Mechanisation, he argued, is the lever that will boost productivity, reduce losses, and generate higher incomes while creating new opportunities for skilled employment.

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Mechanization campaign set to improve Kenya's harvests

Kenya is intensifying efforts to modernize agriculture through mechanization and digital innovation, with Agriculture and Livestock Development Cabinet Secretary Mutahi Kagwe urging farmers, financiers, and investors to embrace technology as the key to productivity and food security.

Speaking at the opening of the 12th Agritech Africa Exhibition at the Kenyatta International Convention Centre (KICC) in Nairobi, Kagwe described mechanization as the game changer that will transform farming into a profitable, youth-driven enterprise.

"The average Kenyan farmer is 64 years old. We want to move from 64 to 34. That is the idea behind mechanisation and digitisation," he said, drawing applause. His remarks underscored the urgency of revitalising a sector grappling with an ageing workforce and the need to attract younger generations into agriculture.

Kagwe stressed that Kenya cannot continue relying on traditional methods if it hopes to feed

a growing population and remain competitive in regional and global markets. Mechanisation, he argued, is the lever that will boost productivity, reduce losses, and generate higher incomes while creating new opportunities for skilled employment.

He dismissed fears that machines would replace human labour, insisting instead that they would redefine it. "You remove

the jembe job, but you train the same person to become a tractor operator and give them a better-paying opportunity," he explained.

In his vision, mechanisation is not about eliminating jobs but upgrading them—creating specialised roles in equipment operation, maintenance, repair, and spare parts supply chains.

The Cabinet Secretary revealed that the Government is working with the National Treasury to craft policies that ease the importation of farm machinery while simultaneously encouraging local assembly and manufacturing.

He emphasised that Kenya must not only buy tractors from abroad but also build them locally. "We are happy to buy equipment from China, India, Italy and elsewhere, but we will be even happier when those tractors are manufactured or assembled here in Kenya," he said.

Kagwe extended an open invitation to both local and international investors to partner with the Government in establishing assembly and manufacturing plants. Such ventures, he noted, would reduce costs, create jobs, and strengthen Kenya's indus-

trial base while adding value to the agricultural transformation agenda. To make mechanisation more accessible, Kagwe urged farmers to embrace cooperative approaches.

Village groups, savings organisations and cooperatives, he suggested, could pool resources to jointly purchase equipment and share operational costs.


He also encouraged young entrepreneurs to explore opportunities in tractor hire services, equipment leasing and mechanisation support businesses emerging sectors he described as ripe with growth potential.

Kagwe challenged banks to rethink their lending models, arguing that interest rates of 20 to 25 per cent are prohibitive.

"We are prepared to buy the tractors, but not at 20 or 25 per cent interest rates. Affordable financing of around 10 per cent with repayment periods of between three and five years would make mechanisation accessible to more farmers," he said. He called on machinery suppliers to collaborate with financial institutions to provide

TEMPORARY MORATORIUM ON LICENSING OF NEW PUBLIC SERVICE TRANSPORT OPERATORS

The Authority, in exercising its mandate under the NTSA Act, 2012 and the NTSA (Operation of Public Service Vehicles) Regulations, 2014, hereby issues a temporary moratorium on;

- The licensing of new public transport operators (Saccos and Companies) for a period of 24 months
- Addition of new routes and existing route extension for a period of 12 months, however this may be reconsidered in the event a new road is commissioned.
- Modification or reconfiguration of existing licensed routes including changes to pick and drop points for a period of 12 months

This measure is necessitated by;

- Persistent non-compliance and road safety concerns within the sector
- The proliferation of illegal operators who undercut regulated players by creating significant road safety risks, enabling insecurity, and engaging in unfair competition against licensed operators.
- The Authority's plan to strengthen oversight, enhance the transport management systems, and implement broader sector reforms
- Modification of routes that has resulted in inconsistency and unreliable public transport services.



During this period, the Authority, in consultation with relevant stakeholders and with the support of the County Governments, shall conduct a comprehensive audit of road safety compliance and traffic management, while also assisting existing operators to improve their service standards to meet road safety requirements. The Authority will also be working with County Government to redefine consistent and profitable routes.

NOTE;

- No new applications for PSV Operator Licenses will be accepted or processed during this period
- This decision applies to all prospective operators intending to be licensed by the Authority
- Existing licensed operators shall continue to operate subject to full compliance with safety, licensing, and operational standards.
- Prospective investors and operators are encouraged to use this period to submit to the Authority memorandums/ proposals to promote road safety and enhance effective management of public transport in Kenya.

integrated packages that ease acquisition for smallholders.

Beyond mechanization, Kagwe highlighted the Government's partnership with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO) to advance digital agriculture.

Through technology driven farmer registration, the initiative seeks to capture identities, land ownership details, farm locations and acreage, ensuring subsidies and inputs reach legitimate beneficiaries.

"The title, the location, the size of the land and the farmer's identity will be linked through technology to ensure support reaches the right beneficiaries," he explained.

Digital platforms, he added, will improve planning, monitoring and resource allocation, enabling government agencies to make decisions based on accurate data.

The exhibition itself underscored the scale of innovation sweeping across the continent. Local and international exhibitors showcased cutting edge farm machinery, irrigation technologies, renewable energy solutions and digital farming systems all designed to accelerate Africa's agricultural transformation.

India's High Commissioner to Kenya Dr. Adarsh Swaika reaffirmed New Delhi's commitment to deepen cooperation through technology transfer, innovation and shared best practices.

Koskei calls for public sector reforms to boost productivity

Senior government leaders and policymakers have called for sweeping structural and cultural reforms across the public sector, warning that Kenya's long-term fiscal sustainability and service delivery ambitions hinge on a significant improvement in productivity.

Speaking at the opening of the National Performance and Productivity Conference in Nairobi, Chief of Staff and Head of Public Service Felix Koskei urged public servants to break away from outdated practices that continue to hamper efficiency and innovation across government institutions.

Koskei emphasized that productivity should not be viewed as a temporary initiative or a policy requirement but as a continuous commitment to creating greater value from public resources.

"Productivity is not a one-time initiative, a policy document, or a performance plan; it is a habit of continuously creating greater value from the resources entrusted to us," he said. He urged public institutions to move beyond

a culture of compliance and embrace value creation as the cornerstone of public service. He further called for the protection of professional public service from political interference, arguing that an independent and efficient bureaucracy is critical for achieving national development goals.

The three-day conference, themed "Productivity for Fiscal Sustainability and Efficient Service Delivery," brought

together representatives from the national government, all 47 county governments, the private sector, trade unions, and development partners. Organizers adopted a whole-of-government approach aimed at fostering collaboration and sharing best practices on productivity enhancement.

Salaries and Remuneration Commission (SRC) Chairperson Sammy Chepkwony said Kenya

had made notable progress in managing its public wage bill, which has declined from 55 percent in 2020 to 40 percent in 2026 through strategic expenditure controls and workforce management measures.


However, he cautioned that expenditure reduction alone cannot guarantee sustainable fiscal health.


"The expenditure control curve is starting to flatten at its tail end, proving that the more you control, the results are not significant," Chepkwony observed.

He noted that future fiscal gains must be driven by measurable productivity improvements that focus on outcomes and impact rather than simply controlling inputs and costs.

Council of Governors Chairperson and Wajir Governor Ahmed Abdullahi identified weak workplace culture as one of the major barriers to productivity. He criticized the tendency by some public officers to treat government employment as a secondary commitment while prioritizing private business interests.

Abdullahi said public resources and working hours must be utilized effectively to ensure citizens receive quality services and value for money.

New policy to create digital jobs for youth

The Government has approved a new Business Process Outsourcing (BPO) policy designed to create digital employment opportunities for hundreds of thousands of young Kenyans who are unable to secure formal jobs each year. Labour and Skills Development Principal Secretary Shadrack

Mwadime said the policy, recently approved by Cabinet, will establish a framework to protect workers in the digital economy while positioning Kenya as a leading player in the global outsourcing market.

Speaking during the launch of a digital learning and foreign languages programme at Great Lakes University of Kisumu, Mwadime said the country faces a growing employment challenge, with

nearly 700,000 young people left without formal jobs annually.

“Every year we produce close to one million graduates and school leavers, but our economy is only able to absorb about 300,000 into formal employment. The rest must be supported through alternative opportunities, including digital jobs and entrepreneurship,” he said.

The PS said the government was increasingly focusing on digital employment as a practical solution to youth unemployment, citing cases of young Kenyans earning substantial incomes through online work.

He revealed that one young Kenyan recently earned Sh. 400,000 from a single digital assignment, demonstrating the potential of the sector to generate wealth and employment.

“Many people do not understand what digital jobs can do. Some young people work at night because they are serving clients in different time zones across the world. These opportunities are real and can transform lives,” he said.

Mwadime noted that the BPO policy would help safeguard the interests of Kenyans working online while creating a conducive environment for growth in the sector.

The announcement comes as the government intensifies efforts to address unemployment among the country’s youthful population.

According to Mwadime, Kenya’s average age is about 18 years, with roughly 70 per cent of the population aged below 35.

While the government continues to promote overseas employment through the Kazi Majuu programme, Mwadime said digital work offers an opportunity for young people to earn globally while remaining in the country.

