


# Relief for suppliers as state approves Sh255 billion pending bills payment

The Government has approved the payment of Sh255 billion in pending bills, marking a significant step toward addressing long-standing financial obligations owed to suppliers and contractors.

The announcement was made by Dr Chris Kiptoo, Principal Secretary for the National Treasury and Economic Planning during the 2026 Legislative Retreat in Naivasha. The payments form part of the Sh606 billion accumulated in pending bills and follow a rigorous verification process conducted by the Pending Bills Verification Committee.

Dr Kiptoo confirmed that Sh80 billion in the road sector has already been cleared, while the remaining Sh175 billion will be settled progressively in the coming months. He assured suppliers that all verified bills will be paid within the next two fiscal years, noting that Cabinet approval will be sought for the balance.

The issue of pending bills has plagued government operations for nearly two decades. Between July 1, 2005, and June 30, 2022, suppliers and contractors re-

peatedly raised concerns over delayed payments, which crippled businesses, disrupted cash flows, and eroded confidence in government operations.

In response, the government established the Pending Bills Verification Committee to scrutinize

and validate claims, ensuring that only genuine obligations are honoured. Dr. Kiptoo acknowledged that delays in clearing these bills were largely linked to fiscal deficits, as the government grappled with shrinking revenues and reduced tax collections.

He emphasized that the approval of Sh255 billion is not only a financial intervention but also a confidence-building measure aimed at restoring trust between the government and the private sector. Out of the projected Sh4.6 trillion budget for the 2026/2027 financial year, Sh1.8 trillion—representing 48 percent of collected revenues—is earmarked for interest payments on loans, leaving limited room for development expenditure.

From the Sh 2.8 trillion allocated to ministerial budgets, the education sector will receive the largest share at Sh 767 billion, followed by energy, infrastructure, and ICT at Sh 595 billion, and national security at Sh 300 billion.

Dr. Kiptoo warned that the country's public debt, which stood at Sh 12 trillion as of September 30, 2025, is unsustainable and continues to reduce the budget available for critical development projects.

To address these challenges, the Treasury is implementing a series of reforms. These include strengthening tax administration, prioritizing incomplete projects, reducing non-essential expenditure, and adopting e-procurement for the Sh 2.5 trillion procurement kitty.

State corporations are also undergoing mergers, restructuring, and dissolutions, with

**MULTI-VENDOR, USER OWNED ELECTRONIC CARGO TRACKING SEALS**

Kenya Revenue Authority (KRA) has made progress in its cargo monitoring journey, transitioning from physical Customs escorts to tamper-proof Customs seals, then to multi-vendor seals, and ultimately to the Regional Electronic Cargo Tracking System (RECTS).

RECTS is a web-based cargo tracking and monitoring solution integrated with Customs management systems across the East African Community. Under this system, export and transit cargo moving through Kenya is fitted with electronic seals and monitored centrally. RECTS has significantly reduced cargo clearance times, enhanced cargo security, and improved accountability in transit operations.

To further enhance service delivery under RECTS, and in response to evolving business dynamics, technological advancements, and increased demand, KRA is aligning its cargo monitoring processes with current operational realities. In this regard, KRA wishes to notify stakeholders that it is transitioning to a Multi-Vendor, User-Owned Seals model for both dry cargo (e-seals) and wet cargo (e-fuel) electronic seals. The proposed model is intended to provide a secure, tamper-proof, and auditable cargo monitoring solution, while addressing existing challenges such as seal availability and turnaround times.

KRA therefore invites members of the public and electronic tracking seal vendors to participate in a public engagement process on this transition.

A sensitization and public engagement meeting will be held virtually on Wednesday, 4<sup>th</sup> February, 2026. reforms expected to be completed by year-end. Privatization remains a key pillar of the government's fiscal strategy. Proceeds from the ongoing sale of government-owned entities, including Kenya Pipeline, will be channelled into the Infrastructure Fund to provide long-term financial capacity for national projects.

Dr. Kiptoo also highlighted positive economic indicators, including rising exports, a stable shilling, foreign reserves of USD 12 billion (Sh1.5 trillion), and diaspora remittances totaling USD 5.04 billion (Sh649.5 billion). These parameters, he noted, demonstrate resilience in the economy despite fiscal constraints.

National Assembly Budget Committee Chair Kimani Kuria defended the government's plan to sell 15 percent of its shares in Safaricom, projecting that the move will raise Sh244 billion to fund infrastructure projects.

Kuria argued that such measures are necessary to create fiscal space and reduce reliance on debt.

National Assembly Majority Leader Kimani Ichung'wa attributed the pending bills crisis to entrenched cartels within Treasury and county offices.

He alleged that senior county officers had withheld released funds to extort suppliers, thereby worsening the crisis. Ichung'wa challenged critics of the Safaricom share sale to propose viable alternatives for raising funds.

# Government sets aside Sh58.7bn for development of constituencies

The National Government has set aside Sh58.7 billion for the development of constituencies through the National Government Constituency Development Fund (NG-CDF) in the 2025/2026 financial year. This allocation represents an increase from the Sh54.7 billion disbursed during the 2024/2025 financial year. Of the total allocation, the government has so far released Sh32.3 billion to the NG-CDF Board for onward disbursement to constituencies across the country. Speaking in Nambale during the commissioning of the Sierra Girls Senior School multi-storey tuition and administration block, Principal Secretary for the State Department for Economic Planning, Boniface Makokha, said the fund was being prudently utilized to transform communities.

Makokha noted that scrapping the fund would deny constituents development currently being witnessed, particularly in the improvement of school infrastructure and the support of

he monitored and assessed the absorption of NG-CDF funds in ongoing projects.

The PS commended NG-CDF committees, saying there was clear evidence that the fund was transforming communities, especially in the education sector, adding that its scrapping would render many residents helpless.

The Kenya Civil Aviation Authority (Authority) is a State Corporation mandated to plan, develop, manage, regulate, and operate a safe, secure, economically sustainable, and efficient civil aviation system in Kenya.

Pursuant to Section 57 of the Civil Aviation Act (Cap. 394) and the Civil Aviation (Aerodromes) Regulations, 2013, the public is hereby notified as follows:

1. No person shall construct, erect, or alter any building or structure within the vicinity of an aerodrome, defined as a radius of fifteen (15) kilometres from the aerodrome, without prior written authorization from the Authority.
2. Applications for authorization shall be submitted to the Authority for review and approval of the acceptable height prior to commencement of any construction. Relevant guidance is available on the KCAA website at [www.kcaa.or.ke](http://www.kcaa.or.ke) or may be obtained by writing via email: [gops@kcaa.or.ke](mailto:gops@kcaa.or.ke).
3. All developments, including buildings and other structures, located in the vicinity of any aerodrome shall be fitted with Class B medium-intensity aeronautical obstacle lights. Such lights shall be installed at the tip of aerial masts or at the four upper extremities of buildings, in accordance with Regulation 72 of the Civil Aviation (Aerodromes) Regulations, 2013. Further guidance is provided in Advisory Circular CAA-AC-AGA-032 on the Lighting and Marking of Obstacles, available on the KCAA website.
4. These requirements apply to developments in the vicinity of all international and domestic aerodromes. For illustration purposes, developments around Wilson Airport include, but are not limited to, the following areas within a fifteen (15) kilometre radius: Nairobi West, Madaraka, South B, South C, Nairobi Dam, Ngummo, Highview, Magiwa, Golf Course, Lang'ata Estates, Karen, Southlands, Otiende, Ngei 1 & 2, Onyonya, Masai, Uhuru Gardens, Jonathan Ngeno, Deliverance, Dam Estate, Ngong Road, Kibera, Highrise, Ongata Rongai, Kabete.
5. All owners, lessors, and lessees of affected developments are hereby given thirty (30) days' notice from the date of this publication to install the prescribed Class B medium-intensity obstacle lights. ## No fake bills, CS Duale warns hospitals over SHA payments

Health Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale has warned that the Social Health Authority (SHA) will not pay for fictitious claims for services that Kenyans did not receive.

Speaking in Garissa town during the graduation ceremony of Madarasa Munawar, where he was the chief guest, Duale dismissed claims that the

government was delaying hospital bill settlements. He said SHA is following the law by conducting forensic audits, clinical reviews, and claim verifications before releasing funds.

"We will only pay after due diligence. SHA will carry out forensic audits and clinical reviews to ensure that the services provided are legitimate and that the Kenyan patient has actually received them," Duale said. The CS

He explained that hospitals complaining of non-payment are largely those whose claims are still under review.

