 bilateral agreements covering trade and investment, education, ICT, maritime affairs, space cooperation, housing, governance, youth empowerment and sustainable development.

"I commend the progress made by our respective ministries in establishing sectoral working groups to spearhead implementation," expressed Mudavadi, adding that a mid-term review is planned to assess progress and refine priorities ahead of a proposed State Visit by President el-Sisi to Kenya later this year. On trade and investment, the Prime CS emphasized the need to create an enabling environment

for businesses and fast-track the establishment of a Kenya-Egypt Joint Business Council.

"We encourage our private sectors to leverage synergies, diversify trade products and address trade facilitation inefficiencies to unlock economic resilience and shared prosperity," he urged. On his part, the Egyptian Minister of Foreign Affairs Badr Abdelatty described Kenya as his 'second home' and hailed the bilateral relationship as a model of African fraternity and cooperation.

He also disclosed that President el-Sisi personally oversees efforts to expand ties beyond politics into trade, culture and investment.

"The volume of trade between our two countries reached approximately \$567 million in 2024. This is not enough for the capabilities of Kenya and Egypt. We would like to double this trade volume in the coming years," stated Abdelatty.

# Kenya strengthens fight against plastic pollution

BY CHRISTINE CHERYL

Kenya has launched the Plastic Circular Investment Initiative (PCII) to fast-track implementation of Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) regulations and unlock financing for plastic waste management.

The initiative aims to convert policy commitments into bankable circular economy projects by mobilizing private capital and strengthening regulatory systems.

Speaking during the launch, Dr. Festus Ng'eno, Principal Secretary of the State Department for Environment and Climate Change, said the initiative comes at a crucial time as Kenya transitions toward a modern, accountable, and investment-driven circular economy.

"The EPR regulation requires producers to take responsibility for their products throughout their lifecycle and ensures that

plastic waste is not left solely to governments or communities," said the PS.

He highlighted that Kenya generates close to one million tonnes of plastic waste annually, yet only about 8 percent is recycled, while collection rates remain relatively low.

Ng'eno urged producers, regulators, and consumers to share responsibility for collecting, recycling, and reintegrating materials into the economy.

"Plastic waste should not only be viewed as an environmental challenge but also as an economic opportunity," the PS said.

He added that with the right investments, innovation, and partnerships, plastic waste can be transformed into a valuable resource.

"This transformation can support green industries, create jobs for youth and women, and strengthen local value chains," he said.

Ms. Nagnouma Kone,

Manager for Africa Strategy and Partnerships at the Global Green Growth Institute (GGGI), said the PCII is designed to bridge the gap between regulatory ambition and financial execution.

"Kenya has made bold legislative progress, but policies alone do not transform systems. Fees must translate into functioning infrastructure and ambition must translate into investment," she said.

"Through the Sustainable Waste Management Act of 2022 and the EPR Regulations of 2024, Kenya is taking a historic step away from the traditional linear 'take-make-dispose' model and moving toward a circular economy where waste becomes valuable," she added.

Ms. Koné observed that while Kenya has demonstrated regional leadership in environmental governance, implementation challenges remain, including

evolving EPR structures, limited investment-ready project pipelines, capacity gaps among PROs and the need for strengthened digital data systems.

"If these structural gaps are not addressed, private capital will remain hesitant and statutory recycling targets may not be fully realized," she said.

"This is not just environmental reform. It is an economic opportunity, a functioning circular economy creates jobs,

reduces pollution, strengthens value chains, supports small and medium enterprises and enhances Kenya's competitiveness." Ms Kone added.

Kang Hyung-Shik, Ambassador of the Republic of Korea and host of the GGGI headquarters, affirmed the initiative's value, highlighting that it provides a valuable opportunity to raise public awareness.

"Korea strongly recognizes the impacts of plastic pollution and is actively

working with Kenya, the Global Green Growth Institute (GGGI), and the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) through international partnerships to address this issue and promote sustainable solutions.

"This launch is therefore not merely the beginning of a project it represents a shared commitment among governments, development partners, investors, and entrepreneurs to accelerate systemic change," he said.

# KRA onboards over 500 fuel stations onto eTIMS fuel

Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) has onboarded over 500 fuel stations onto the Electronic Tax Invoice Management System (eTIMS) fuel module which represent approximately 16 percent of fuel stations nationwide following its rollout in December 2025.

According to the Authority, the eTIMS Fuel Module is designed to provide end-to-end visibility of petroleum transactions,

from importation through distribution to final retail sale, thereby strengthening tax compliance and ensuring equity across the petroleum value chain.