He said the government had already secured employment opportunities for more than

560,000 Kenyans abroad over the last three years and was expanding labour agreements with countries in Europe and North America.

At the same time, the State Department for Labour is working with universities and training institutions to align academic programmes with labour market demands.

Mwadime said employers frequently raise concerns about graduates lacking work-place-ready skills despite spending years in training institutions.

“We want educational institutions to become recruitment centres where students transition directly into employment. Universities must train for the market that exists today and the opportunities that are emerging globally,” he said.

The launch at Great Lakes University of Kisumu introduced a digital classroom ecosystem supported by Samsung and other partners, alongside foreign language training programmes targeting opportunities in Germany, Canada, the Gulf region and other international labour markets.

The PS said language proficiency was becoming increasingly important as Kenya positions its workforce for global competitiveness.

“German, Arabic, Mandarin, Korean and Spanish are no longer just languages. They are economic pathways that open doors to jobs, business opportunities and labour mobility,” he said.

Great Lakes University Vice Chancellor Professor Hazel Miseda Mumbo described the initiative as a major step towards leveraging technology to tackle unemployment.

“We have already seen people living in Kenya and working for organisations abroad. Technology and digital skills are creating opportunities that were previously unavailable to many young people,” she said.

Hatching centre a boon to Marimanti poultry farmers

been relying on private companies, which has been an expensive undertaking for them.

The initiative is aimed at alleviating poverty and creating employment.

According to Matthew Papa, the Head of Marimanti Hatching Centre, the facility will bring improvement and change to farmers in the area because they will have access to high

quality breeds of chicks that are disease-resistant and buy as many chicks as they want, without any limitation because there would be flow of production at the facility.

“The one-day-chicks that are very rare to get will be readily available because the farmers will acquire them from the first day they are hatched and monitor their growth,” Papa noted.

New public ferry to connect Kisumu, Homa Bay and surrounding islands

Plans to boost water transport on Lake Victoria are gathering momentum as the government moves closer to launching a new public ferry expected to transform the movement of people and goods across the region. The project received a major boost after the National Treasury allocated Sh150 million in the 2026/2027 budget to complete the vessel, which is being assembled by Kenya Shipyards Limited in Kisumu.

The ferry is expected to be commissioned later this year as part of broader efforts to revive maritime transport on the lake.

Once operational, it will connect Kisumu, Kendu Bay, Homa Bay, and Muhuru Bay, while extending services to remote islands, including Mfangano. The service is expected to provide a cheaper and safer transport alternative, while also opening up new trade opportunities for communities around the lake.

Construction of supporting infrastructure is also nearing completion. Piers in Muhuru Bay and Homa Bay Town, which will

serve as key docking points, are more than 95 percent complete, according to government officials overseeing the project.

Treasury Cabinet Secretary, John Mbadi, recently announced additional funding for Lake transport infrastructure, including allocations for the rehabilitation of Mbita and Sena piers in Homa Bay County.

The network of piers will be

managed by the Kenya Ports Authority (KPA), with officials saying the facilities are expected to play a key role in unlocking the economic potential of Lake Victoria through trade, fisheries and tourism.

Interior Principal Secretary, Dr Raymond Omollo said the project is aligned with the government's Blue-Economy agenda and will complement ongoing investments in road infrastructure, including the upgraded Masara-Muhuru Bay road.

For many years, communities around Homa Bay and Muhuru Bay have depended largely on road transport despite their strategic location along the shores of Lake Victoria. Leaders and residents have long advocated for the revival of lake transport, citing lower costs, improved safety and greater efficiency.

At Muhuru Bay, construction works include a 50 by 30 meters reinforced concrete jetty designed to accommodate larger vessels, cold storage facilities for fish, perimeter security installations and an administration block for port and customs services.

A similar facility is taking shape in Homa Bay Town, where ongoing works include terminal

buildings, warehouses, power houses, a ferry waiting bay, security checkpoints and water storage facilities.

Both ports will host One-Stop Border Posts aimed at facilitating trade and movement across the lake region. According to Omollo, the modern port facilities are expected to reduce post-harvest losses among fishermen, improve fish handling and storage and strengthen links between emerging ports in Homa Bay, Sori and Kisumu.

"The State Department for Internal Security and National Administration is providing maritime security enforcement to regulate cross-border movement and safeguard infrastructure," Omollo said.

He added that the modernization of the lake transport network would position Homa Bay and Migori counties as important centres for trade, transport and tourism, while improving livelihoods for communities living around the lake basin.

Local traders have welcomed the developments, saying improved water transport will reduce the cost of doing business and shorten travel times between key towns and landing sites.

ADVISORY ON BRANDING OF PUBLICLY FUNDED PROJECTS AND PROGRAMMES

The Commission's attention has been drawn to an emerging trend of branding public projects and programmes with names, images, or symbols of specific individuals, political parties, or leaders. Various reports received by the Commission indicate that certain political leaders have consistently branded public funded projects and programmes with their personal names, images and/or symbols.

While recognition of public service is important, branding of publicly funded projects and programmes with the identities of political office holders amounts to abuse of office, misuse of public resources and unethical conduct contrary to Articles 10, 73 and 75, 201 (d) of the Constitution of Kenya, 2010, Public Finance Management Act, 2012 and the Leadership and Integrity Act, 2012.

Further, the Constitution sets out clear guiding principles on leadership and integrity, emphasizing that state and public officers shall:

- Act in a manner that promotes public interest over personal or political gain;
- Uphold transparency and accountability in the management of public resources; and
- Maintain high standards of integrity in the discharge of their duties.

In light of the foregoing, the Commission advises:

- State and public officers to refrain from using public resources to promote personal, political, or partisan interests;
- public entities to take proactive action to ensure public projects and programmes do not bear the names, images, portraits, or symbols of serving state or public officers, political leaders, or political parties prior to commencement, during implementation or after completion;
- the relevant implementing public entities or agencies to ensure that where recognition is necessary, it must only reflect the responsible government entity and clearly indicate whether the project or programme is supported by the National or County Government, without including personal identifiers or portraits; and
- all State and public officers to strictly adhere to this Directive.

The Commission will closely monitor adherence, and violations may attract administrative or legal sanctions.

Devolution programme sets new safety standards for projects across 47 counties

The State Department for Devolution, through the World Bank-funded Second Kenya Devolution Support Program (KDSP II), has rolled out the Environmental, Social, Health, and Safety Risks and Impact Management Framework across all 47 counties.

This rollout marks a significant milestone in supporting counties to implement development projects that are environmentally sustainable, socially inclusive, safe for workers and communities, accountable to citizens, and aligned with the country's legal framework.

Speaking during a sensitization forum attended by representatives from all 47 counties, KDSP II National Programme Coordinator Dr. Samuel Nyaga noted that the development and rollout of the Environmental, Social, Health,

and Safety Risks and Impact Management Manual sets a new benchmark for how counties execute development projects.

"The implementation of infrastructure projects in counties

has faced significant challenges related to environmental sustainability, social responsibility, health and safety compliance."

"This gap results in inconsistent approaches to environ-

mental management, potential health and safety hazards, and socio-economic impacts that subsequently undermine sustainable development efforts in the 47 Counties" Dr. Nyaga said in his address.

Dr Nyaga believes the rollout of the manual helps counties move from "knowing about basic safeguard procedures" to actually using them. The manual supports counties to spot, prevent, and manage environmental and social risks throughout the project's life cycle.

According to Nyaga, the manual focuses on strengthening existing country and county systems, improving institutional capacity, promoting accountability, supporting stakeholder participation, and enhancing performance-based service delivery.

"Under the new framework, counties must align their infrastructure projects with national

and international Environmental, Social, Health, and Safety standards," Dr. Nyaga emphasized.

Speaking on the sidelines of the forum, Social Safeguards Specialist Muthoni Kang'ara explained that the manual ensures that health, safety, social and environmental protections are fully integrated into the core county operations and the KDSP II programme.

"The manual gives counties clear steps to protect workers, engage all project stakeholders including vulnerable and marginalized groups and enhance accountability in projects. It also puts in place measures to prevent sexual abuse and harassment," said Muthoni.

Additionally, Muthoni says the manual will ensure social safeguards "are not treated as an afterthought," but as part of project design and implementation.

Blood transfusion services get closer as Garissa centre opens

Residents of the North Eastern region and parts of Eastern Kenya seeking blood transfusion services have reason to celebrate following the official opening of the Garissa Regional Blood Transfusion Centre, which will bring services closer to the communities.

Previously, blood collected in the region had to be transported to Nairobi for testing and screening, a process that posed major challenges during emergencies and often delayed patient care.

Speaking during the official commissioning of the facility, Health Cabinet Secretary Aden Duale said that the center was a game changer for the local residents as it would significantly reduce turn-around times, strengthen emergency response, improve patient outcomes and enhance healthcare delivery across the region.

Duale at the same time said that the government was committed to ensuring that no life would be lost due to avoidable circumstances including lack of access to blood for transfusion.

"Today we have commissioned the state of the art Garissa Regional Blood Transfusion Centre, which will cover five counties including Wajir, Mandera, Garissa, Isiolo, Lamu, Kitui and Tana River. As we commemorate the World Blood Donor Day, I want to thank

all those who donated blood to save lives," Duale said.