"You know there are people who are saying SHA is not paying them. We have contracted over 10,272 public, private and faith-based facilities across the country. We have paid close to Sh13 billion for primary healthcare alone," Duale said. The CS

said SHA has also paid close to Sh75 billion under the Fund (SHIF), Sh3.5 billion under the Public Servants Social Health Insurance

Medical Scheme, and about

Sh1 billion for emergency, chronic and critical illness funds.

"This month alone, SHA has paid close to Sh6 billion. The law allows us a window of 90 days to pay after review, verification and forensic audit. We pay on the 14th of every month, and SHA has enough money in its bank accounts," he said. However, Duale emphasized that the authority would not compromise accountability.

"We will not pay for fictitious claims that Kenyans have not received," Duale said.

# City residents to benefit from seamless water network upgrade

The Athi Water Works Development Agency (AWWDA) has unveiled a pioneering trenchless pipeline project aimed at modernizing Nairobi's ageing water networks without tearing up streets or disrupting residents' daily lives.

The initiative, presented to residents at Mbotela Social Hall in Makadara Sub-County, marks the soft launch of the Central Nairobi Water Network Rehabilitation Project.

With a budget of Sh1.6 billion and implementation set to begin in February 2026, the project introduces a new model of infrastructure delivery that prioritizes both community continuity and technical innovation.

Unlike conventional methods, the project will employ Horizontal Directional Drilling (HDD)—a minimally invasive technology widely used in Europe and North America—to install new high-density polyethylene pipes underground.

"Think of it as keyhole surgery for the city," explained AWWDA Sociologist Mohammed Koech. "The diseased arteries are replaced without open-heart surgery. The surface stays intact. Life continues, only with greater reliability,

Koech further explained.

The technology addresses chronic problems caused by deteriorating asbestos-cement pipes, including frequent bursts, contamination risks, and high levels of non-revenue water. By eliminating trenches, the project will keep roads open, businesses operational, and households free from dust, noise, and access cuts.

Makadara Deputy County Commissioner (DCC) Philip Koima emphasized that public welfare is integral to the project's execution. "Safety is non-negotiable. Connectivity is non-negotiable. Livelihood continuity is non-negotiable," Koima stated.

AWWDA has established a Livelihoods Restoration Plan to support

informal traders and small businesses during construction, appointed a dedicated community liaison consultant, and set up a formal grievance mechanism. These steps reflect a commitment to operational accountability in a city sustained by informal economies.

The project aims not only to replace pipes but to rebalance water pressure across Nairobi, ensuring equitable distribution and reliable supply to underserved neighborhoods.

Funded by the French Development Agency (AFD), the rehabilitation will integrate with the Northern Water Collector Tunnel, which already supplies 140,000 cubic metres of water daily to Nairobi and surrounding counties.

## Mombasa Port registers historic cargo growth, eyes 2026 expansion

**M**ombasa port has achieved a record year in 2025 with further growth expected in 2026 driving significant economic growth.

Total cargo throughput at the Port of Mombasa has hit a record 45.45 million metric tons in 2025 compared to 40.99 million tons handled in 2024, reflecting a notable upward trend.

This represents a substantial increase of 4.46 million tons for freight and cargo, equivalent to a 10.9 percent increase.

This marks a significant growth in regional trade which calls for capacity expansion to the growing trade demands for entry and exit cargo volume.

The port of Mombasa has made remarkable strides ending the year 2025 on an impressive note recording far-reaching achievements in cargo traffic that have surpassed the previous year.

The Port of Mombasa is one of the largest and busiest Ports in the East and Central African region, providing direct connectivity to over 80 Ports worldwide.

It is linked to a vast

hinterland comprising Uganda, Rwanda, Burundi, Eastern Democratic Republic of Congo, Northern Tanzania, South Sudan and Ethiopia connected through a multi-modal transport system.

The port authority attributed the overall performance to ongoing reforms aimed at promoting imports and exports as well as ongoing infrastructure upgrades, modernization, digitalization of procedures and support from the national government.

Kenya Ports Authority (KPA) Managing Director (MD) Capt. William Ruto

disclosed that significant growth was also recorded in the total container traffic during the same period, with the port handling 2.11 million (Twenty-foot Equivalent Unit) TEUs, against 2.00 million TEUs in 2024. This represents a growth rate of 109,797 TEUs, or 5.5 percent.

Capt. Ruto said overall import and export volumes performed exceptionally, with import cargo volumes scaling up to a total of 36 million metric tons compared to 30 million metric tons in 2024, an equivalent of 20.1 percent growth.

"Exports also picked up

to a modest 5.03 million tons, jumping up from 4.96 million tons handled in 2024, representing an increase of 64,000 metric tons or 1.3 percent," he said.

The top KPA official also said market share strengthened notably in the domestic segment, expanding from 53.1 percent to 55.4 percent.

Corresponding cargo volumes increased by a robust 16.1 percent, equivalent to 3.50 million tons.

"This indicates sustained economic activity and a renewed trade demand ecosystem supported by

improved logistics and streamlined cargo clearance processes," said Ruto adding that KPA is committed to entrenching global best practices in the provision of maritime services.

Equally, transit cargo has continued to post steady growth with an impressive performance, of 15.88 million tons from 13.29 million tons in 2024, translating to 2.59 million metric tons or 19.5 percent.

"We remain optimistic that this upward trajectory in cargo growth will persist in the years ahead since we have the capacity to handle high-volume cargo with precision," he said.

All major transit markets delivered significant improvement during the period under review, with Uganda growing at 25.2 percent, the Democratic Republic of Congo by an impressive 16.5 percent, Rwanda by 22.8 percent, Tanzania by 11.0 percent.

The KPA MD said this achievement reaffirms Mombasa's position as the most reliable and most preferred trade corridor in the region.

Ruto said transshipment traffic closed the year attaining 385,656 TEUs, down from 496,034TEUs

recorded in 2024, a decline of 22.3 percent.

"This development reflects global shipping trends including geopolitics, global shipping line rotations among others adding to competitive developments in the region," he said, adding that KPA is committed to operational excellence.

MD Ruto also revealed that the port of Lamu, Kisumu port, Inland Container Depots (ICDs) Nairobi and Naivasha, equally registered strong performance reflecting an overall growth trajectory across the port facilities.

He said the port of Lamu has shown major promise with an impressive total cargo throughput of 799,161 metric tons against 74,380 metric tons recorded the previous year mainly driven by containerized cargo.

The KPA MD noted that the Lamu seaport is steadily emerging as a key maritime gateway, attracting a growing number of vessels and building confidence among international shipping lines.

He said with its strategic location, Lamu is drawing attention from global carriers eager to tap into regional trade routes.

# Nationwide household cleanliness campaign launched

The Ministry of Health has intensified its nationwide disease-prevention campaign with the launch of the Epuka Uchafu, Afya Nyumbani initiative in Kiambu County, highlighting its commitment to community-centered, preventive public health interventions. The launch, held at Ruiru Market, was led by the Principal Secretary for Public Health and Professional Standards, Mary Muthoni, who emphasized the vital role of environmental cleanliness in safeguarding public health. She noted that nearly half of all illnesses are linked to environmental factors, stressing that preventable diseases continue to impose an unnecessary burden on households and the healthcare system. Muthoni announced that the Epuka Uchafu, Afya Nyumbani campaign will be rolled out across all counties to promote clean environments, healthy behaviors, and early disease prevention at both household and community levels.

As part of the Kiambu launch, she inaugurated a 16-member multi-agency steering committee tasked with coordinating implementation, enforcement, and accountability of the initiative at county level.

The committee brings together national and county government actors to ensure sustained delivery of sanitation, hygiene, and environmental health interventions.

The PS directed public health officers to strictly enforce existing laws governing sanitation, hygiene, and environmental management.

She urged Kenyans to adopt basic but life-saving practices such as hand-washing after toilet use, regular bathing especially for children, proper waste disposal, and maintaining clean living and trading environments.

Warning that poor hygiene and unsafe surroundings continue to fuel outbreaks of cholera, bilharzia, and malaria, Muthoni stressed the importance of clean markets, functional dustbins, and well-managed public spaces.

She also emphasized the need for safe drinking water and consistent toilet use, calling on county governments to adequately resource public health services.