Speaking at Be Energy Ruai, in Nairobi, the KRA Acting Deputy Commissioner for Large Taxpayers' Office, Ezekiel Obura noted that revenue collection within the sector is expected to grow by double digits following the full implementation of the module.

"The system integrates

seamlessly with import records and the VAT administration framework, enabling automatic reconciliation of physical fuel volumes against declared sales volumes and corresponding tax positions," stated Obura.

He urged the public to embrace the culture of requesting for eTIMS receipts after every fuel purchase, and encouraged fuel stations that are yet to on-board to comply, noting that KRA is ready to facilitate on boarding and engage

with the sector, to cushion enforcement measures.

The Dep. Commissioner further added that all Oil Marketing Companies (OMCs) have now been domiciled at the Large Taxpayers to enable closer monitoring, faster issue resolution and tailored compliance support.

Similarly, Obura highlighted that the implementation of the eTIMS fuel station solution is undertaken in close collaboration with key stakeholders, including Energy and Petro-

leum Regulatory Authority (EPRA), Petroleum Institute of East Africa (PIEA), Petroleum Outlets Association of Kenya (POAK) and United Energy & Petroleum Association (UNIPEA), to ensure that regulatory, operational and industry realities are fully addressed.

Concurrently, KRA Chief Manager, eTIMS Office, Hakamba Wangwe, emphasized that the module forms part of KRA's broader strategy to simplify tax processes through digital platforms. "The eTIMS Fuel Stations

Module is a game changer for tax compliance and transparency. It simplifies the tax process for taxpayers and enhances oversight for the Authority, supporting Kenya's broader goal of a fully digital, efficient and accountable tax system," Wangwe explained.

She added that fuel is a controlled commodity with regulated pricing and structured supply chains, and through the module, KRA is leveraging data integration such as import data and pricing.

# Registry to secure fair distribution of carbon trading revenues in Kenya

Kenya has officially launched its National Carbon Registry, marking a significant milestone in strengthening transparency, accountability, and investor confidence in the country's rapidly expanding carbon market.

The registry was unveiled during a ceremony presided over by Deborah Barasa, Cabinet Secretary for Environment, Climate Change, and Forestry, who underscored its importance in cementing Kenya's position as a credible participant in international carbon markets under Article 6 of the Paris Agreement.

"With the launch of the Kenya National Carbon Registry, we give Kenya's green economy a digital heartbeat. From today, Kenya is no longer a spectator in international carbon markets. We step forward as architects of our own climate destiny," Dr. Barasa affirmed.

She noted that the registry will eliminate double counting of carbon credits, enhance transparency in transactions, and ensure that revenues generated from carbon trading benefit local communities while safeguarding national interests.

"As we operationalize the registry, we send a clear signal to investors and the international community that Kenya is ready to participate in carbon markets with integrity, transparency, and credibility," she said, urging stakeholders to partner responsibly in unlocking the full potential of carbon markets.

Ali Daud Mohamed, Special Envoy for Climate Change in the Executive Office of the President,

described the registry as laying a strategic foundation for credibility and growth within Kenya's carbon market ecosystem.

"As carbon market activities expand rapidly, this registry becomes the backbone of an efficient system tracking projects, issued units, transfers and adjustments, and strengthening trust in Kenya as a reliable market administrator," he said.

Amb. Daud emphasised the

importance of interoperability with leading international standards, including Verra and Gold Standard, to position Kenya competitively in the global carbon market. He called for clear procedures, predictable timelines and sustained engagement with project developers and investors.

Principal Secretary for Environment and Climate Change, Festus Ngeno, said Kenya has built a comprehensive legal and

institutional framework over the past three years to support the carbon market.

This includes amendments to the Climate Change Act, operationalisation of carbon market regulations, and designation of the National Environment Management Authority (NEMA) as the Designated National Authority (DNA).

"The registry is the heartbeat that makes the Climate Change

Act and the regulatory framework come alive," he said, urging project developers to liaise closely with NEMA to ensure compliance and efficient implementation.

Principal Secretary for Forestry Gitonga Mugambi noted that the new system builds on the earlier REDD+ forestry sector registry, ensuring interoperability within Kenya's broader carbon accounting architecture.

"This system prevents double counting, strengthens alignment with Kenya's Nationally Determined Contribution, and enhances transparency for both Article 6 and voluntary carbon market transactions," he stated, encouraging stakeholders to leverage carbon markets as a sustainable economic opportunity for communities and the country.