"Every unit of blood donated ensures that we save lives. Blood is the most precious resource in our healthcare. It remains one of the most essential and irreplaceable health products in our healthcare system," he added.

With a capacity to store over 600 units of blood, the

facility is set to strengthen regional preparedness and ensure a more reliable supply for health facilities and emergency situations.

Garissa County Governor Nathif Jama on his part noted that the new facility would improve blood collection, testing, storage and distribution hence ensuring timely access to safe blood across the region.

Solar mini-grid lights up 300 homes in Turkana's Locheremoit

More than 300 households in Locheremoit, Turkana Central Sub-county, have benefited from solar-powered energy funded through a partnership involving the European Union, the Government of France, the United Kingdom, and the County Government of Turkana.

Governor Jeremiah Lomorukai joined European Union Ambassador to Kenya Henriette Geiger and her French counterpart Arnaud Suquet to commission the Green Mini-Grid Programme in Locheremoit.

Geiger urged residents to make productive use of the new infrastructure, saying investments in sustainable energy create opportunities for communities, while supporting long-term economic development.

She encouraged the community to maximize the benefits of the project and honour the partnership that made it possible.

On his part, Suquet described energy as a fundamental driver of development, noting that the mini-grid would serve more than 30,000 residents, while contributing to Kenya's electrification ambitions. Suquet reaffirmed France's commitment

to working alongside the European Union, the United Kingdom and the County Government of Turkana to promote inclusive development and unlock the county's tourism and economic potential.

The area governor described the project as a transformative investment that will spur business growth and expand access to reliable, clean energy for residents.

Lomorukai expressed gratitude to the development partners for their continued support, noting that the impact of their investments was already evident in businesses benefiting from afford-

ble and reliable power in Locheremoit, one of Turkana's most vibrant trading centres.

"We do not take this support for granted. We have visited businesses that are already benefiting from the project, enabling traders to preserve their commodities and extend their operating hours," he said.

Lomorukai appealed for additional renewable energy investments in Turkana, including a project similar to the Lake Turkana Wind Power initiative in neighbouring Marsabit County.

Such an investment, he said, would meet local energy demand while supplying excess power to the national grid and generating revenue for the county.

He also pointed to the potential of the Napuu Aquifer, noting that its development could significantly improve water supply in the county.

Farmers in Wundanyi Sub-county, Taita-Taveta County, are set to benefit significantly after the Government officially handed over the Sh45 million Laghale Irrigation Project, a major step towards enhancing food security and boosting local agribusiness.

The Chief Engineer and Director of Irrigation and Drainage at the State Department for Irrigation, Eng. Bernard Onyango, led the final inspection and handover ceremony in Mbale, Mogho, and Sungululu sub-locations.

His team toured the water intake

Stakeholders push for affordable energy to drive industrial competitiveness

Industry leaders, policymakers, development partners, and private sector representatives have called for closer alignment between Kenya's energy and manufacturing sectors, stressing that affordable, reliable, and predictable energy is vital to accelerating industrial growth and competitiveness.

Speaking at the Kenya National Industrialization Partners Convening in Nairobi, Industrialization Secretary Prof. Erastus Gatebe underscored the need for policies backed by resilient implementation frameworks to drive sustainable industrialization.

Participants emphasized that policy certainty and long-term planning are critical to attracting

investment in manufacturing and energy infrastructure.

Energy sector officials, led by Director George Ngayu, highlighted the importance of competitive electricity pricing. They noted that investments in variable renewable energy, transmission infrastructure, and regional interconnections depend on clear, cost-reflective tariff structures.

"There is need for stronger coordination between the manufacturing and energy sectors. We are proposing the development of Special Economic Zones (SEZs) near energy sources to reduce infrastructure costs and improve industrial productivity," added Ngayu. The forum further underscored the need for energy efficiency measures, with partic-

ipants forging for an alignment of the Least Cost Power Development Plan (LCPDP) with Kenya's industrialization Policy ambitions to ensure energy planning responded effectively to current and future industrial demand. The discussions also focused on the financial implications of long-term power purchase agreements (PPAs), with stakeholders in the

financial sector arguing that existing commitments continue to affect electricity costs and market liberalization efforts.

"We need to explore innovative financing mechanisms, including bond instruments and budget-neutral models, to lower energy costs while maintaining investor confidence in the power sector," proposed Director of Industries Stanley Koske, who is spearheading a team to review the National Industrialization Policy alongside Global Energy Alliance for People and Planet (GEAPP).

The growing role of e-mobility in industrial development featured prominently during the forum. BasiGo Chief Executive Officer Jit Bhattacharya noted that supportive policies had enabled the company to grow from manufacturing two electric buses to more than 150 annually.

"Incentives for electric vehicles, local assembly and SEZ investments could stimulate domestic manufacturing, create jobs, reduce imports and position Kenya as a regional hub for clean industrial development and exports within the East African Community," noted Bhattacharya.

Africa urged to strengthen capital markets to unlock investment

African countries have been urged to deepen and integrate their capital markets in order to mobilise long-term financing, attract private investment, and accelerate economic transformation across the continent. The call was made during the launch of Africa Capital Week (AfCW) 2026 at the Kenya School of Monetary Studies in Nairobi. The forum, scheduled for August 31 to September 4, 2026, will bring together policymakers, regulators, investors, development finance institutions, and private sector leaders to explore solutions to Africa's financing challenges and advance the continent's economic sovereignty.

Speaking during the launch, Principal Secretary for Economic Planning Dr. Boniface Makokha said Africa must strengthen its financial systems and develop innovative financing mechanisms to support sustainable development and reduce dependence on external funding.

"Africa is not seeking sympathy; Africa is seeking investment. Africa is not a continent of risk. Africa is a continent of opportunity whose risks have too often been mispriced and misrepresented," said Dr. Makokha.

He noted that Africa continues to face limited access to affordable long-term financing and an overpricing of sovereign risk, factors that increase the cost of funding development projects.

He added that Kenya's economy grew by 4.6 per cent in 2025, with a nominal Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of about Sh17.58 trillion, underscoring the country's resilience and investment potential.

Acting Director General of the Vision 2030 Delivery Secretariat, James Maina, said Africa possesses abundant resources, entrepreneurial talent and investment opportunities but requires stronger partnerships and efficient capital markets to unlock sustainable growth.

He said Africa Capital Week would serve as a platform for transforming policy commitments into practical investments by connecting investors with bankable projects across the continent.

A: BACKGROUND:

The Kenya National Highways Authority (KeNHA) received a Privately Initiated Proposal (PIP) from a Consortium of China Road and Bridge Corporation (CRBC) and National Social Security Fund Board of Trustees (NSSF) for the Design, Build, Finance, Operate, Maintain and Transfer (DBFOMT) of the Rironi – Naivasha – Gilgil (A8) Road and Rironi – Maai Mahiu – Naivasha (A8 South) Road i.e. approximately 81 Km of the A8 Road and 58 Km of the A8 South Road from Rironi Interchange to Naivasha through Maai Mahiu. The Project road traverses three counties namely Kiambu, Nyandarua and Nakuru. The PIP was granted conditional approval to proceed to Project Development Phase (PDP) by the PPP Committee after which the Project Proponent undertook Project Development Phase (PDP) activities/ Feasibility Studies and submitted a Feasibility Study Report.

Pursuant to the submissions, the Contracting Authority carried out evaluation on the Project Development Phase documentation in accordance with the provisions of Section 43(9) of the PPP Act, Cap 430. The Evaluation Report, prepared in compliance with Section 43, identified China Road & Bridge Corporation (CRBC) and National Social Security Fund Board of Trustees (NSSF) consortium as the Preferred Proponent to undertake the project road section, as per Section 55(1)(d) of the PPP Act. The PPP Committee subsequently delivered its decision during its 48th Extraordinary PPP Committee meeting held on 10th November, 2025 to the effect that the Committee adopted the recommendations of the Evaluation Report, which identified CRBC-NSSF as the preferred proponent for the Rironi – Naivasha – Gilgil (A8) & Rironi – Maai Mahiu – Naivasha (A8 South), subject to the fulfilment of the conditions outlined in the Evaluation Report.

The Contracting Authority commenced negotiations with the Proponent and subsequently submitted the Project and Financial Risk Assessment Report together with the initialed project agreement to the PPP Directorate for its recommendations, and thereafter to the PPP Committee for approval in accordance with Section 58 (1) and 58 (2) of the PPP Act, Cap 430.

Solar powered borehole to end long, risky treks for water in local village

For years, residents of Ngilukea in Turkana County have endured long and often dangerous journeys in search of water. Women and children walked for miles to seasonal rivers and dry riverbeds, facing not only harsh weather conditions but also insecurity along the way.

That struggle is now easing with the commissioning of a new borehole, which will provide a reliable source of clean water to more than 3,000 residents in the area. The borehole, commissioned by Cabinet Secretary for East African Community, Regional

Development Authorities and Arid and Semi-Arid Lands (ASAL) Beatrice Askul, is expected to produce 5.8 cubic metres of water per hour.

The project was implemented by the Kerio Valley Development Authority (KVDA), as part of efforts to improve access to water

in vulnerable communities.

Speaking during the event, Askul noted that the new water source will transform lives in Ngilukea, a remote settlement in Suguta Sub-County, where residents have long depended on seasonal water sources that often dry up during prolonged droughts.