Beyond sanitation, the PS encouraged early health-seeking behaviour and registration with the Social Health Authority (SHA), noting that primary healthcare services are provided free of charge and are critical to preventing complications from delayed treatment.

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# Lands Commission launches land verification exercise in Tana River

The National Land Commission (NLC), under the Kenya Informal Settlements Improvement Project (KISIP2), is conducting a land verification exercise in Tana River County.

The exercise covers the Hola Mission, Chewani, Wachakome, Makaburini, Kibuyu, Mwangaza, Ghalla, Malindi ya Ngwena, Jua Kali, and Bora Imani settlements. These settlements border the Tana River, which meanders through Hola town, the administrative headquarters of Tana River County. The exercise aims to align approved plans with actual site conditions by verifying survey plans, identifying social amenities, and clearly marking riparian reserves.

Riparian areas are demarcated at 30 meters from the highest water mark, in line with environmental regulations and the Survey Act (Cap 299).

The exercise was launched following a consultative meeting chaired by Tana River Deputy County Commissioner (DCC) Andrew Mutua, who emphasized the importance of coordination and proper documentation in securing land tenure.

He said land registration and documentation was a significant step towards strengthening land

administration as well as a crucial factor in promoting economic growth, social stability and national development.

The critical exercise in urban and rural areas is being carried out with support from the county government of Tana River and other stakeholder strengthening coordinated land administration.

Stakeholders underscored the importance of verification in confirming genuine land ownership, resolving disputes, preventing

fraud and strengthening security of land tenure.

The NLC team is confirming the planning, survey and ownership status of plots and assets to ensure there are no disputes before the issuance of land ownership documents.

NLCs Principal Land Administrator Kenneth Kiplagat says they are undertaking on-ground verification and validation of land parcels and beneficiary details.

"The exercise supports land

governance, protects legitimate beneficiaries and promotes orderly settlements, planning and sustainable development in the region," he said adding that NLC is committed to transparency, secure tenure and dignified living for communities.

Kiplagat said the NLC process safeguards land tenure security and guarantees that beneficiaries receive legally recognized documentation.

He appreciated the NLCs efforts

in strengthening land governance through proper documentation.

Kiplagat said the verification exercise focused on confirming beneficiary lists, alignment of approval plans with developments on the ground, land availability and viability and identifying disputes prior to issuance of title documents.

He said the exercise marks a critical step toward land tenure regularization and sustainable urban and rural development under the KISIP II project.

"The process focuses on verifying beneficiaries, assessing infrastructure, identifying disputes early and confirming the availability and sustainability of land parcels for tenure regularization," he said.

He said NLC is currently conducting onsite inspections to confirm plot boundaries, verifying existing developments and ensuring conformity with approved layout plans.

Residents welcomed the land verification and validation exercise which are aimed at accelerating the issuance of title deeds within designated settlement schemes.

Ibrahim Wayu, a human rights activist who highlighted the significance of title deeds, welcomed the initiative noting that it marks the first time people in the targeted settlements will receive formal land ownership documents.

Wayu said the process will secure land rights, reduce disputes and protect investments against land seizures.

## State embarks on targeted Youth Review to shape future policies

Kenya is set to embark on a targeted review of youth issues under the African Peer Review Mechanism (APRM), a process expected to inform future policies on employment, participation, and inclusive governance.

Consultations will be held with state and non-state actors, county-level engagements, interviews, and focus group discussions to capture the diversity of youth experiences across the country.

A data-collection toolkit has already been developed and validated by stakeholders to ensure that voices from rural communities, informal settlements, persons with disabilities, and other marginalized groups are meaningfully represented.

"This approach aligns with the African Union's Agenda 2063, which envisions young people as key drivers of national and continental transformation," Ambassador Quatre said.

A delegation from the APRM Continental Office, led by Chief Executive Officer Ambassador Marie-Antoinette Rose Quatre, paid a courtesy call on Prime Cabinet Secretary Musalia Mudavadi in Nairobi.

Mudavadi reaffirmed the government's commitment to the process, stating that Kenya fully supports the review and will implement its findings through concrete policy, legislative, and institutional reforms.

Ambassador Quatre described Kenya's decision to undertake the targeted youth review as a demonstration of strong political will toward youth empowerment and African-led accountability.

She commended Kenya's leadership within the APRM and the African Union, noting that the coun-

try continues to serve as a reference point for people-centred governance reforms. She emphasized that the review will be participatory and inclusive, with young people positioned as the central stakeholders.

The APRM, an institution of the African Union, promotes good governance through independent assessments and peer reviews conducted at the level of Heads of State and Government.

The initiative follows a formal request by President William Ruto to the African Union for support in carrying out the review within the APRM framework. Its purpose is to deepen understanding of the lived realities, grievances, and aspirations of Kenyan youth, and to generate actionable responses that strengthen governance and policy.

The review will also explore opportunities to regulate digital platforms in ways that achieve positive governance outcomes while safeguarding youth-led innovation in advocacy, civic participation, and engagement.

Ambassador Quatre explained that strengthening digital civic engagement, while protecting innovation among young people, will be a key focus of the process.

Once completed, the final report will undergo stakeholder validation before submission to the Government of Kenya and eventual presentation at the African Union Summit.

Its recommendations are expected to inform wide-ranging reforms in policy and programme design, as well as governance frameworks.

# Ministry steps up biodiversity action ahead of global conference

Kenya has renewed its resolve to tackle biodiversity loss by restoring degraded ecosystems and aligning environmental governance with its economic transformation agenda.

Environment, Climate Change and Forestry Cabinet Secretary Dr. Deborah Barasa announced that the country is moving from policy ambition to practical delivery, backed by evidence-based monitoring and measurable socio-economic benefits.

Dr Barasa was speaking at the launch of the Regional Centre for Mapping of Resources for Development (RCMRD) as a Sub-Regional Technical and Scientific Cooperation Support Centre under the UN Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD).

The CS emphasized Africa's need to strengthen technical and institutional readiness ahead of the 17th Conference of Parties (COP 17) this year.

The event also marked the opening of a workshop on biodiversity monitoring and reporting linked to Target 2 of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework.

"Restoration is about giving nature a chance to recover while protecting livelihoods, securing water, supporting food production and building resilience to climate change," Dr. Barasa said, noting that degraded forests, rivers, wetlands, grasslands and coastlines must be urgently revived.

She highlighted that the Kunming-Montreal Framework represents a global shift from ambition

to implementation, with progress judged by measurable outcomes rather than intent.

Target 2, which calls for large-scale restoration of terrestrial, inland water, coastal and marine ecosystems by 2030, is both an environmental necessity and a development priority for Africa.

Delivering on this target, she added, requires clear baselines, reliable data systems, and strong national-to-global reporting mechanisms.

The designation of RCMRD as a regional support centre was described as timely, enabling countries to apply harmonised methodologies, leverage geospatial and earth-observation data, and strengthen biodiversity monitoring systems.

The Centre will also serve as a hub for technical exchange, ensuring consistency and shared learning across Africa.

Kenya's restoration efforts, Dr. Barasa noted, are firmly anchored in BETA, with initiatives such as the 15-billion-tree growing programme and broader landscape restoration projects.

Communities remain central to these efforts, involving county governments, forest associations, farmers, schools, faith-based groups, the private sector and individual citizens.

Success, she stressed, will be measured not by numbers alone but by survival rates, ecosystem functionality, biodiversity outcomes and long-term resilience.

In a related engagement, Dr. Barasa launched the review of the 2013 National Environment Policy, calling it a critical process focused on delivery and economic transformation rather than routine administration.

# Manufacturing sector booms as new investors flock in

The manufacturing sector is experiencing renewed growth, as the country records a steady influx of new investors setting up factories nationwide, signaling strong confidence in the business environment. Principal Secretary for

Trade and Investments, Dr. Juma Mukhwana, stated that the country sees at least three or more new manufacturing investors establishing factories each week, noting that this trend reflects rising investor confidence despite concerns raised in some quarters about the state of the sector.

Addressing reports of some local manufacturers scaling down or exiting the

market, the PS dismissed the claims as exaggerated, attributing them largely to

stiff competition. He said whenever one investor exits, three or more are setting up operations, underscoring the sector's resilience.

The PS said the government has put in place measures to enhance the ease of doing business, including the 5 aggregation centres and industrial parks, which has increased the country's attractiveness as an investment destination.

He noted that manufacturing contributes about 10 percent of the country's

economy and remains the second-largest employer after the government, describing it as a key pillar for wealth creation, innovation and national development.