European Union Ambassador to Kenya Henriette Geiger described the launch as a milestone not only for Kenya but for the continent, emphasising that robust national systems are essential to building investor confidence and safeguarding environmental integrity. "The functioning national carbon registry is the backbone of integrity. It ensures transparency, prevents double counting and strengthens compliance with Article 6 of the Paris Agreement," she said, reaffirming the European Union's continued support for Kenya's green transition.

Head of Cooperation at the Embassy of the Federal Republic of Germany, Maren Kneller, commended Kenya for demonstrating leadership in establishing credible carbon market systems and reiterated Germany's support in strengthening institutional capacity, governance and market credibility.

NEMA reaffirmed its commitment to implementing its statutory mandate to ensure carbon market activities deliver real, measurable and sustainable outcomes that benefit communities and protect ecosystems.

## Kenya reviews maritime security blueprint to counter emerging threats

The State Department for Shipping and Maritime Affairs has mooted plans to review and update Kenya's National Maritime Security Risk Register.

The register serves as a strategic blueprint guiding the country's preparedness and response to emerging threats within its maritime domain.

The actors involved are drawn from key security and maritime institutions, including the Kenya Navy, Kenya Maritime Authority, Kenya Ports Authority, Kenya Forest Service, the National Intelligence Service, the National Police Service, and the Kenya Coast Guard Service.

The collaborative engagement signals a renewed whole-of-government approach to safeguarding Kenya's ports, territorial waters, inland waterways, and

coastal ecosystems amid evolving maritime threats. Chairing the meeting, Brig. M.S. Shemote of the Kenya Navy underscored the strategic importance of the Risk Register as a national security tool.

"The National Maritime Security Risk Register is our central reference framework for identifying, assessing and mitigating risks within Kenya's maritime space. As threats evolve from maritime crime to vulnerabilities in port infrastructure and operations, our risk assessment and mitigation strategies must remain dynamic and intelligence driven," said Brig. Shemote.

Contributors noted that the review process examined current risk ratings, assessed the effectiveness of existing mitigation measures and proposed updated control strategies to strengthen prevention, preparedness and

response capabilities across institutions.

Aziz Manda, from the National Intelligence Service, emphasized the critical role of coordinated intelligence and information sharing.

"Effective maritime domain awareness depends on intel-

ligence-led risk assessment, seamless inter-agency coordination and timely information exchange. No single agency can secure maritime space alone; it requires collective vigilance and unified action," noted Aziz.

Participants also highlighted the growing recognition that

maritime security extends beyond traditional defense concerns to encompass environmental protection, sustainable resource management and community resilience.

Officials reaffirmed that safeguarding critical coastal and marine ecosystems is integral to national security and economic stability, particularly as Kenya positions itself as a regional maritime and logistics hub.

The updated Risk Register is expected to guide strategic planning, operational coordination, policy development and resource allocation across the maritime sector. It will also bolster Kenya's compliance with international maritime security obligations while reinforcing national efforts to secure shipping lanes, ports and inland waters.

The State Department reiterated its leadership role in coordinating maritime governance and strengthening partnerships among agencies to ensure that Kenya's maritime domain remains secure, resilient and sustainable for present and future generations.

# Subuiga dam project to provide water to over 10,000 residents

More than 10,000 residents of Matunda, Ntumburi and Subuiga communities are set to gain improved access to clean and reliable water following the completion of the Subuiga Dam Community Water Project, a major initiative aimed at addressing persistent water shortages and supporting local livelihoods. The initiative was spearheaded by the Lewa Wildlife Conservancy in partnership with Kisima Farm and the Ngarenythig Water Resources Users Association (WRUA).

The dam, with a capacity of 150,000 cubic metres, was constructed between 2023 and 2025 to harvest rainwater that would otherwise go to waste. The project is expected to ease water scarcity in the area, improve household water access, and support small-

scale farming activities.

Kisima Farm supported the initiative by donating 12 acres of land on a 100-year lease to host the dam, demonstrating its long-term commitment to community development and sustainable resource management.

Phase one of water distribution has already been rolled out through a gravity-fed system. The infrastructure includes a two-kilometre pipeline, a 50-cubic-metre storage tank, and five distribution lines supplying surrounding villages.

Plans are underway to install a solar-powered pumping system to ensure households located uphill from the dam also benefit from the project. The additional investment is aimed at promoting equitable water access and ensuring no section of the community is left out.