She said the search for water had exposed families to numerous risks, particularly in the volatile Suguta Valley where insecurity remains a challenge.

“Women and children have often faced danger while travelling long distances in search of water. In some cases, lives have been lost,” she said.

The Cabinet Secretary added that pastoralists in the region have also suffered significant losses, as they moved with their livestock in search of water and pasture, sometimes falling victim to attacks and cattle rustling.

Residents expressed optimism that the solar-powered borehole will reduce these hardships by bringing safe water closer to their homes. Besides easing access to water, the project is expected to improve public health by reducing reliance on contaminated surface water sources that are associated with diseases such as cholera and typhoid.

Local leaders said the availability of water will also support school attendance, strengthen livestock production, and help reduce conflicts over scarce resources.

Ngilukea Sub-location lies within the arid Suguta Valley, an area that experiences low and unpredictable rainfall and is frequently affected by drought, insecurity, and the impacts of climate change.

The new borehole is therefore seen not only as a water project, but also as a source of renewed hope for a community that has long faced multiple challenges.

CJ calls for enhanced funding for Alternative Justice Systems

Chief Justice Martha Koome has called for increased budgetary allocation to the Judiciary to support the growth and sustainability of Alternative Justice Systems (AJS) across the country.

Speaking during the opening of the 4th National Alternative Justice Systems Conference at the University of Embu in Embu County, Koome said adequate funding is critical in ensuring justice programmes are implemented effectively without interruptions.

She noted that the Judiciary requires sufficient resources to meet its constitutional mandate and expand access to

justice through community-based dispute resolution mechanisms. She added that Alternative Justice Systems have played a key role in reducing the backlog of cases in courts by offering citizens alternative avenues for resolving disputes.

Koome expressed concern that the government has allocated

only a small amount of money towards supporting AJS programmes despite their growing importance in the justice sector. She noted that disputes involving families and land often take years to conclude in court, yet many could be resolved more quickly through Alternative Justice Systems involving elders and mediators.

Closing the gap to 2030: A call for leadership, accountability, and action

MESSAGE FROM THE CABINET SECRETARY FOR WATER, SANITATION AND IRRIGATION

Stronger leadership, accountability, and operational efficiency is needed within the water sector. Many stakeholders may not fully grasp the significance and depth of the information contained in the *'Impact 18 Report'* until its findings are brought to the forefront and translated into action.

Capacity gaps exist within Water Service Providers (WSPs). Notably, non-revenue water (NRW) has increased from 44 per cent to 48 per cent over the past year, translating into an estimated loss of KSh14.8 billion. These losses represent resources that could otherwise be used to expand and improve water services across the country. The greatest

challenge facing the water sector is not a lack of funding but the significant losses resulting from inefficiencies and water wastage. I challenge sector leaders to reflect on the true meaning of leadership, and that effective leadership requires making difficult and, at times, unpopular decisions that safeguard the long-term sustainability of institutions and services.

We are now four years away from the SDG targets and Kenya's Vision 2030 aspirations. The sector must accelerate progress to stay on track toward universal access to water and sanitation services. The target is an annual increase of two percentage points in water coverage, three-and-a-half percentage points in sewerage sanitation coverage, and one percentage point in sanitation coverage.

Findings from the current *'Impact*

18 Report' show that water coverage and sanitation have grown in line with annual targets and demonstrates sector progress. However, sewerage sanitation coverage has not achieved the required annual growth. We need to intensify investment, stronger implementation, and better collaboration among stakeholders. These efforts will help accelerate expansion and close the existing gap before 2030.

I reaffirm the Government's commitment to strengthening the water sector through strategic investments aimed at enhancing service delivery, improving infrastructure, and ensuring sustainable access to water and sanitation services for all Kenyans. I would like to highlight the Horn of Africa Groundwater for Resilience Project, under which approximately KSh13.5 billion has been committed

to support groundwater resilience initiatives in border counties, thereby enhancing water security for vulnerable communities.

The financing requirement for universal access by 2030 far exceeds annual public allocations, and it is only through disciplined delivery that we will sustain the confidence of Parliament, the National Treasury, and our Development Partners.

Focus is often on seeking external solutions while overlooking opportunities to optimise existing resources and assets already within the sector. I therefore urge all sector players to maximise the use of available infrastructure, financial resources, and expertise before pursuing additional interventions.

MESSAGE FROM PS WATER AND SANITATION, MR JULIUS K. KORIR

Sustainable development and human dignity continue to be based on access to safe, reasonably priced, and dependable water and sanitation services. As we present the 18th edition of the *IMPACT Report*, we consider the vital role that regulation plays in promoting accountability, transparency, and equity throughout Kenya's water sector.

This year's theme, *"The Final Stretch to 2030: Delivering Water and Sanitation for All"* underscores the urgency of accelerating progress towards universal access by closing existing service gaps and enhancing the performance of Water Service Providers through compliance with regulatory standards and best practices.

On the question of delivery, Parliament has spoken, and the Ministry stands with it. The ongoing efforts to address delays in water projects, in-

agency must treat project timelines as binding commitments to the Kenyan people, not aspirations.

At the retail level, the regulatory framework is also delivering results. Water companies across the country have implemented revised tariffs approved by the Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB), responding to rising operational costs and to commitments on last-mile connectivity and debt financing. I wish to underscore one principle that the Government holds firm: the additional revenue is ring-fenced for infrastructure upgrades. Tariffs must translate into improved service at the household tap — never merely into higher bills. This is the social contract on which the legitimacy of cost-reflective pricing rests, and my Ministry will hold the sector to it.

Sanitation has for too long remained the quieter half of our mandate. The Government has now launched the

National Sanitation Management Policy — a framework that brings together all key stakeholders to drive safely managed sanitation for all by 2030, in fulfilment of Article 43 of our Constitution, which guarantees every Kenyan reasonable standard of sanitation. A policy, however, is only as strong as the evidence that tracks its implementation. I therefore commend WASREB for publishing the Sanitation Key Performance Indicator (KPI), which will provide the baseline against which the Policy's 2030 ambition is measured — utility by utility and county by county.

This Report provides an impartial assessment of sector performance across licensed Water Service Providers (WSPs) and counties, highlighting key insights into their levels of compliance. Crucially, the regulatory environment must ensure that non-compliance is not a viable option—through consistent enforcement, appropriate sanctions, and strengthened institutional

accountability.

WASREB has prioritised collaborative regulation in accordance with national and international commitments, such as the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). We are still collaborating closely with County Governments, WSPs, consumers, and development partners to enhance governance, investment planning, and open up new financing options. We hope these collaborations will spur quantifiable improvements in service resilience, quality, and coverage.

Since we can only attain universal and equitable access to water and sanitation for all Kenyans through shared responsibility, I implore all stakeholders in the sector to continue to be resolute in their commitment to regulatory compliance so that together, we can ensure that by 2030, every Kenyan has access to safe, reliable, and sustainable water and sanitation services.

Regulation that delivers: Driving accountability, performance and universal access

MESSAGE FROM CHAIRMAN, WATER SERVICES REGULATORY BOARD

'Impact 18 Report' findings provide encouraging signs of progress. The sector has recorded improvements in key performance areas, including water coverage, drinking water quality, personnel expenditure management, operation and maintenance cost coverage, sewerage sanitation, and overall sanitation coverage. These gains demonstrate the commitment of sector players to improving service delivery and the effectiveness of ongoing regulatory interventions.

However, Non-Revenue Water has increased significantly. How can we effectively reduce it? Addressing this challenge requires bold and sustained investment in smart metering, full digitisation of utility operations, and stronger enforcement against illegal connections. These measures are essential for safeguarding resources, improving operational efficiency, and ensuring the financial viability of our utilities.

On the role of Water Service Providers, I maintain that they remain the vital bridge between policy and the citizens we serve. They must be placed at the centre of the national conversation on water security. Without empowered and accountable Water Service Providers, our regulatory efforts cannot translate into meaningful impact and improved service delivery for Kenyans.

The sector's prospects have been further strengthened by the Government's commitment to water and sanitation development. The 2026 national budget allocated an additional KSh4.89 billion to support climate resilience initiatives, expand household access to services, and contribute to lowering the cost of living for Kenyans. This investment reflects the recognition that water and sanitation are fundamental to economic growth, public health, and social development.

With increased investment comes increased responsibility. Every public resource committed to the sector carries an expectation that it will translate into improved services at the household, school, healthcare facility, and community levels. As the regulator, Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB) remains committed to ensuring accountability and value for money through robust monitoring, performance reporting, licensing, and enforcement of governance standards. Good regulation not only safeguards public resources but also strengthens

investor confidence and supports the long-term financial sustainability of the sector.

The growing focus on accountability across the sector is equally encouraging. Increased scrutiny of project implementation and service delivery reflects a broader commitment to ensuring that investments produce tangible results. WASREB welcomes such scrutiny because accountability is essential to sector transformation. Through benchmarking, public reporting, and incentive-based regulation, the Board continues to promote a culture where performance is measured, reported, and improved.

At the utility level, regulatory interventions are also supporting sustainability and service expansion. Several Water Service Providers have implemented tariff adjustments approved by WASREB to address rising operational costs and support infrastructure development. These approvals are guided by a clear principle: additional revenue must be directed towards improving services and expanding

access. Consumers should experience visible improvements in service quality, reliability, and infrastructure as a result of these investments. WASREB will continue to closely monitor compliance to ensure that tariff adjustments deliver the intended benefits.