"Out of the 50 richest people in this country, 45 have roots in manufacturing. This sector is a proven pathway to wealth creation and national development," he said.

He was addressing stakeholders and Kenyatta University students during a career forum.

# 11,000 Nyando learners to benefit from free school feeding scheme

More than 11,000 learners in 24 public day schools across Nyando Constituency, Kisumu County, are set to benefit from a new government programme providing free school meals and emergency education support.

The initiative was launched by Cabinet Secretary for Gender, Culture, and Children Services, Hanna Cheptumo, at Lela Mixed Secondary School. She noted that the programme is designed to protect vulnerable learners and ensure that no child attends school hungry.

Cheptumo emphasized that the programme reflects the government's commitment to child

protection, inclusive education, and safeguarding the future of young people in disaster-prone areas. Nyando has been severely affected by recurring floods and droughts, which have disrupted learning and contributed to hunger, poor health, absenteeism, school dropouts, child labour, and early marriages.

A recent assessment revealed a nine per cent decline in student enrolment in Nyando Sub-County, largely due to flood-related displacement and prolonged absenteeism.

"Many learners are emotionally distressed and struggling to remain in school. A child who is hungry, displaced, or traumatized cannot learn. A child without protection is exposed

and Children Services will roll out mentorship and psycho-social support programmes to help learners overcome trauma, rebuild confidence, and stay

motivated to complete their education.

The initiative also provides dignity kits for both girls and boys, ensuring that learners continue their studies in a safe and supportive environment.

As part of the intervention, the national government, through the State Department for Children Services, the State Department for Special Programmes, and the Child Welfare Society of Kenya, donated substantial relief supplies to schools in Nyando.

- In accordance with regulation 8 of the Sacco Societies (Deposit-Taking Sacco Business) Regulations, 2010, the **176 Sacco Societies** listed in **SCHEDULE I** herein are duly licensed to carry out deposit-taking business in Kenya as provided in the Act as read with the said Regulations, 2010, for the period commencing **1<sup>st</sup> January 2026** to **31<sup>st</sup> December 2026**.
- In accordance with regulation 6 of the Sacco Societies (Non-Deposit-Taking Business) Regulations, 2020, the **176 Sacco Societies** listed in **SCHEDULE II** herein are duly authorized to undertake the specified non-deposit-taking Sacco business in Kenya as provided in the Act as read with the said Regulations, 2020, for the period commencing **1<sup>st</sup> January 2026** to **31<sup>st</sup> December 2026**.

# Thousands of Kitui households set for electricity connection

Cabinet Secretary for Energy and Petroleum Opiyo Wandayi on Friday commissioned several Last Mile Electricity Connectivity projects in Kitui Rural Constituency, Kitui County.

Speaking at Musosya village in Kisasi Sub-County during the unveiling of the Musosya Last Mile Electricity Connectivity project, the CS noted that the government has allocated Sh2.5 billion to connect more than 20,000 households to electricity across all eight constituencies in Kitui County. Wandayi stated that the Kitui Rural Constituency project had been allocated Sh430 million out of the Sh2.5 billion set aside to facilitate the projects across the county.

"At least 40 Last Mile Electricity Connectivity projects across the Kitui Rural constituency are set to benefit from the Sh430

million during this financial year," the CS said.

He also noted that the programme targets households that have remained off-grid for years, adding that access to electricity would spur economic activities, improve security through enhanced public lighting and raise the overall quality of life for the beneficiaries.

He underscored that the Last Mile Electricity Connectivity programme funded by the national government is a reflection of the government's commitment to inclusive and equitable development to all its citizens.

Member of Parliament for Kitui Rural Constituency David Mwalika Mboni who had accompanied the Energy Cabinet Secretary, appreciated the government for the allocation of the funds, noting that his constituency received the lion's share amongst the eight constituencies across the vast Kitui county.

The MP promised that his office would continue to work closely with the Ministry of Energy and Petroleum to ensure smooth implementation of the 40 earmarked Last Mile Electricity Connectivity projects across his constituency.

He further disclosed that the national government would construct a modern market at a cost Sh7million at Kisasi trading centre to enhance trade and provide a better working environment for local traders.

On education infrastructure, the MP said that he has plans to put up floor tiles for all classrooms in local primary schools to improve hygiene and create a more conducive learning environment for pupils.

Also accompanying the Energy Cabinet Secretary was Kitui County Commissioner Erastus Mbui among other leaders.

While speaking during the occasion, Mbui lamented that 46 per cent of learners in the Kitui rural constituency had not yet

# How local women are reviving forests and securing livelihoods

Women have emerged as key drivers of reforestation and climate action initiatives across the country's landscapes, which have long been strained by years of forest loss, erratic weather patterns, and pressure from expanding communities.

For decades, forest degradation has left rural

households vulnerable. Streams have dried up, soils have weakened, and farm yields have dwindled, leaving families struggling to meet their basic needs. Women, who depend heavily on natural resources to sustain their households, have borne the brunt of these challenges. Many have spent long hours searching for firewood and water,

while unpredictable harvests have compounded the rising costs of school fees, food, and healthcare. Opportunities to earn income close to home have been scarce, and women have rarely had platforms to influence how natural resources are managed.

This situation began to shift with the intervention of community initiatives supported by the National Environment Trust Fund (NETFUND).

The programmes were not framed as charity but as practical empowerment. Women's groups received training in rais-

ing tree seedlings, restoring degraded areas, and running small green enterprises.

They were also introduced to climate-smart farming techniques and sustainable resource use, enabling them to rehabilitate the land while improving their livelihoods.

The impact has been tangible. In villages adjacent to the Mau Forest, women like Linda Kipchumba have seen their lives change. Kipchumba recalls how forest decline once affected everything from farm yields to household expenses.

# KISIP2 infrastructure upgrades transform informal communities into thriving urban settlements

The Kenya Informal Settlements Improvement Project Phase Two (KISIP2) is transforming informal urban settlements across the country, bringing dignity, safety, and prosperity to communities that were once marginalized.

Through the tarmac-ing of feeder roads and the installation of street lighting, the project has delivered tangible improvements in Lamu, Malindi, Kilifi, Kwale, Mombasa, and Voi, sparking economic growth, improving health outcomes, and triggering a property boom.

For decades, residents of informal settlements struggled with dusty, uneven paths that hindered trade and mobility, as well as darkness that limited activity after sunset.

Today, thanks to KISIP2, tarmacked roads connect families to schools, health facilities, and markets, while modern street lighting has extended business hours, enhanced security, and fostered vibrant community life.

In Malindi's Muyeye Informal Settlement, businessman Jonathan Katana describes the transformation as remarkable.

"Before, customers avoided coming to my shop in the evening because the roads were rough and the area was dark. Now, with smooth roads and bright lights, business has picked up. My sales have doubled, and I can even employ two young men to help me," he explained.

In Kwale's Kombani Settlement, carwash operator Salim Ramadhan has seen his fortunes change.



"The tarmacked roads mean more cars pass through here, and the streetlights allow me to operate late into the night. I earn more, and I don't worry about insecurity. My business is now stable," he said.

Fellow Kombani businessman Abdalla Ali echoed the sentiment, noting that the upgrades have boosted property values.

"Plots that were once ignored are now in demand. Investors are coming in because they see

the area is safe and accessible. Land prices have gone up, and that is good for all of us," he said.

In Likoni's Maweni area, trader Mwanisha Suleiman highlighted the health benefits of the project.

"With clean, tarmacked roads, dust-related illnesses like coughs and asthma have reduced. Children can walk safely to school, and families feel healthier. The lights also

mean we can fetch water or visit the clinic at night without fear," she said.

In Mombasa's Kisumu Ndogo Settlement Scheme in Nyali, Chairman Clement Wasike described the changes as a turning point for the community.

"We used to be forgotten, but now investors are coming in. Shops are opening, rentals are increasing, and families are proud to live here. The streetlights have reduced crime, and people feel safe walking home even late at night," he said.

Wasike noted that the ripple effects of KISIP2's interventions are evident across these settlements since extended business hours have created more employment opportunities, especially for youth.

"Improved roads have

boosted local trade, while lighting has strengthened community cohesion by enabling evening gatherings, cultural events, and social activities," he said.

The Chairman added that health outcomes have also improved. "In the past, it used to take us two hours to get to the nearest hospital due to poor road networks. This has been reduced to almost half an hour," he explained.