Ngarenythig WRUA Chairman

Martin Dyer said the association played a key role in sensitising residents on water conservation, which informed the decision to pursue dam construction with funding support from Lewa Conservancy through its donors.

He noted that the WRUA is the first in Kenya to construct a dam of its kind and expressed optimism that the model can be replicated in other water-stressed regions across the country.

Lewa Wildlife Conservancy Chief Programs and Partnerships Officer John Kinoti emphasized the shared ownership of the project among the WRUA, Kisima Farm and Lewa, urging residents to safeguard the investment.

“We are urging communities to also embrace tree planting as part of environmental conservation so we can move together as a community,” said Kinoti.

## Ministry launches career guidance training for 24,000 school heads

The Government has rolled out a nationwide programme to train more than 24,000 heads of education and training institutions on career guidance, in a bid to tackle Kenya’s persistent youth unemployment crisis.

The National Career Guidance Capacity Building Sensitization Programme, unveiled by Labour and Skills Development Principal Secretary Shadrack Mwadime, targets leaders of primary and secondary schools across the country.

The initiative is designed to strengthen career guidance in the basic education sector and equip learners with the tools to navigate education and career choices in a rapidly evolving labour market.

Speaking during the virtual launch, Mwadime underscored the importance of career guidance in reducing skills mismatches, improving school-to-work transitions, and enhancing employability.

He noted that the programme would also support the reintegration of marginalized and at-risk groups into education and labour services.

“This effort is central to empowering learners to make meaningful choices about their education and future work,” Mwadime said. “By embedding career guidance into schools and professionalizing its delivery, we aim to mitigate risks associated

with unemployment, poverty, inequality, and vulnerability to crime and radicalization.”

The sensitization programme is organized by the State Department for Labour and Skills Development in collaboration with the State Department for Basic Education and the Teachers Service Commission.

It will introduce school leaders to the National Policy Framework on Career Guidance and the Guidelines for establishing Offices of Career Services (OCS).

“These instruments are designed to ensure that every school sets up an Office of Career Services, giving learners access to structured career education, counselling, and labour market information,” Mwadime explained. “This will enable them to make informed choices about their education, training, and future occupations.”

The rollout of the Competence-Based Curriculum (CBC) has heightened the urgency of career guidance, according to the PS.

The CBC introduces new learning pathways, tracks, and subjects, requiring learners to make decisions that will shape their future opportunities.

“We are committed to developing a robust and professionalized career guidance system that empowers individuals to manage their learning and career pathways within the context of a rapidly changing education, training, and labour market environment,” Mwadime said.

## CS rallies stakeholders to tackle Gender-Based Violence in Baringo

The Cabinet Secretary (CS) for Gender, Culture, and Children Services, Hanna Cheptumo, has called for concerted efforts from all stakeholders to address the alarming rate of Gender-Based Violence (GBV) in Baringo County.

Cheptumo made the appeal while presiding over the commissioning of a GBV recovery centre at Baringo County Referral Hospital in Kabarnet. She expressed concern over the troubling rise in cases of defilement, rape, femicide, and teenage pregnancies in the county.

Referring to a report by the Presidential Technical Working Group on GBV, the CS noted that 37.9 percent of women aged 15-49 had experienced physical violence. The report further indicated that in 2023 alone, 41 cases of rape

and 18 cases of femicide were recorded. Cheptumo, who was accompanied by Baringo County Governor Benjamin Cheboi and other officials, was also briefed that 32 girls in Baringo Central Sub-County had fallen victim to teenage pregnancies.

According to the CS, the report paints a grim picture of a county once known for its cultural values. She emphasized that it is high time all actors came together to cushion the vulnerable population.

“These are not just figures, they represent daughters whose futures were cut short, mothers whose lives were taken, children robbed off their innocence and families left in anguish,” she said.

Cheptumo while opening the one stop centre to support survivors in receiving medical care, forensic analysis, psychosocial counselling, legal representation

called for strengthened coordination between health facilities, police, judiciary, Office of Director of Public Prosecution, the judiciary, children services and community based structures.

Governor Cheboi acknowledged the challenge which he said is an eye opener to his administration to shift focus from medical treatment to investing in psychosocial counsellors who normally attend to the survivors of GBV. He added that his administration will work in handy with multi-sectoral agencies to arrest the situation.

# New land identified for families displaced by Mai Mahiu floods

The Government has moved to fulfil its promise to resettle families displaced by the devastating flash floods that struck Mai Mahiu villages in Nakuru County on April 29, 2024.