As Kenya moves closer to the 2030 deadline for achieving national development goals and the Sustainable Development Goals, the importance of evidence-based regulation, sound governance, and strong partnerships cannot be overstated. The Impact Report demonstrates that progress is possible when institutions remain focused on performance, accountability, and continuous improvement.

I reaffirm WASREB's commitment to regulating in the public interest. Our work is guided by one overriding objective: ensuring that every Kenyan has access to safe, reliable, affordable, and sustainable water and sanitation services. We will continue to strengthen regulation, promote accountability, and support sector transformation until this goal becomes a reality for all.



IMPACT 18 REPORT LAUNCH



The Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB) has released the 18th issue of IMPACT Report. This edition of IMPACT covers the period 2024/25 and analyses performance of 92 (88 public and three private) Water Service Providers and 47 Counties. It also presents the overall situation of water coverage at the county level by incorporating data collected on small-scale water service providers in the rural and under-served areas. The report is meant to give feedback to the public on how the water services sector is performing, with a view of holding to account institutions charged with service delivery.

Performance analysis is based on nine Key Performance Indicators. These are Water Coverage, Water Quality, Hours of Supply, Non-Revenue Water, Metering, Staff Productivity, Revenue Collection Efficiency, Personnel expenditure as a percentage of Operations and Maintenance cost, and Operations and Management cost-coverage.

The average Water Coverage for piped water systems in the regulated utilities was 72 per cent, an

improvement of two percentage points from 2023/24, where coverage was 70 per cent.

An additional 1,261,271 people were served in 2024/25, compared to a 3,266,760 increase in the number of people within the service areas of WSPs in the previous period.

Production increased by nine percent, from 461 million cubic metres to 504 million m³, while sector turnover increased by 14 per cent, from KSh28.8 billion to KSh32.8 billion. Active water connections grew from 1.85 million to 1.87 million, representing a one per cent growth.

The population served increased from 21.5 million to 22.8 million, representing a six per cent growth. The gap between these two growth rates suggests significant reliance on shared or communal connections, which has implications for service equity

The national average for Drink-

ing Water Quality was 96 per cent, a notable improvement of seven percentage points from the previous period.

Overall sanitation improved by 1 percentage point to 93 per cent. This covers populations with access to facilities including flush or pour-flush to piped sewer systems, septic tanks, ventilated improved pit latrines, and traditional pit latrines with a squatting slab. The population served with sewerage services in the regulated WSPs improved from 15 per cent to 16 per cent, with the number of people served increasing by five per cent, representing an additional 240,701 people. The population in the service area increased by two per cent.

Under the Water Act 2016, WASREB is mandated to report to the public annually to promote transparency and accountability in the sector.

Highlights of how regulated utilities performed in selected areas

Water Coverage

- Improved from 70 per cent to 72 per cent for piped water systems in the regulated utilities.
- There was additional 1,261,271 people served in 2024/25 compared to a 3,266,760 increase in number of people within the service area of the WSPs in the previous period
- Production during the period increased by nine per cent while the turnover increased by 14 per cent.
- Active water connections increased from the previous 1.85 million to 1.87 million, representing a one per cent growth.
- The population served increased from 21.5 million to 22.8 million, representing an a six per cent growth.

- Despite a marginal improvement from 26.42 litres per capita per day in 2023/24 to 26.68 litres per capita per day in 2024/25, per capita consumption remains far short of the recommended standard of 50 litres per capita per day.

Non-Revenue Water Reduction

- Non-Revenue Water increased from 44 per cent to 48 per cent.
- The sector recorded financial losses of approximately KSh13.7 billion, after accounting for the acceptable non-revenue water threshold of 25 per cent.
- The amount lost annually in terms of volume is 242 million cubic meters.

Metering

- The metering level remained at 97 per cent
- Higher metering levels mean metering is being utilised as a tool for accounting for the water produced.

Staff Productivity

- The average staff productivity remained at seven seven
- The medium and small category registered 12 and 22 staff per 1,000 connections an improvement from the previous period where medium and small registered 13 and 24 respectively.

Personnel Expenditure as a Percentage of Operations and Maintenance Costs

- There was a notable improvement in performance of this indicator from 47 per cent in 2023/24 to 44 per cent in 2024/25. This decline was attributed to the large and medium

categories, which declined by four and three per cent respectively.

- Considering the sector benchmarks, personnel expenditure is still high, a trend that implies constrained resources meant for other operations and a decline in service quality.

Revenue Collection Efficiency

- Overall, performance in this indicator dropped slightly from 95 per cent in 2023/24 to 94 per cent in 2024/25.
- This indicator is crucial because internally generated, and collected revenue provides reliable liquidity for the WSPs to fund its operations.

Cost Coverage

- Cost coverage increased by five percentage points, rising from 98 per cent to 103 per cent. This marks a positive trend for two years in a row.
- Higher cost coverage means improved sustainability and financial resilience for the sector. Lower cost coverage would be a threat to sustainability.

Sewered Sanitation Coverage

- The population served with sewerage services improved from 15 per cent to 16 per cent in the regulated WSPs despite the number of people served increasing by five per cent.
- This increase was equivalent to 240,701 people.
- The average number of people served per sewer connection remained at 12 people per connection in 2024/25
- Sewered sanitation coverage is a sub-set of sanitation coverage and refers to the number of peo-

ple served with flush or pour-flush to piped sewer systems.

Sanitation Coverage

- The overall sanitation for the period improved slightly to 93 per cent in 2024/25 from 92 per cent in 2023/24.
- It measures performance regarding the provision of sewerage and non-sewered sanitation.
- Only about 58 per cent of sanitation is safely managed which underpins the need for effective management of

sanitation components from containment to treatment.

The 'Impact Report' serves as WASREB's main tool for public reporting and documents the performance of Kenya's water services sector over a given period of time. It is meant to spur comparative competition in the sector, thus creating impetus for institutions to improve their performance whilst encouraging accountability of stakeholders in the water sector to the public.

Kenya hosts global ocean summit as leaders push for marine protection

Kenya has positioned itself at the forefront of global efforts to protect and sustainably utilize ocean resources after hosting the opening of the 11th Our Ocean Conference (OOC11) in Mombasa. The conference brought together world leaders, policymakers, scientists, investors and conservationists to address mounting threats facing the world's oceans. Officially opening the conference on behalf of President Dr. William Ruto, Deputy President Kithure Kindiki warned that oceans across the globe are under unprecedented pressure for human activities, calling for urgent collective action to safeguard marine ecosystems.

"The oceans around the world are facing serious anthropogenic pressures arising from degrading ecosystems, pollution and other harmful activities," Kindiki said. "Our understanding of the responsibility of the current generation to the ocean is that we have borrowed it from our children, to whom we must return it better, cleaner and safer."

The Deputy President said Kenya is committed to transforming the vast resources of the Indian Ocean within its jurisdiction into opportunities that empower coastal communities while ensuring the protection of marine biodiversity for future generations.

The conference, being held in Africa for the first time since its inception, has placed Kenya

at the centre of international discussions on ocean conservation and the sustainable blue economy.

The CS for Mining, Blue Economy and Maritime Affairs Hassan Joho used his keynote address to issue a strong appeal for accelerated global action, noting that oceans have historically shaped identities,

sustained livelihoods, inspired cultures, and facilitated trade across nations.

"Climate change, marine pollution, biodiversity loss, habitat degradation and illegal fishing are putting marine ecosystems and the millions of people who depend on them at serious risk," CS Joho said. He reaffirmed Kenya's commitment to unlock-

ing the full potential of the Blue Economy through science-based policies, sustainable resource management, innovation and strategic partnerships while protecting marine ecosystems.

The Cabinet Secretary urged the international community to move beyond pledges and accelerate implementation of existing ocean commitments. He called for increased climate finance for ocean adaptation, stronger investment mechanisms for developing countries, enhanced action against illegal, unreported and unregulated fishing, and wider adoption of innovative financing instruments such as blue bonds.

The conference also heard from founder of the Our Ocean Conference and former United States Secretary of State John Kerry, who challenged delegates to ensure the gathering delivers measurable outcomes.

"The ocean can no longer be an afterthought in our search for solutions to global challenges," Kerry said.

Community-led recycling project transforms waste management in Nyalenda neighbourhood

In the heart of Nyalenda informal settlement in Kisumu, a community-led initiative is transforming waste management while creating income opportunities for residents through an innovative buy-back centre that links waste collectors directly to recycling markets.

Operated by the Amazing Grace Action Community-Based Organisation (CBO), the buy-back centre has become a model of circular economy practices, turning discarded materials into valuable resources while contributing to cleaner neighbourhoods and environmental conservation.

At the centre, residents and waste pickers bring recyclable materials including plastic bottles, cartons, scrap metal, and hard plastics, which are sorted, weighed and purchased for cash. The collected materials are later sold to recycling companies and aggregators, creating a sustainable waste recovery system within the informal settlement.

"We run a community buy-back centre working directly with waste pickers and community members," said Operations Lead Renise Olwal. "When they bring recyclables, we sort them into categories such as PET plastic, hard plastic, cartons and metals. After weighing, we pay them cash immediately."