He emphasized that security has been enhanced, saying the presence of streetlights has reduced crime and made settlements safer for women, children, and the elderly.

In Kilifi's Mtaani Informal Settlement, 72-year-old James Mbugua, who was born and bred in the area, says the project has given him a new lease of life. "I am able to exercise my body as I take an evening walk," he said with a smile.

## State cracks down on drugs, illicit brews amid youth addiction crisis

The Government has intensified its fight against drugs, contraband cigarettes, and illicit brews, with Public Health Principal Secretary Mary Muthoni warning that rising substance abuse among young people is rapidly becoming a national crisis.

Muthoni said the State will combine tougher enforcement with expanded rehabilitation services to curb the spread of harmful substances in estates,

villages, and learning institutions.

Speaking at Angola Health Centre in Kisumu East Sub-County, the PS issued a stern warning about the increasing use of drugs, nicotine products, and illicit brews, particularly among young people.

She urged county governments and national administrators to work closely together to shut down illegal outlets operating in residential areas.

"It is a directive that we must stop the sale and use of drugs in

our communities. We cannot keep losing our young people to nicotine products, drugs and other substances.

I urge county commissioners, chiefs and Community Health Promoters (CHPs) to be vigilant. If you see it, say it" she stressed.

Muthoni said the fight against drugs and illicit substances required a coordinated effort, noting that enforcement officers may never succeed without the support from local authorities and residents.

The PS challenged county governments to take greater responsibility, especially in regulating and licensing businesses, saying some illegal outlets operate under the cover of legitimate permits.

# KSG Vihiga Campus Sh1.1 billion project takes off

Construction of the Kenya School of Government (KSG) campus in Vihiga Constituency has reached 19 per cent completion following the resumption of works in December 2025 after earlier delays caused by financial constraints.

The Sh1.1 billion project, which is expected to be completed within three years, is set to serve as a major training and capacity-building centre for public servants in Western Kenya, the Nyanza region, and other parts of the country.

The second phase of the project entails the construction of two hostels, two staff quarters, a cafeteria, an administration block, an auditorium, and a borehole fitted with high- and low-level water storage tanks.

Development, Dr Jane Kere Imbunya, accompanied by Vihiga Governor Dr Wilber Khasilwa Ottichillo and other leaders, toured the construction site to assess the progress of works, which are currently at the excavation stage.

Dr. Imbunya commended the national government for prioritising the project, saying it would play a key role in transforming the region and strengthening public service delivery.

"This project falls under my

State Department, and we must work together to ensure its successful completion. Payments to the contractor are being processed, and work should continue uninterrupted," she said.

She urged the contractor to strictly adhere to quality standards and timelines, warning that the government would not tolerate substandard work.

"You must comply with the required quality standards and ensure that the scope of work aligns with the project timeline. Everyone is watching what is happening on the ground," she added.

The Principal Secretary also encouraged the contractor to prioritise local residents for employment and called on the County Commissioner to provide security and other necessary support to facilitate smooth implementation.

The project, which began on October 24, 2024, stalled due to funding challenges before being

revived late last year.

Governor Ottichillo described the KSG campus as a transformative investment for the region, noting that it would attract trainees from across Kenya and other parts of Africa.

"This is a very important project for Western Kenya and the Nyanza region. It will host students from all sectors across the country and beyond. Although it stalled earlier due to challenges, we are now committed to ensuring it is completed," said the Governor.

He thanked President William Ruto and the Ministry of Public Service for reviving the project and urged residents to prepare for the economic opportunities that will come with its completion.

"This area will develop into an urban centre. Residents should avoid selling their land and instead invest wisely in housing and other businesses that will be needed in future," he said.

## Kenya, EU in deal to boost cybersecurity

Kenya has partnered with the European Union (EU) to launch the Kenya Cyber Resilience (KCR) Project, an initiative aimed at strengthening the nation's cybersecurity ecosystem.

The project seeks to enhance defenses against evolving digital threats, ensuring that citizens, public institutions, and businesses can operate in a secure and trusted online environment.

By boosting resilience across Kenya's digital landscape, the KCR Project highlights the country's commitment to safeguarding its rapid technological transformation. The initiative is designed to strengthen governance, improve institutional coordination, and raise public awareness of cyber hygiene—laying the foundation for a safer, more inclusive, and reliable cyberspace.

The three-year project, funded by the EU at EUR 3 million, seeks to address critical gaps in governance, operational capacity, and public awareness of cyber hygiene. It comes at a time when Kenya's rapid digital transformation—marked by expanded access to e-services, mobile payments, and online platforms—has also heightened exposure to evolving cyber threats.

Speaking at the high-level launch and first Steering Committee meeting in Nairobi, Principal Secretary for Broadcasting and Telecommunications, Stephen



Isaboke (pictured), emphasized that cyber resilience is now a national priority. He highlighted Kenya's global leadership in digital innovation, citing achievements such as mobile money, digitization of over 20,000 government services, and the growth of the Silicon Savannah at Konza.

"Cyber resilience is not a tech problem—it is a national priority. It is the prerequisite for our economic growth and the guardian of our democratic values," Isaboke said, stressing that cyberspace knows no borders and resilience must be built collaboratively.

He noted that the project will refine national cybersecurity policy, support the protection of Critical Information Infrastructure, and facilitate the establishment of a National Cybersecurity Agency to provide strategic leadership during cyber incidents and crises.

Principal Secretary for ICT and the Digital Economy, Eng. John Tanui, reaffirmed that cybersecurity is now foundational to Kenya's economic growth, public trust, and national stability.

He pointed out that digital public services, financial systems, and communica-

tions networks form part of Kenya's critical infrastructure, making coordinated and standardized frameworks essential. Tanui explained that the project aligns with Kenya's National Cybersecurity Strategy and Digital Master Plan, and was developed through extensive stakeholder consultations to ensure responsiveness to institutional needs. Eng Tanui noted that nationwide cyber hygiene campaigns will be rolled out, with special focus on women, youth, and users of digital public services, supported by an interactive online platform offering training, certification, and awareness tools.

Representing the EU Delegation to Kenya, Jorge Pereiro, Head of Cooperation, reaffirmed the EU's long-term commitment to supporting Kenya's digital transformation in a secure and inclusive manner.

"Cybersecurity underpins trust in the digital economy and the delivery of public services. With Kenya's rapid expansion of e-government services, digital payments, and online platforms, strong cyber resilience is vital to protect critical information infrastructure, maintain service continuity, and safeguard citizens' rights," Pereiro said.

The KCR project is being implemented by Expertise France, in partnership with the Estonian Centre for International Development (ESTDEV), and in close coordination with Kenyan authorities to ensure national ownership and sustainability.

According to Ambassador Yuksel, the Barista Training Centre is expected to transform the way hospitality students are trained, moving beyond classroom instruction to real-world competence.

"Trainees will learn roasting techniques, espresso-based beverages, cold drink preparation, and customer service skills."

"The programme also emphasizes discipline, professionalism, and financial literacy, ensuring that graduates are not only skilled baristas but also well-rounded professionals capable of thriving in competitive environments," he said.

By equipping students

with practical expertise, the Ambassador noted that the initiative aims to enhance employability, stimulate entrepreneurship, and add value to Kenya's globally respected coffee industry.

The centre, he said, is also expected to encourage youth, women, and persons with disabilities to engage in the hospitality and coffee sectors, creating inclusive opportunities for income generation and independence.

Ambassador Yuksel reaffirmed Türkiye's commitment to supporting vocational training and youth empowerment in Kenya.

He noted that tourism and coffee remain vital pillars of Kenya's economy, and the new centre will help unlock their full potential by producing skilled professionals who can add

value across the coffee industry.

"Kenya is one of Africa's leading tourist destinations and is globally recognised for its high-quality coffee. To sustain growth in these sectors, there is a growing need for skilled baristas and hospitality professionals."

The Barista Training Centre at Utalii College is a concrete example of how Türkiye and Kenya can cooperate to achieve this goal," Ambassador Yuksel said.

He added that since 2006, TİKA has implemented nearly 291 development projects in Kenya valued at over USD 11.16 million, underscoring Türkiye's long-standing commitment to people-centred and sustainable development.

The Barista Training Centre is expected to be-

come a model for vocational training in Africa, offering a comprehensive curriculum that covers the entire coffee journey from farm to cup.