Under the initial plan, 230 acres have already been purchased in the Longonot area of Naivasha Sub-County, where 105 original landowners will be resettled and key infrastructure established.

During the tragic incident, more than 60 people died, while scores of others were left with life-long injuries and traumatic experiences after the floods destroyed their homes following the bursting of a blocked railway tunnel in the Upper Kijabe area.

According to Deputy President Prof. Kithure Kindiki, the State will also identify alternative land to resettle 56 families whose rented homes were equally destroyed by the floods, after concerns were raised that they had been left out of the initial plan.

“All landowners and tenants whose homes and businesses were destroyed by the floods will be provided with land to resettle and restart their livelihoods,” said Kindiki.

Prof. Kindiki who led government officials in the issuance of title deeds to the initial 105 families in Mai Mahiu said each family would also receive Sh20,000 support.

In addition, the Deputy President said the government was undertaking major infrastructure development in the region including modern markets, affordable housing and roads.

He said the construction of the multi-billion-dollar Rironi



to Mau Summit road would open up the region, ease perennial traffic gridlock with local youths expected to benefit from job opportunities.

On her part, Lands docket Cabinet Secretary Alice Wahome said all title deeds for the first batch of 105 families have been processed and would be issued promptly.

Wahome said the government is resettling all those who were affected by the deadly floods while dismissing politicization of the issue by a section of leaders.

Secretary for Lands said all those affected by the floods have been allocated their plots and issued with title deeds which would help them restart their lives after a two-year wait.

Equally, he said the government would fund the construction of key support infrastructure including markets, schools, and hospitals within the allocated land.

Nakuru Governor Susan Kihika welcomed the long-awaited process which brought a major relief to the families, lauding President William Ruto of fulfilling his commitment of resettling victims.

She added that the victims had endured measurable suffering after the flooding swept away their years of investments and livelihoods in seconds.

According to Bernard Kamau who lost two sons in the night of horror incident, the move to resettle families was long overdue noting that families have facing untold suffering for the last two years.

Kamau called for investigations to unearth the cause of the accident which left many nursing lifelong trauma noting that government officials who failed to undertake due diligence before the incident should be held accountable.

This was echoed by another victim Samson Njamba, the chair of the tenants association, who termed the resettlement as a move in the right direction and was optimistic that their case to be included for resettlement would be resolved.

Another victim, David Karanja, termed the resettlement as long overdue and called for more support in reconstructing their homes.

## Dongo Kundu SEZ attracts fresh investor interest from India

Investment in the Dongo Kundu Special Economic Zone (SEZ) has received a major boost after the Indian High Commissioner to Kenya pledged to mobilise more Indian investors to establish operations in the flagship project.

Last year, a lease agreement was signed between the African Export-Import Bank (Afreximbank), the Kenya Ports Authority, and the Special Economic Zones Authority (SEZA) for the development of the Dongo Kundu and Naivasha SEZs, strengthening Kenya’s industrialisation and export manufacturing agenda.

Afreximbank is financing the development of the two integrated industrial parks in line with the Bottom-Up Economic Transfor-

mation Agenda, with \$1 billion (approximately Sh128.5 billion) allocated for value-addition initiatives. High Commissioner of India to Kenya, Dr Adarsh Swaika, during an inspection of the 3,000-acre site, expressed satisfaction that an Indian firm is constructing the integrated industrial park. He noted that over 200 Indian companies have invested in Kenya, significantly contributing to the country’s economic development.

“They have invested in telecom, banking, automobiles, or Fast-Moving Consumer Goods. Indian companies are looking positively at the investment climate in Kenya, particularly with upcoming SEZs and EPZs. Dongo Kundu is one of the prime SEZs which the Government of

Kenya is focusing on,” said the High Commissioner.

He highlighted that the SEZ is strategically located near the Port of Mombasa, facilitating logistics operations, and stated that Indian investors are mainly interested in warehousing, pharmaceuticals, and textiles.

The High Commissioner also visited the state-of-the-art Revital Healthcare (EPZ) in Kilifi, describing it as a model win-win partnership between India and Kenya. “Machinery made in India, employment generated in Kenya, capital investment by an Indian of Kenyan origin,” he said.

SEZA CEO Dr Kenneth Chelule said Dongo Kundu is a prime hub of investments and emphasized efforts to attract more Indian companies to Kenya through the India and Kenya Chambers of Commerce.

Out of the 3,000 acres, 500 acres have been allocated to Arise, an Indian company, to construct an integrated industrial park, three acres to Taifa Gas, 20 acres to Revital, and 15 acres to Millyglass.