Different materials attract

varying prices depending on their value within the recycling chain. PET plastic fetches Sh7 per kilogramme, while hard plastics earn up to Sh30 per kilogramme. Metals command higher prices, with copper selling at up to Sh800 per kilogramme, brass at Sh450, aluminium at Sh250, and lighter metals ranging between Sh47 and Sh55 per kilogramme.



Cartons are purchased at between Sh7 and Sh10 per kilogramme depending on quality.

Beyond recycling, the centre provides waste collection services to approximately 150 households within Nyalenda at a subscription fee of Sh40 per week. The service ensures proper waste handling while guaranteeing a steady supply of recyclable materials to the centre.

On average, the facility processes about 100 kilogrammes of recyclable waste, with plastics accounting for the largest proportion. Organic waste collected from households constitutes about 20 percent of the total waste stream.

To manage biodegradable waste, the organisation has adopted Black Soldier Fly (BSF) technology. Through

this innovation, food waste is fed to larvae that break it down within 10 to 14 days. The larvae are later processed into protein-rich animal feed for poultry, fish and pigs, while the residue is converted into organic fertiliser for farming.

The technology has significantly reduced the amount of waste destined for dumpsites while generating useful products that support local agriculture and livestock production.

Despite its success, the initiative continues to face several operational challenges. Limited storage space remains a major concern due to the growing volume of recyclables received at the centre.

"Storage is a major challenge because we have a small buy-back centre," said Olwal, adding "We do not shred

recyclables, so they occupy a lot of space. Insecurity within the informal settlement is also a concern."

The organisation also relies heavily on handcart-based waste collection, which is labour-intensive and less efficient compared to motorised transport systems.

"We are using handcarts, which requires a lot of energy," she added. "We also struggle with personal protective equipment because it wears out quickly and is not always sufficient."

Currently, about 20 waste pickers work with the centre by supplying recyclables and assisting in household waste collection services. While they are not permanently employed, they earn income from the materials they collect and through shared proceeds from household subscription fees.

In addition to waste management, the organisation runs Youth Savings and Loan Associations (YSLAs) and Village Savings and Loan Associations (VSLAs) to promote financial literacy and encourage a savings culture among residents.

It also conducts Sexual and Reproductive Health and Rights programmes through its Teen Holiday Engagement Forum, which educates young people on menstrual hygiene, gender-based violence prevention and general health issues during school holidays.

The impact of the initiative is increasingly visible across the settlement.

Water service providers record improved performance

Kenya's water sector has recorded notable gains in service delivery, with increased water coverage, improved drinking water quality and stronger financial performance among Water Service Providers (WSPs).

This is according to the latest sector performance report by the Water Services Regulatory Board (WASREB).

The 18th edition of the Impact Report shows that regulated water utilities improved their performance across several key indicators during the 2024/25 financial year despite facing challenges such as rising non-revenue water and limited sewerage coverage.

The report analysed the performance of 94 Water Service Providers, comprising 91 public and three private utilities, across 47 counties.

It also incorporated data from small-scale water

service providers serving rural and underserved communities to provide a broader picture of water access in the country.

According to the report, water coverage through piped systems among regulated utilities increased from 70 per cent in the 2023/24 period to 72 per cent in 2024/25, resulting in an additional 1,261,271 people gaining access to water services.

The number of people served by regulated water utilities rose from 21.5 million to 22.8 million,

representing a six per cent growth, while active water connections increased marginally from 1.85 million to 1.87 million.

"Water production also recorded growth, rising by nine per cent from 461 million cubic metres to 504 million cubic metres, while sector turnover increased by 14 per cent from Sh28.8 billion to Sh32.8 billion," the report reads in part.

WASREB noted that the increase in the population served compared to the slower growth in active connections points

to increased reliance on shared and communal water connections, raising concerns around equitable access to services.

The report further highlighted significant improvement in drinking water quality, with the national average rising to 96 per cent from 89 per cent in the previous period. The improvement was recorded across all categories of utilities, indicating increased compliance with water quality standards.

"Utilities are required

to comprehensively plan on water quality monitoring and management through annual sampling programmes and development of water safety plans," the report noted.

Reliability of water supply also improved, with average hours of supply increasing from 17 hours per day to 18 hours per day. However, per capita water consumption remained below the recommended standard of 50 litres per person per day, despite a slight increase from 26.42 litres to 26.68 litres.



Kenya targets Sh1.1 trillion tourism earnings as arrivals surge

Kenya is staking its tourism future on a proposition that few countries have managed to achieve: growing visitor numbers and revenues while protecting the wildlife and ecosystems that attract tourists. Fresh from a record-breaking 2024, which saw the country welcome 2.4 million international visitors and

earn Sh452.2 billion from tourism, Kenya is now pursuing an ambitious target of 5.5 million arrivals and Sh1.1 trillion in tourism earnings by 2027.

But as wildlife habitats shrink, climate pressures intensify and communities living alongside conservation areas demand a greater share of the benefits, the question confronting policymakers is whether the country's celebrated

conservation model can withstand the pressures of rapid growth.

This was the setting when senior leaders of the World Travel and Tourism

Council (WTTC) toured some of Kenya's most symbolic conservation sites.

Led by WTTC President and Chief Executive Officer, Gloria Guevara, and Deputy President, Mr Najib Balala, the delegation visited Nairobi National Park, the Ivory Burning Site and the Sheldrick Wildlife Trust alongside officials from the Ministry of Tourism and Wildlife.

The visit underscored Kenya's standing as one of the world's most recognizable safari destinations, but it also highlighted the delicate balancing act facing a country seeking to turn conservation into an economic strategy.

"Kenya's conservation history is remarkable. The country has demonstrated to the world that conservation and tourism can thrive together," said Guevara.

Kenya shipyards showcase innovative fibreglass boats at historic ocean conference

As thousands of delegates converge in Mombasa for the 11th Ocean Conference, the first time the global event is being held in Africa, Kenya Shipyards Limited (KSL) is showcasing an innovative Glass-Reinforced Plastic (GRP) boat, a locally manufactured solution poised to enhance maritime safety and transform the fishing industry.

The GRP boats are constructed from composite material made of plastic reinforced with glass fibres. They are durable, corrosion-resistant, lightweight, fuel-efficient, and easy to mold into efficient designs, and require lower maintenance costs compared to traditional wooden boats.

The boats have a carrying capacity of up to three tonnes and can be insured. Owners can also obtain logbooks that may be used as collateral when seeking financing.

Initially introduced in the Lake Victoria region, the boats have been praised for improving productivity and enhancing safety due to their ability to withstand harsh weather conditions. KSL Business Development Manager, Edward Omol, said Lake Victoria has long been associated with accidents involving unsafe and unstable wooden vessels.

"Most of the people who go out fishing are breadwinners. A life that is lost affects an entire household. We end up with widows, orphans and many other people who depended on that person," said Omol.

"That is what drove us to come up with this solution so that we can have secure waters and a secure blue space,"

he added. The GRP boat represents a major shift from traditional wooden vessels that have dominated fishing communities for generations, from the Coast region to the lakeside.

Designed and manufactured by Kenyan marine engineers at KSL, the vessel incorporates advanced safety and performance features tailored to the conditions of Lake Victoria and other regional water bodies.

The boats feature an auto-recovery mechanism that helps them remain upright in rough waters, integrated buoyancy systems that make them virtually unsinkable, enhanced wave resistance and stability, and a range of lifesaving equipment, including life jackets and emergency flares.

Unlike wooden boats, which are susceptible to rot and frequent repairs, the GRP boats are built using fibreglass technology that offers exceptional durability and significantly lower

maintenance costs. KSL has built boats for various government agencies, including the Kenya Coast Guard Service, Kenya Navy, Kenya Ports Authority, Kenya Maritime Authority, National Police Service, Kenya Wildlife Service, Kenya Revenue Authority and Kenya Railways Corporation.

County governments that have procured the boats include Lamu, Kisumu, Siaya and Homa Bay. Buoyed by this success, KSL is now keen to market the vessels along the Coast and beyond Kenya's borders.

KSL is leveraging the Ocean Conference to showcase the innovation to fishing communities operating along the Indian Ocean coastline, where rough seas and unsafe vessels continue to threaten livelihoods.

Omol affirmed that the boats can help improve maritime safety, increase fish catches through more reliable operations, and strengthen economic opportunities for coastal communities.

"This boat is safer, lighter, more profitable, environmentally friendly and easy to operate. More importantly, it is helping us create safe waters for everyone who depends on them," he stated.

Marsabit residents urged to pick up thousands of processed national IDs

Marsabit County Registrar of Persons, Isaac Kibet, has urged residents who applied for national identification cards to collect their processed documents, revealing that more than 50,000 IDs have been processed in the county since January 2025.

He said the government is intensifying efforts to ensure that all eligible Kenyan citizens obtain national IDs and access essential services and rights. Kibet said that since January 2025, more than 50,000 national ID cards have been processed in Marsabit County.

He noted that his office continues to reach residents who do not yet have identification cards and is working to ensure all eligible citizens are registered.

According to Kibet, the National Registration bureau in Nairobi has been sending large batches of processed IDs to the county. Once received the

cards are distributed to the areas where applicants registered, including Moyale, Saku, Korr, North Horr, Loiyangalani, Laisamis and other parts of the county.