Beyond technical skills, the programme will instil values of time management, customer care, and respect in service delivery—qualities essential for success in the hospitality industry.

Ambassador Yuksel described the initiative as a symbol of the deepening friendship between Türkiye and Kenya, built on mutual respect, shared values, and a common vision for sustainable development.

He expressed confidence that the centre will contribute to Kenya's coffee culture, support sustainable employment, and enhance service standards in tourism.

Madam Tessie Musalia, spouse to Prime Cabinet Secretary Musalia Mudavadi and Chair of the Ushiriki Wema Foundation, urged students at Kenya Utalii College to turn acquired skills into life-changing opportunities.

She emphasised that "training alone will not change your lives; learning to operate the barista machine will transform them," as she officially handed over state-of-the-art barista machines to the institution.

Mrs Musalia noted that the project is part of a broader partnership between the Ushiriki Wema Foundation and the Government of the Republic of Türkiye, through the Turkish Cooperation and Coordination Agency (TİKA), to establish a fully equipped Barista Training Centre at the college.

## Audit Committees in Kenya face scrutiny over weak oversight

**A**udit Committees in Kenya's public sector are under increasing scrutiny for failing to provide effective oversight, raising concerns about governance lapses, financial mismanagement, and weakened accountability in government institutions.

Established under Section 73(5) of the Public Finance Management (PFM) Act, 2012, Audit Committees are mandated in all public entities to strengthen internal audit functions.

Their composition and responsibilities are further outlined in the PFM Regulations, the Audit Committee Guidelines for National and County Governments (2016), and the Mwongozo Code of Governance for State Corporations.

These frameworks were designed to ensure transparency, accountability, and sound financial management across both national and county governments.

However, experts warn that many Audit Committees are falling short of expectations.

According to Lilian Wangechi Mwangi (pictured), Chairperson of the Institute of Internal Auditors (Kenya), weaknesses in oversight, independence, and technical expertise have undermined their effectiveness.

"The effectiveness of internal audit is only as strong as the Audit Committee's capacity and commitment to empower, direct, challenge, and support it," Ms Mwangi said.

Audit Committees are intended to provide assurance on risk management, internal controls, and governance.

Section 160(b) of the PFM (National Government) Regulations,



2015, specifically requires internal auditors to report through Audit Committees on the state of risk management and governance within organizations.

Yet, in practice, committees often lack the statutory authority to enforce decisions or compel management to act.

Analysts note that this limited empowerment has left internal audit functions vulnerable to resource constraints and management interference.

In some cases, auditors face pressure from boards and senior managers to suppress findings, particularly when career progression and remuneration depend on management approval.

"This structural arrangement effectively keeps internal audit subordinate to the very management it is supposed to oversee," Ms Mwangi observed.

As a result, audit recommendations are frequently ignored, leading to repeated findings and unresolved risks.

Where Audit Committees lack capacity, reviews of audit reports become superficial exercises. Recommendations are noted but rarely followed up, leaving risks unresolved and irregularities unaddressed. Internal auditors, who are supposed to operate independently, find themselves

constrained by limited resources and dependent on management for career progression and remuneration.

In such circumstances, auditors may hesitate to report irregularities, aligning instead with management for survival. The very structure designed to ensure independence ends up subordinating audit functions to the same management they are meant to oversee.

This erosion of oversight has tangible effects. Weak implementation of audit recommendations leads to repeated findings, unresolved risks, and persistent inefficiencies. Governance lapses go unchecked, financial mismanagement continues, and the credibility of public institutions suffers. The inability of Audit Committees to enforce corrective action undermines the entire internal audit function, leaving organizations exposed to reputational damage and service delivery failures.

In response to these challenges, the National Treasury has constituted a multi-agency taskforce to review the legal framework governing public sector internal audit and Audit Committees. The taskforce is expected to propose reforms to strengthen statutory authority and streamline oversight functions.

Ms Mwangi emphasized that effective Audit Committees must actively track the implementation of audit recommendations and foster communication between auditors, boards, senior management, external auditors, and other stakeholders.

Weak oversight erodes accountability for public resources, exposes institutions to governance breakdowns, and increases the risk of financial losses and reputational damage.

## Bomet University College to receive charter, pioneering green and regional education

Bomet University College (BUC), established in 2017 as a constituent college of Moi University, will officially be awarded a charter, marking a major milestone in Kenya's higher education sector.

The charter, granted by the Government, elevates BUC to full university status.

According to Dr. Tiberius Barasa of Bomet University College, the move underscores the government's commitment to equitable development, sustainability, and regional empowerment through education.

"The awarding of a charter to the University marks a significant milestone in Kenya's higher education landscape and reflects the Government's commitment to equitable development, sustainability, and regional empowerment through education," Dr. Barasa said.

Since its inception, BUC has focused on programmes that integrate environmental conservation, applied research, and community-centered innovation.

The institution has gained recognition for student-led projects ranging from assistive technologies to agricultural solutions designed to address food security challenges.

Dr. Barasa noted that these innovations demonstrate the effectiveness of applied research in meeting community needs.

"This growth is evident in students' innovations, which range from assistive technologies to agricultural solutions," he said,

adding that the University's emphasis on sustainability aligns with Kenya's broader development agenda.

BUC's governance and leadership have also drawn national attention. The institution has been recognized for promoting gender representation and inclusivity, reflecting constitutional values of public sector reform.

"This is a university that has shown how strong governance and leadership can translate into national recognition," Dr. Barasa explained. "Its commitment to gender representation demonstrates alignment with constitutional values."

Beyond academics, BUC has had a tangible impact on the local economy, he said, noting that the growing student and staff population has increased demand for housing, transportation, trade, and services in Bomet Town.

"This multiplier effect illustrates how public universities can serve as anchors of regional economic growth," Dr. Barasa said. Local businesses have reported increased activity, while county officials have pointed to the institution as a driver of urban development in the region.

While the charter represents a significant achievement, Dr. Barasa emphasized that it also signals the beginning of a new phase of responsibility.

He disclosed that the institution has heeded to calls for expanded academic programmes, research centers, and infrastructure to match the institution's new status.

# Kenya launches Digi-AI bus to bridge digital divide for youth

**K**enya has unveiled the Digi-AI Bus, a mobile digital classroom designed to deliver computer science, coding, and artificial intelligence (AI) training to learners from underserved communities.

The project is spearheaded by Kings Rugby Development Academy (KRDA) in partnership with Atlas Foundation, Code Yangu, and Konza Technopolis.

It seeks to equip young people with future-ready digital skills while expanding access to education, mentorship, and technology-driven opportunities.

Speaking during the launch at RFUEA Grounds in Nairobi, Josephine Ndambuki, Chief Manager for Business Development and Innovation at Konza Technopolis, emphasized the urgency of preparing Kenya's youth for careers being reshaped by technological disruption.

"Kenya is a youthful country, with over 80 per cent of its population under the age of 35. As the world moves toward an AI-driven future, we must ensure our young people are equipped with the skills to compete and thrive," she said.

Ndambuki noted that Kenya's median age of 19.5 presents both an opportunity and a responsibility, particularly as more than 900,000 students graduate from high school annually.

Citing World Economic Forum data showing that more than half of current jobs face disruption, she stressed that digital skilling is central to Kenya's national transformation agenda.

Ndambuki explained that Konza Technopolis—popularly referred to as the Silicon Savannah—is driving Kenya's transition from an agriculture-based economy to a knowledge-driven one powered by research, innovation, science, and technology.

The Digi-AI Bus, she added, aligns with the government's Digital Super Highway initiative, which aims to expand access to digital opportunities, enhance service delivery, and prepare Kenyans for a globally competitive workforce.

Ndambuki disclosed that plans are also underway to roll out 1,450 digital hubs nationwide to serve as learning and work centres, while opening Konza's facilities to students to explore innovation, emerging technologies, and the future of work.

"Creativity begins early. If children are exposed to technology at a young age, they can imagine, innovate, and become the next generation of problem-solvers," she said.

Peter Scott, Chief Executive Officer of Atlas Foundation, described the Digi-AI Bus as a strategic investment in vulnerable communities, particularly informal settlements such as Kibera.

"Too many young people in disadvantaged areas face barriers to quality education, employ-

ment, and digital opportunity. Digital skills are now essential for employability, entrepreneurship, and economic resilience," he said.

Scott noted that while Kenya has made progress in improving access to education, challenges remain in foundational literacy, numeracy, and STEM performance, limiting pathways into

science and technology careers.