# KDC commits Sh 70 million to strengthen livestock value chains in Turkana, West Pokot

The Kenya Development Corporation (KDC) has invested Sh 70 million to boost livestock value chains in West Pokot and Turkana counties, in a move aimed at expanding access to affordable credit and strengthening pastoral economies.

The financing, delivered through the De-Risking, Inclusion and Value Enhancement (DRIVE) project, was presented to Eco Pillar Sacco during a ceremony attended by senior government officials and local leaders.

Abubakar, West Pokot County Governor Simon Kachapin, Principal Secretary for Public Works Joel Arumonyang, KDC Director General Norah Ratemo, and DRIVE Coordinator Maurice Ouma.

The facility is designed to catalyze investments across the livestock sector, enhance financial inclusion, and build resilience in communities where more than 80 percent of households depend on livestock and farming.

Recurring drought and climate variability have long threatened pastoral and agro-pastoral systems in the region. The KDC financing will provide affordable credit for livestock production, feed and fodder, animal health services, transport, and value addi-

tion activities such as milk, meat, hides, and leather processing.

Hassan said the initiative

reflects the Government's Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda, which prioritizes inclusive

growth in underserved regions.

"This is about delivering real solutions to real people in real time," he said. "West Pokot's economy is anchored on livestock production and this investment is about strengthening productivity, stabilizing incomes and building long-term resilience."

Governor Simon Kachapin pledged continued support for Saccos and local enterprises. "Through our combined efforts to expand access to credit, invest in trade infrastructure and strengthen local enterprises, we are creating sustainable opportunities for economic growth. We are empowering businesses and households, ensuring that the people of West Pokot prosper," he said.

KDC Director General Norah Ratemo confirmed that the first tranche of Sh 35 million has already been disbursed, reaching 170 farmers. Of these, 54 percent were youth and women.

"This facility is a practical tool to increase livestock productivity, boost incomes, and strengthen livelihoods. We are committed to ensuring that every shilling invested translates into measurable impact at the grassroots," Ratemo said.

Eco Pillar Sacco, which operates in West Pokot and Turkana counties, plays a critical role in bridging last-mile financial inclusion gaps. Its CEO, Linus Lokira, said demand for loan products has surged since the disbursement began.

formation journey.

Speaking during a partners' breakfast meeting in Nairobi, Eng Tanui expressed gratitude to stakeholders for their continued backing, noting that their contributions have been instrumental in advancing Africa's digital agenda.

The summit, scheduled for April 2026 at The Edge Convention Centre, will

bring together policymakers, technology leaders, innovators, and investors from across Africa and beyond. Organizers say it will serve as a key platform for policy dialogue, regional cooperation, and investment in digital infrastructure and services.

This year's theme, "Uniting Africa's Innovation for an Inclusive Digital Market," underscores the

need to place people at the center of digital transformation.

Eng Tanui emphasized that the summit's focus extends beyond technology platforms to job creation, improved governance, and expanded business opportunities.

"Africa's digital transformation is not about technology alone; it is about people," he said. "It

is about creating jobs for our youth, strengthening governance, and opening doors for businesses across the continent."

He noted that previous frameworks, including the Nairobi and Diani Declarations, laid the groundwork for continental collaboration. CAS 2026, he added, will shift emphasis to implementation.

"This is about turning

# State seeks partnerships to scale up irrigation

The government is turning to private sector partnerships to accelerate Farmer-Led Irrigation Development (FLID), a key pathway under the National Irrigation Sector Investment Plan (NISIP) 2025-2035, which aims to double the country's irrigated land to 1.5 million acres over the next decade.

Speaking during a consultative meeting with irrigation equipment suppliers in Nairobi, Principal Secretary for Irrigation CPA Ephantus Kimotho said Kenya has an irrigation potential of 3.5 million acres, half of which the government intends to bring under irrigation in the next 10 years.

He emphasized that private sector players are expected to contribute 61 percent of the investments required, with government providing the remaining 39 percent.

Kimotho underscored the urgency of scaling up irrigation, noting that Kenya imports food-related goods worth over USD 21 billion annually while exporting agricultural products worth only USD 10 billion, leaving an USD 11 billion deficit. "Enhanced investments in irrigation can reduce this deficit to five billion dollars," he said.

He added that 75 percent of agricultural production comes from smallholder farmers, 95 percent of whom rely on rain-fed agriculture.

Challenges such as lack of affordable irrigation systems, limited financing, inadequate knowledge, and poor market access continue to constrain productivity.