He called on all applicants who possess waiting cards to visit registration offices and collect their IDs. For those living far from registration centers, he said area chiefs have been assigned the responsibility of helping distribute the documents to their rightful owners.

“There are many IDs that have already been handed

over to area chiefs for distribution within their jurisdictions,” Kibet said.

“Residents should ensure they collect their cards as soon as possible.”

He revealed that more than 80 percent of the IDs registered in the county have already been delivered for distribution across all sub counties. While a few applications remain unprocessed due to discrepancies, he assured residents who have not yet applied for IDs to visit registration offices in their respective sub counties.

Kenya is turning the tide on climate change

Kenya has entered a transformative era of environmental governance. Moving beyond high level declarations,

The Ministry Of Environment Climate Change is prioritizing tangible, ground level implementation to align ecological health with the nation's long term economic growth targets. This shift was center stage at the recent 11th Our Ocean Conference in Mombasa, the first time the event has ever been held on African soil, where the government unveiled the Blue Carbon Ecosystems NDC Implementation and Investment Plan 2025 to 2035.

For decades, the mangroves that fringe the Kenyan coast have been the sentinels of the Indian Ocean. To the casual observer, they are a tangle of roots and brackish water. To the 800,000 artisanal fishers who cast their nets in these shadowed nurseries, they are the very definition of survival.

But this vital shield has been fraying. Over the last forty years, Kenya has lost 40 percent of its mangroves, and with them, the natural armor that protects more than 100,000 people from the intensifying storms and rising seas of a warming planet.

The plan is a sophisticated fusion of environmental science and fiscal strategy. Kenya has committed to a

bold climate target: reducing national emissions by 35 percent by 2035. By aiming to conserve all existing mangroves and restore 75 percent of those previously degraded, the nation is protecting vital nurseries for fisheries and shielding coastal communities from storm surges. If successful, Kenya's coastal zones will evolve from shrinking assets into a massive carbon sink, sequestering roughly 9 million tonnes of Carbon Dioxide equivalent annually by 2035.

To drive this transition, Kenya is pioneering a new financial model that treats conservation as a core economic investment. This includes the establishment of a regional finance hub and a push for innovative mechanisms, such as blue carbon credits and sustainable fisheries bonds. These efforts are designed to unlock Sh80 billion in investments, turning the country's natural assets into engines for sustainable development.

The most transformative element of the plan is its emphasis on social equity. Kenya's 2024 Carbon Markets Regulations mandate that at least 40 percent of all revenues from these projects must go directly to local, land based communities.

This ensures that the people who protect these forests, the ones who replant the seedlings and guard the shoreline, are the ones who benefit from the investment.

This green agenda extends well beyond the coast. Through the National Plastics Action Partnership, the ministry is fostering a circular economy that prioritizes domestic reprocessing and recycled content markets.

By integrating the government, private sector, and civil society, this initiative is creating new manufacturing value chains that offer sustainable opportunities for women, youth, and informal workers.

At the heart of the national vision is the 15 Billion Tree Growing Programme. In recent

consultations with the Permanent Representative of Kenya to the United Nations Environment Programme, Ambassador Dr. Ida Betty Odinga, the ministry outlined an inclusive strategy to accelerate this goal. This includes the strategic promotion of high value trees like coconut, cashew, and neem, which provide both environmental restoration and direct income for local farmers.

By partnering with the Ministry of Education to integrate tree growing into the curriculum, the government is ensuring that a culture of stewardship

is embedded in the next generation.

Kenya's commitment to accountability is equally robust. With the integration of digital tools like the Jaza Miti app and the development of a national registry for carbon markets, the ministry is ensuring transparency across all its climate initiatives.

These efforts are supported by strong bilateral partnerships, including recent engagements with the United Kingdom, Germany, and the World Bank, to advance water security and biodiversity targets.

As Kenya moves toward the future, these coordinated institutional actions are positioning the nation as a regional model. By blending science based policy with community led action, the Ministry of Environment, Climate Change and Forestry is demonstrating that environmental sustainability is the most effective path toward a resilient, prosperous, and inclusive future for all Kenyans. As the tide turns, Kenya is proving that with the right investment, nature can be the most effective technology for our survival.

Governor calls on institutions to adopt clean energy to fight deforestation

Makueni Governor Mutula Kilonzo Jr has called on principals and heads of institutions to adopt clean cooking energy in a bid to curb the wanton destruction of forests in the county.

Mutula noted that the amount of firewood consumed daily in schools, hospitals, and churches is alarming, underscoring the need to embrace renewable energy for cooking in order to conserve an environment already threatened by degradation.

The Governor made the remarks at Konza Technopolis during the Green Energy Promotion and Clean Cooking Advocacy Forum, which brought together secondary school principals, heads of institutions, financiers, and technology

service providers to chart the way forward on partnerships for the adoption of renewable energy for cooking and the phasing out of biomass fuels.

“The consumption of firewood in our schools and other institutions is alarming. The number of tonnes consumed daily is extremely high. Therefore, as an arid and semi-arid land (ASAL) area, it is our responsibility to protect the environment,” Mutula said while reading his speech at Konza Technopolis in Mukaa Sub-county.

“Therefore we brought together all institutions through their respective principals, so that they can appreciate our intention and plan. The idea is to bring onboard the service providers who have the requisite technology to offer and also the banks who will give funds,” he added.

Consequently, the governor said that once the targeted institutions embrace clean cooking mechanisms, they will ultimately reduce the cost they incur in using electricity and firewood, hence curb the wanton destruction facing forests in the county.

At the same time, Mutula observed that the use of firewood had also contributed to an increase of respiratory diseases and eye problems saying there was a need to curb the worrying trend in the county.

“We have done mathematics for them and determined the cost

they are spending on electricity and firewood. They can actually save nearly 40 percent by adopting clean energy cooking. So, it is a win-win situation especially where schools are having problems with capitation,” said Mutula.

“The statistics of upper respiratory diseases in Makueni County is extremely alarming and is most likely out of smoke in our kitchens at home and schools. So when looking at health matters, we need to conserve the environment to make it habitable,” reiterated the Governor.

In this regard, Mutula said

that any new public institutions being constructed in the county must have a plan on how they will harness the sun in order to use solar energy with a view to reducing dependence on firewood from the local forests.

He also said the county government had already embarked on a comprehensive clean cooking campaign through strategic partnerships and investments in renewable energy infrastructure, aimed at reducing dependence on firewood and charcoal.

“We are committed to ensuring that public institutions embrace sustainable energy solutions that protect our environment, improve public health and lower the cost of energy,” Mutula said.

The Governor revealed that already three County Technical Training Institutes (CTTIs) have adopted clean cooking energy, while adding that Matiliku Boys High School had also received equipment for use in cooking with a view to conserving the environment.

He added that the county’s clean energy agenda is guided by the Makueni County Energy Plan 2023-2032 and the Makueni Energy Policy 2025, both of which prioritize access to affordable, sustainable and reliable energy as a key driver of development.

Zetech innovators develop solutions against digital threats

As cybercrime continues to pose a growing threat to businesses and individuals worldwide, young innovators at Zetech University are developing homegrown solutions, aimed at strengthening digital security and protecting users from increasingly sophisticated cyberattacks.

Leading the innovations is the Kqimble Platform, a cybersecurity framework developed by Software Engineering student Isaac Muendo through the university’s innovation and incubation hub, iZET Hub.

The platform is among several student-led technologies focused on cloud security, web threat analytics and network defense solutions tailored for corporates, small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs), and emerging businesses.

The platform, an App, integrates cybersecurity features and network defense mechanisms into devices such as laptops and mobile phones, helping organizations detect and block cyber threats while safeguarding sensitive information.

It continuously monitors system to detect potential cyberattacks, identify security respond to threats efficiently. It also implements built-in security frameworks designed to safeguard sensitive data and ensure business continuity.

According to Muendo, the idea behind the innovation was inspired by a personal experience after witnessing his parents repeatedly lose money through

digital fraud.

“Seeing my parents lose money from their accounts made me realize how exposed many people are to cyber threats. I wanted to develop a solution that would not only protect my family but also assist entrepreneurs and organizations facing similar challenges,” he said.

Motivated by the need for accessible cybersecurity tools, Muendo developed a solution that can be integrated into different business environments without requiring organizations to employ dedicated ICT security personnel.

The resulting platform provides scalable and affordable protection against emerging cyber risks while reducing the complexity and cost associated with managing cybersecurity systems.

The innovation has since attracted recognition on global technology platforms for its focus on cloud security and web threat intelligence, placing Zetech University’s innovators

among a growing group of African technology developers creating solutions with international relevance.

Beyond Kqimble, students at the university are developing a range of enterprise software solutions designed to strengthen digital infrastructure, protect organizational data and improve cyber resilience across different sectors.

Zetech University Vice Chancellor Prof. Njenga Munene described the achievements as a significant milestone in the institution’s mission of advancing innovation, research and technology-driven solutions.

“This is a significant step towards making a meaningful contribution to the global innovation ecosystem. We are proud of our students and alumni who are developing solutions that address real-world challenges while creating opportunities for economic growth and employment,” said Prof. Munene.