He said the bus will deliver practical, job-ready digital training directly to communities that lack computer labs and modern learning infrastructure.

Asha Makana, a trainer at Code Yangu, underscored the importance of building a strong computer science foundation early. She lamented that many

Kenyan learners encounter technology too late in their academic journeys.

"It is heartbreaking that some Grade 9 learners in Nairobi are using a computer for the first time. Without access, how can they compete in a global digital economy?" she asked.

Makana explained that the Digi-AI Bus will stabilize training

delivery, expand outreach, and reduce logistical challenges for educators working in remote or low-resource settings.

Stuart McGreevy, Executive Chairman of Kings Rugby Development, said the Digi-AI Bus is part of a broader Sh 387 million nationwide vision to deploy mobile digital classrooms across Kenya.

# State launches rainfall isotope monitoring station for Kericho

The government has re-established a rainfall isotope monitoring station in Kericho County, under the Global Network of Isotopes in Precipitation (GNIP).

This marks the first collection of such scientific data in the area since 1968, significantly strengthening Kenya's capacity to manage water resources using modern climate science.

The newly installed GNIP station, located at the Tea Research Institute in Kericho, will systematically collect and analyze rainwater to determine its isotopic composition, helping scientists trace how rainfall contributes to groundwater recharge, river flows and soil moisture essential for agriculture and domestic use.

Speaking to Kenya News Agency (KNA) during the installation, Regional Centre on Groundwater Resources Chief Executive Officer, Patrick Murunga, said the revival of the Kericho station fills a 58-year scientific data gap and restores the region's position in a globally recognized rainfall monitoring network.

"This station gives us an opportunity to begin collecting data again and compare what was observed in the 1960s, with what is happening now, which is extremely important in understanding changes in our water resources," he explained.

Murunga noted that historical data from the original Kericho station, which operated between 1967 and 1968, remains archived, under the World Meteorological Organization system, making the renewed monitoring effort a direct continuation of internationally referenced scientific records.

At the same time, the CEO emphasized that the GNIP programme strengthens research in groundwater, agriculture and environmental management, while boosting Kenya's laboratory credibility through quality control partnerships with the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA).

Murunga pointed out that the station will benefit tea farmers, households, water managers and county planners by providing accurate rainfall source data that supports irrigation planning, drought preparedness and sustainable allocation of water resources.

Meanwhile, the Regional Centre on Groundwater Resources hydrologist, Cynthia Wachuka, said the Kericho GNIP station will analyze rainwater for stable isotopes such as Oxygen-18 and Deuterium to help scientists understand the origin and movement of water within the hydrological cycle.

"This station allows us to understand our water resources from the source, which is rainfall, and this information is critical for long-term water planning and climate studies," she explained.

Wachuka emphasized that rainfall samples will be collected monthly and analyzed over a four-to-seven-year period to generate dependable average values that eliminate distortions from extreme rainfall seasons and enable scientists to establish a Local Meteoric Water Line for Kericho.

The Hydrologist pointed out that a Local Meteoric Water Line is essential because rainfall characteristics differ from one region to another and localized isotope data helps accurately link rainwater to groundwater, springs and rivers relied upon by communities and farms.

# LBDA invests Sh3b to revive rice farming in Nyando

The Lake Basin Development Authority (LBDA) has intensified efforts to revive rice farming in Nyando and Kadibo Sub-Counties, Kisumu County, through a Sh3 billion investment aimed at upgrading irrigation infrastructure and boosting agricultural productivity.

In collaboration with the national government and other stakeholders, the Authority is spearheading the construction and rehabilitation of canals, dykes, and other initiatives to restore idle land and improve water supply to rice farms.

The initiative targets the South West Kano Irrigation Scheme in Kadibo Sub-County, where at least seven hectares of previously idle land will be reclaimed for productive use. Vast tracts of land at the Dajo Sub-Scheme in Kabonyo Kanyagwal Ward are also earmarked for reclamation.

LBDA Managing Director Wyckliffe Ochiaga said the programme, expected to take about two weeks to complete, will address water shortages that have long undermined rice farming in the region. "The dredging of canals and construction of dykes will ensure reliable water flow, improve crop yields, and mitigate perennial flooding challenges that have affected farmers for

years," Ochiaga explained.

He revealed that out of the Sh 70 million allocated by the National Treasury for the rice mop-up exercise, Sh30 million has already been spent at the South West Kano Irrigation Scheme over the past month.

"LBDA is working to ensure farmers get good returns by providing a ready market and shielding them from brokers who exploit them with low prices," he said.

Ochiaga added that the Authority is keen on offering incentives such as certified seeds and fertilizer to guarantee better returns. Farmers are required to register to benefit from the programme. "With proper investment of about Sh 70,000, a farmer can easily earn up to Sh 200,000 after harvest," he noted, underscoring LBDA's commitment to promoting best farming practices to raise yields from the current average of 2.5 tons to about 4.5 tons per hectare.

The Authority is also deploying drone technology to spray pesticides, protecting rice crops from bird attacks and blight diseases. This innovation is expected to reduce losses and improve resilience against common threats to rice farming.

Nyando Member of Parliament Jared Okello, who joined LBDA officials during the unveiling, welcomed the initiative, noting that

dredging canals will unclog blocked waterways and put more idle land into productive use.

"This will allow farmers to benefit from higher crop yields, ultimately improving their livelihoods," Okello said.

He pointed out that the expansive South West Kano Irrigation Scheme has over 10 hectares of land, but only three hectares are currently under cultivation.

"We have huge chunks of land lying idle, while people suffer from hunger. The government has invested resources to address food insecurity and ensure land is fully utilized," he added.

Okello noted that the ongoing construction of dykes in Ogenya, Mbega, Ambo, and Nyamware areas will mitigate perennial flooding and address backflow challenges from Lake Victoria, which have historically disrupted farming activities.

The LBDA-led programme is expected to breathe new life into rice farming in Nyando, a region with immense potential but long constrained by poor infrastructure and environmental challenges.

By combining modern technology, improved water management, and farmer support, the Authority is positioning rice farming as a key driver of food security and economic empowerment in Kisumu County.

## Nearly 6, 000 trained Chiefs billed to strengthen grassroots governance

The Government has noted that 5,892 chiefs and assistant chiefs who graduated from the National Police College, Embakasi 'A' Campus will significantly boost grassroots governance and community security across the country.

The officers, who serve as National Government Administration Officers (NGAOs), underwent a three-week intensive programme covering induction, paralegal practice, and security management.

The training, delivered in three cohorts throughout 2025, was designed to equip chiefs with updated skills in conflict resolution, legal processes, and security management.

The programme was introduced to close this gap, ensuring that officers are equipped with modern skills to manage evolving challenges at the community level.

The training is anchored in the government's Jukwaa la Usalama framework, which prior-

itises community-based approaches to safety and stability.

Through the programme, chiefs strengthened their understanding of legal processes, sharpened conflict-resolution skills, and enhanced operational preparedness.

The PS highlighted that chiefs are often the first responders to local disputes, emergencies, and threats. In high-risk areas such as parts of North Eastern Kenya and the Rift Valley, additional paramilitary training and appropriate arming were introduced to acknowledge the realities officers face.

Dr. Omollo said the training will enable chiefs to detect emerging threats, coordinate effectively with the National Government Administration Police Unit (NGAPU), and maintain order within their jurisdictions.

He added that the restoration of direct police support through NGAPU - with 1,800 officers already deployed and plans to scale up to 19,000 - will reinforce grassroots administration by ensuring authority is matched with enforcement capacity.

"Beyond law enforcement, chiefs and assistant chiefs play a central role in community wellbeing."

"They lead campaigns against drug and substance abuse, respond to gender-based violence cases, and facilitate access to government services such as national registration, social protection schemes, and health campaigns," said Dr Omollo.

Urban chiefs in Nairobi, Mombasa, and Kisumu were singled out for their role in managing dense populations and complex social dynamics.

The PS noted that these

officers operate in especially demanding environments, coordinating multi-agency responses and navigating diverse social challenges daily.

He pointed out that there are approximately 13,000 chiefs and assistant chiefs serving across all 47 counties. They are often the most immediate representatives of government authority, particularly in remote areas where other institutions have limited reach.

Dr Omollo said the training will improve emergency response to floods, disease outbreaks, and intercommunal tensions, while also ensuring smoother implementation of programmes under the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda (BETA).