Despite agriculture contributing 24 percent of Kenya's GDP, the banking sector has invested only three percent into the industry, citing risks. Kimotho stressed the need to support smallholders through affordable technologies, accessible credit, and flexible repayment terms.

The government, in collaboration with the World Bank, is designing a Result-Based Financing (RBF) facility to address these challenges. The model is expected to provide incentives for private sector investment while ensuring farmers and suppliers benefit from cost-effective solutions.

"This result-based financing facility will provide the necessary impetus for the private sector to plug into irrigation and offers assurance to both farmers and irrigation equipment suppliers," Kimotho said.

The PS noted that the facility will empower smallholder farmers to adopt and manage their own irrigation technologies, boosting production and resilience.

World Bank Lead Water Resources Management Specialist Pieter Waalewijn expressed the institution's commitment to supporting the initiative. "Our support is premised on the fact that irrigation is not an end to itself but a means to job creation, building climate resilience and fostering rural development," he said.

Waalewijn added that while RBF is new to Kenya, lessons from global implementation will guide its rollout. He revealed that the World Bank is partnering with the Gates Foundation to design digital tools that simplify sales and rebates, reducing pro-

cessing time to just a few weeks.

Director of Farmer-Led Irrigation Development Daniel Odero said the RBF facility aims to empower 350,000 smallholder farmers with modern irrigation technologies, access to credit,

climate-smart solutions, and market linkages. The initiative requires KES 163 billion to put an additional 250,000 acres under irrigation.

"Today's conversation is geared towards fostering partnerships

between the public sector, private investors, equipment suppliers, digital service providers, and development partners to mobilize resources and expertise for a thriving irrigation sector," Kimotho said.





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# WRA launches customer mobile app for water use

The Water Resources Authority (WRA) has unveiled a new customer mobile application (pictured) designed to transform how Kenyans interact with water resource management services.

According to WRA CEO Mohamed Shurie, the innovation marks a significant milestone in the Authority's ongoing efforts to modernize service delivery, enhance transparency, and promote sustainable water use across the country.

For decades, the WRA has played a central role in regulating water use, issuing

authorizations, and granting permits for water works.

Shurie said that the launch of the mobile application directly addresses these challenges, offering a streamlined, user-friendly platform that places critical services at the fingertips of Kenyans.

The CDEO said that the application allows customers to apply for water permits, track the status of their applications, and access information on compliance requirements.

"By digitizing these processes, WRA is reducing the need for physical visits to offices, cutting down



on processing times, and ensuring that citizens can engage with water governance more efficiently," she said.

By making information readily available, Shurie pointed out that WRA empowers individuals,

communities, and businesses to make informed decisions about water use.

"Farmers can now quickly access guidelines on irrigation permits, industries can monitor compliance obligations, and households can better understand their rights and responsibilities under the Water Act," he said.

"This democratization of information is expected to foster greater accountability and encourage responsible water management practices."

In a country where water resources are under increasing pressure from

## New digital stamp duty platform to seal loopholes in land transactions

Land transactions across the country are set to become faster, more transparent and secure after the State Department for Lands and Physical Planning rolled out the National Stamp Duty Module (NSDM) nationwide.

The nationwide rollout demonstrates the Government's commitment to making land transactions faster, more transparent, and secure for all citizens, while strengthening revenue collection and safeguarding public trust.

The Director of the National Land Information Management System (NLIMS), Monica Obongo, highlighted the transformative impact of the system on land administration in Kenya. She explained that the module is designed to make stamp duty transactions fully digital, eliminate manual processes, and curb fraudulent activities that have long challenged the sector.

"By the end of February, manual stamp duty processing will be a thing of the past in Kenya. Every transaction must go through Ardhisasa, fully digital, fully traceable, and fully secure. Any title issued outside the system will be null and void. We are sealing revenue leakages, eliminating duplication, and permanently shutting the

door on fraud in land administration," said Obongo.

The NSDM is part of the Ardhisasa system, allowing property owners to pay stamp duty digitally through Ardhipay. Previously, these processes were largely manual, requiring physical document submissions, in-person valuation assessments, long queues, and multiple visits to Lands offices. This often caused delays, extra costs, and opportunities for fraud.

For 'Wanjiku', the NSDM offers significant benefits. Property buyers and sellers can now access assessment

services online, pay fees securely, and receive instant confirmation of transactions. The system reduces delays, saves time, and minimizes transport and administrative costs associated with manual processing. Obongo also noted that standardized valuation data ensures stamp duty is assessed fairly and accurately, protecting citizens from arbitrary charges and enhancing confidence in the land administration system. Faster property transfers enable individuals to unlock the value of their assets, facilitate investments, and improve access to credit.

The Government also benefits from the system. By automating assessments and integrating payments through secure digital channels, the NSDM prevents revenue leakages, improves compliance, and ensures all collected funds are properly accounted for.

The system generates real-time data that supports better planning, monitoring, and policy decisions. Integration with other government platforms enhances inter-agency coordination and aligns with Kenya's broader national digital transformation agenda.

## State distributes Sh2.5bn in grants to 121,800 youth under NYOTA programme

The Government Spokesperson, Dr. Isaac Mwaura, has underscored various economic milestones achieved by the UDA administration through transformational policies.

Notably, Dr. Mwaura highlighted youth empowerment and economic inclusion, affirming that the government, led by

President William Ruto, has successfully completed the distribution of grants under the Nyota National Youth Opportunities Towards Advancement (NYOTA) Programme. The initiative has benefited 121,800 young entrepreneurs nationwide, providing Sh2.586 billion in startup capital.

According to the Government Spokesperson, the programme emphasizes transparency, accountability, and inclusivity,

extending support to persons with disabilities and refugee communities.

He also mentioned that beneficiaries have received business training, financial literacy education, and ongoing mentorship.

Primarily, the programme includes a six-month On-the-Job Experience (OJE) apprenticeship for 90,000 vulnerable youth aged 18-29, with an extension to 35 years for youth with disabilities, focusing on skills in sectors such as mechanics and construction.

"The next phase will involve mentorship and business development support, along with recognition for prior learning through certification for experienced professionals," announced Dr. Mwaura.

### Sh1.5m project to strengthen poultry farming in Busia

The Busia County Government, with support from the Kenya Livestock Commercialisation Project, has invested Sh1.5 million in Bunyala North Ward, Bunyala Sub-County, to strengthen poultry farming and enhance economic empowerment among local residents.

The initiative includes the provision of 2,400 chicks, 80 bags of starter feeds, vaccines, and 12 heatless brooders, designed to reduce brooding costs. The project aims to improve food and nutrition security, create jobs, and stimulate local economic activity.

Chief Officer for Livestock Production and Veterinary Services, Mercy Imo, noted that the Mudembi Poultry Park, where the project is being implemented, had remained dormant for some time. She highlighted that with the new stock, the facility is expected to become fully operational

within five months.

Addressing community members during the distribution, Imo urged residents to utilise the facility responsibly, including bringing eggs to be hatched at Sh30 per egg, to ensure sustainability and maximise benefits.

Busia County KeLCoP Project Coordinator, Radoli Shiundu, accompanied the chief officer and encouraged farmers to care for the project, warning against internal disputes that could undermine its success. He stressed the importance of close collaboration with livestock production officers to manage the park effectively.

Other poultry-keeping groups from Amukura East in Teso South and Elugulu Ward in Butula Sub-Counties received 700 chicks and 15 bags of chick mash as a reward for exemplary performance in a tree-planting campaign dubbed Trees for Chicks, which earned the county recognition for environmental innovation.

### State-funded Sosiot market nears completion

Construction of the Government's Economic Stimulus Programme (ESP) Market in Sosiot town has reached 71.5 per cent completion, marking steady progress in the project's development. The state-funded facility now includes the main market structure, partially installed internal stalls and washrooms, as well as essential utilities already in place.

The update was shared during an inspection by a joint team from the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development, led by the State Department of Housing Regional Structural Engineer, Davis Mwangovi, who confirmed that the project is on track for completion by April 2026.

Belgut Division Assistant County Commissioner (ACC) Doronew Wanjala expressed optimism that the market, which began construction in April 2024 under the ESP initiative,

will soon provide a safe, organized, and modern environment for traders and shoppers.

The market will include over 200 modern stalls, cold storage units for perishables, mothers' breastfeeding rooms, disability-friendly walkways, organized spaces for different trader categories, fully equipped men's and women's washrooms, and reliable clean water throughout the facility. These amenities aim to enhance hygiene, safety, accessibility, and operational efficiency.

"This project has employed a significant number of local youth and women, who have contributed technical skills while earning a livelihood.

Comprehensive security measures, including perimeter fencing, controlled access points, and round-the-clock monitoring, have been implemented to safeguard construction materials and workers, ensuring uninterrupted progress toward completion.