The programme also addressed issues raised during Jukwaa la Usalama consultations, including delayed promotions, inadequate mobility, insufficient equipment, and outdated uniforms.

Dr. Omollo said tackling these concerns alongside

capacity development sends a clear message that chiefs and assistant chiefs are recognised as professionals whose effectiveness depends on both skills and working conditions.

He underscored the economic rationale behind strengthening local administration. Effective grassroots governance lowers the time and financial costs citizens incur when accessing services, prevents minor disputes from escalating into costly conflicts, and creates predictable environments for businesses to operate.

The PS noted that strong administrative presence also contributes to social cohesion.

"In Kenya's diverse society, chiefs often serve as mediators and stabilisers, bridging divides between ethnic groups, age sets, and competing interests. They enforce the rule of law while remaining sensitive to local contexts, maintaining order without distancing themselves from the communities they serve," he said.

## 15,000 farmers get hands-on training for high-yield beans

The Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organisation (KALRO) is partnering with the International Center for Tropical Agriculture (CIAT) to train over 15,000 farmers in proper agronomic practices for the 'Nyota' bean variety. The initiative aims to boost productivity, promote climate-smart farming, and help farmers cope with the impacts of climate change.

Supported by the Pan-African Bean Research Alliance (PABRA), the programme targets farmers from Njoro, Subukia, Rongai, Bahati, and Gilgil Sub-Counties. It focuses on training farmers in cultivating high-yield, disease-resistant Nyota beans, post-harvest management, market linkages, and export standards.

Mr. Justin Mabeya Machini, Senior Research Associate at Alliance for Biodiversity - CIAT, said climate change has increased the prevalence of pests and diseases that were previously rare, negatively affecting bean yields and farmers' incomes.

"The initiative ensures farmers not only improve production but also access favorable markets. We are encouraging aggregation of produce through cooperatives to strengthen bar-

gaining power and secure bulk sales to processors and buyers," Machini said.

He explained that KALRO is exploring the creation of a bean value chain where farmers supply processors who convert beans into consumable products, including bean flour and noodles, thereby adding value and avoiding exploitation by middlemen.

The training also includes familiarization with mandatory standards for local, regional, and European Union (EU) export markets. Machini noted this is crucial for tapping international markets. He spoke at Kiambogo

Centre in Gilgil Sub-County during an event that saw the official flagging off of nine tonnes of beans produced by the Ushirikiano Women Group, a cooperative of over 100 agribusiness women. The group has been linked directly to buyers, ensuring value addition and fair pricing.

According to Machini, adoption of the Nyota bean variety is central to enhancing both yield and quality. The red-mottled Nyota beans mature in 60-70 days, are drought-tolerant, disease-resistant, and produce 6-10 90 kg bags per acre. They cook within 15-27

minutes, compared to up to three hours for traditional varieties, and are rich in nutrients.

"The fast-maturing and climate-adaptable Nyota bean improves household food security and nutrition while providing a marketable crop for farmers," Machini added.

The variety, whose name means "star" in Swahili, was developed at KALRO Katumani and released for national trials and commercialization in 2017. It thrives in both hot, dry regions and cold highlands, making it versatile for small-scale and subsistence farmers.

# Youth in 38 counties benefit from Sh2.1bn start-up capital as rollout continues

The Funds are expected to expand opportunities for entrepreneurship at the grassroots and accelerate inclusive economic growth

**T**he Government has disbursed over Sh2.1 billion to more than 81,000 youths across the country under the National Youth Opportunities Towards Advancement (NYOTA) project.

The initiative, implemented in partnership with the World Bank, has so far covered 38 out of the 47 counties in its first phase, with the overall target being to reach out to 70 youths in each of the 1,450 wards across the county.

Under the Nyota initiative, each young person is receiving a grant of Sh25,000, which is divided into two to cater for immediate business needs and long-term financial security.

For business needs, Sh22,000 is deposited directly into one's Pochi la Biashara account, a mobile wallet designed for small business transactions.

Therefore, one gets instant access to working capital so that they can purchase stock, pay for services or cover other start-up costs.

The balance, Sh3,000, is credited into the Haba Haba Savings Account managed by the National Social Security Fund (NSSF).

The portion is meant to encourage a culture of saving, ensuring that young entrepreneurs begin their business journeys with a foundation of financial security.

The Sh1.88 billion has been disbursed by President William Ruto in the past weeks as follows:

In Kakamega, Vihiga, Busia and Bungoma counties, some 12,155 beneficiaries received Sh303.8 million from NYOTA.

Similarly, in Uasin Gishu, Elgeyo Marakwet, Nandi, Trans Nzoia, Turkana and West Pokot, 9,500 beneficiaries have received Sh250 million. Sh173.2 million was disbursed to 6,892 youth in Nyeri, Nyandarua, Kirinyaga and Murang'a counties.

In Nakuru, Baringo, Narok, Bomet and Kericho counties, 9,847 beneficiaries have received Sh245.6 million.

In Nairobi, Kiambu and Kajiado counties, 10,337 beneficiaries received Sh258.4 million while Sh103.9 million was disbursed in Laikipia, Isiolo, Samburu and Marsabit to 4,159 beneficiaries. Sh147.5 million was issued out to 5,901 youth in Machakos, Kitui and Makueni counties while Sh181 million was handed to 6,720 young entrepreneurs in Meru, Embu and Tharaka Nithi counties.

In advancement of the NYOTA programme beyond the business component, the

In Kisii, Nyamira and Migori counties, the latest regions to receive their disbursements, Sh220.5 million was disbursed to 8,820 beneficiaries. In Siaya, Kisumu and Homa Bay counties, Sh220 million was disbursed to 8,820 beneficiaries.

"Young people who are yet to benefit from this programme should apply for other components because we want to help as many people as possible through NYOTA, which is part of the Bottom-Up Economic Transformation Agenda that we promised Kenyans," President Ruto said at Gusii Stadium last week.

He added that the youth are a critical part of the development agenda and that the Government will progressively roll out various initiatives aimed at creating employment opportunities.

"You are our country's biggest resource. This is why we are implementing programmes in Affordable Housing, NYOTA, Kazi Majuu and the digital hubs to create jobs for young people," he told thousands of youths.

### DISBURSEMENTS TO YOUTH IN 35 OUT OF 47 COUNTIES

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Government has also rolled out the Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL).

RPL, under the NYOTA initiative, is being implemented through the State Department

for Labour and Skills Development, with the National Industrial Training Authority (NITA) as the lead agency.

Through the programme, the Government is formally acknowledging skills and knowledge gained outside traditional education, particularly among workers in the informal sector, artisans and youth, by providing them with nationally recognised certification offered by NITA.

So far, NITA has screened over 10,000 NYOTA RPL beneficiaries for certification.

The exercise that was conducted countrywide recorded a strong turnout, marking the first step in identifying skilled youth who have acquired competencies through informal and non-formal learning.

Following the screening, the programme now moves to the Portfolio of Evidence (PoE) stage, which is scheduled to begin this week.

At the PoE stage, candidates will document and present proof of their skills and work experience, including samples of work, photos or videos of tasks performed.

The evidence will be assessed against national occupational standards to confirm competence ahead of practical assessment and certification, said NITA. ■

Mr Rotich said the structured engagement lays the foundation for faster fibre optic rollout, predictable regulation, safer digital infrastructure and increased investment across counties.

He said CoG welcomed technology companies, ISPs and digital innovators to partner with County Governments in accelerating last-mile connectivity and inclusive digital services.

## Conference showcases Kenya's leadership in data governance

The Data Privacy Conference 2026 held by the Office of the Data Protection Commissioner (ODPC) last week reaffirmed trust as the foundation of Kenya's fast-growing digital economy.

Held under the theme "Trust the data, drive the future," the conference focused on how organisations and public institutions can responsibly collect, process and share data while protecting individual rights.

Information, Communications and the Digital Economy Cabinet Secretary William Kabogo noted that trust is achieved through transparency, accountability and embedding privacy principles in data governance.

Mr Kabogo, who launched the Data Without Borders report, reaffirmed the Government's commitment to strengthening data protection laws and enabling safe cross-border data flows.

Data Commissioner Immaculate Kassait outlined key regulatory milestones, including the registration of over 15,000 data processors, resolution of 98 per cent of complaints and expansion of the ODPC to eight regional offices.

She said the achievements have positioned Kenya as a credible and trusted data protection regulator globally, strengthening confidence among investors and development partners.