The event is being jointly convened by the Kenya Vision 2030 Delivery Secretariat, the Capital Markets Authority, the Nairobi Securities Exchange, the Nairobi International Financial Centre, the Kenya Development Corporation and other strategic partners.

Speaking during a breakfast planning meeting at the Kenya School of Monetary Studies, Principal Secretary for Public Investments and Assets Management, Mr. Cyrell Wagunda, said Africa Capital Week presents a timely opportunity to redefine the continent’s investment narrative by positioning Africa as a destination of opportunity, innovation and sustainable growth.

PS Wagunda noted that global investors are increasingly prioritising markets that demon-

strate transparency, policy consistency, strong governance and responsible management of public resources.

He also cited the historic transfer of Amboseli National Park to the County Government of Kajiado as a landmark achievement in advancing the constitutional objectives of devolution.

JOOTRH unveils plan for 2,000-bed expansion

Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Teaching and Referral Hospital (JOOTRH) has unveiled an ambitious long-term expansion blueprint that will transform the Kisumu-based facility into a 2,000-bed regional referral and teaching hospital, significantly boosting specialized healthcare services in western Kenya.

The proposed upgrade, whose feasibility study and master plan were presented to the hospital's Executive Committee (EXCOM), will be implemented in phases and is designed to address growing demand for advanced healthcare, training and research services in the region.

The comprehensive study, complete with detailed architectural designs and cost estimates, was prepared by Arprim Consultants and presented by the

firm's Principal Architect Jared Momanyi.

According to the master plan, the first phase will involve the construction of a modern eight-storey hospital with a 500-bed capacity and a range of specialized medical facilities aimed at strengthening the hospital's referral and teaching mandate.

The facility will include medical and surgical wards, a 20-bed Intensive Care Unit (ICU), a 20-bed High Dependency Unit (HDU), a renal support centre, a 28-bed Accident and Emergency complex, 20 operating theatres, specialized outpatient clinics, a physical rehabilitation centre and a 15-station dental unit.

The development will also incorporate key diagnostic and support services, including radiology, laboratory services and physiotherapy departments,

alongside administrative offices.

To enhance operational efficiency and emergency response, the rooftop will accommodate solar energy infrastructure, water storage facilities and a helipad.

The second phase of the project will add a further 600-bed capacity hospital and supporting infrastructure, including a

Doctors' Plaza and expanded clinical support services.

Once all phases and associated developments are completed, JOOTRH is expected to attain a capacity of 2,000 beds, positioning it among the largest referral and teaching hospitals in the country.

The master plan also outlines broader infrastructural developments, aimed at supporting the hospital's future growth.

These include construction of staff housing under the Affordable Housing Programme, expansion of training and research facilities, relocation of selected support services, establishment of a modern logistics centre, enhanced parking facilities and improved traffic management systems within the hospital complex.

Hospital officials said the proposed developments are intended to strengthen healthcare delivery, while creating an integrated medical city capable of supporting specialized treatment, medical education and research.

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Kisumu hospital named national centre for advanced sickle cell care

The Government has designated the Jaramogi Oginga Odinga Teaching and Referral Hospital (JOOTRH) in Kisumu as Kenya's first public centre for advanced sickle cell treatment, marking a major milestone in the implementation of Universal Health Coverage (UHC) reforms.

Medical Services Principal Secretary Dr. Ouma Oluga said the facility is now offering specialised red blood cell exchange therapy at its Victoria Annex Hospital, a procedure that significantly reduces painful crises, strokes and other life-threatening complications associated with sickle cell disease.

Speaking during a visit to the hospital alongside county chief officers for health, Dr. Oluga said the investment demonstrates how recent health reforms are beginning to translate into specialised services for patients.

"We are here to show how all the reforms in health financing, primary healthcare, facility improvement financing and digitization are interconnected and working together to improve patient care," he said.

The visit comes ahead of World Sickle Cell Day on June 19 and World Blood Donor Day commemorations, both of which the Ministry of Health is using to intensify awareness on blood disorders and blood donation.

According to the PS, sickle cell disease remains a major public health burden, particularly in Nyanza, Western and Coastal regions, where nearly two per cent of the population is affected.

He said Kenya currently records relatively low life expectancy among sickle cell patients, with

many surviving only into their forties, prompting the government to invest in interventions, aimed at improving both survival and quality of life.

"So far we only have patients who live longest up to around 47 years. We want to increase both the lifespan and the experiences of these patients," he said.

Dr. Oluga revealed that the government is working with King's College London to transform the Kisumu facility into a regional Centre of Excellence

for sickle cell management, with specialists expected in the country next week to support training, equipment expansion and blood supply systems.

He urged counties to refer patients requiring specialised care to the facility, saying the service would help reduce complications that often leave patients disabled and dependent on lifelong care.

The red cell exchange procedure removes abnormal sickle-shaped red blood cells and replaces them with healthy donor cells, reduc-

ing the risk of stroke and severe pain episodes.

Dr. Brenda Misore, lead paediatrician at Victoria Annex Hospital, which hosts the sickle cell comprehensive care centre, said

demand for the service has grown steadily since its introduction.

She said the procedure has transformed the lives of children living with the genetic disorder by reducing hospital visits, improving school attendance and preventing debilitating complications.

"These patients are always in pain. They get strokes and other severe complications. With this service, children are able to come in once every three months, go to school and live a better quality of life," said Dr. Misore.

She warned that stroke remains one of the most devastating complications among children with sickle cell disease in the region, often leading to permanent disability and placing a heavy burden on families.

The paediatrician called for increased newborn screening, public awareness and genetic testing to help families make informed reproductive choices.

She also appealed for increased blood donation, saying the success of the programme depends heavily on a reliable blood supply.

"We need a strong blood donor registry because blood is the backbone of these services. Giving blood saves lives," she said.

For 33-year-old Michelle Omulo, one of the beneficiaries of the programme, the treatment has been life-changing.

Omulo, who has lived with sickle cell disease for three decades and suffered two mild strokes that left her with weakness on her right side, became the first patient at the facility to undergo the red cell exchange procedure.

KNH doctors remove massive 4-kg liver tumor in milestone surgery

Doctors at Kenyatta National Hospital (KNH) have successfully removed a massive four-kilogram liver tumor during a complex seven-hour surgery, giving the patient a new lease of life. This life-changing procedure, a right hepatectomy, was the standout achievement of the Hepato-Pancreato-Biliary (HPB) Surgical Camp held at KNH.

It symbolizes hope restored and a second chance for a patient who once faced an uncertain future.

The surgery was undertaken through a collaboration between Kenyatta National Hospital, the Europe-Africa Hepato-Pancreato-Biliary Association, the University of Nairobi, Aga Khan University and visiting specialists from the University of Science and

Technology Hospital in Egypt.

The multidisciplinary surgical team was led by HPB specialists Prof Soriman alongside KNH and UON surgeons Dr K. Ondede - Director Surgical Services, Dr Muia, Dr Kaisha and Dr Nthambi as well as other local invited HPB Surgeons Dr Karan and Dr Misoi.

The anesthesia team Dr Simiyu, Dr Kasuku, Dr Muchiri, Dr Omundi, Mr Kwame and residents Dr Atieno and Dr Monda provided expert support, while the theatre nursing team, led by B. Khandega, C. Tuwei, M. Wambui, S. Njeru, D. Kemuma, P. Nyaga, J. Kinyanjui, and Moraa, ensured seamless care. Technical support came from C. Muthengi and W. Owelle. The three-day camp also delivered 13 highly specialized HPB procedures, including four liver resections,

one Whipple's procedure, two hepaticojejunostomies and six laparoscopic cholecystectomies.

Led by Dr. Gibson Musila, Head of the Department of General Surgery at KNH, the camp went beyond patient care it served as a platform for mentorship and

skills transfer, strengthening local expertise in complex liver, pancreatic and biliary surgeries.

Removing a tumor of this size demands extraordinary surgical precision, meticulous planning, and seamless teamwork.

Mwache Dam to begin water impoundment in October as construction nears completion

The Government has intensified efforts to complete the multi-billion-shilling Mwache Dam Project in Kwale County, with authorities projecting that the facility will begin impounding water by October this year to ease persistent water shortages in Mombasa and neighbouring areas. Speaking during a monthly progress monitoring visit to the project site, Principal Secretary

in the State Department for Water and Sanitation, Julius Korir, said construction works had gathered momentum and were progressing according to the revised timelines following the alignment of financial resources.

Korir said the contractor was operating on a 24-hour schedule to ensure the critical infrastructure project meets its targets ahead of the short rains expected later in the year.

“The construction of this critical facility is moving at an excep-

tional pace, with the contractor working round the clock. Our engineering teams have mapped the critical path over the next six months, putting us on course to begin impounding and storing water as early as October and November,” said Korir.

He noted that the government was finalizing a supplementary budget allocation to sustain the project’s momentum and avert potential cost escalations associated with delays.

Secretary, timely completion of the project remains crucial in ensuring prudent utilization of public funds and development partner support.

Water Secretary and Project Manager Eng. Samwel Alima said the main dam structure had reached approximately 83 per cent completion, with the embankment rising from an initial elevation of 30 metres to 87 metres above ground level.

“We are only left with about 13 metres to attain the final dam height. Once we complete the remaining works and the spillway section, we shall be ready to impound water during the upcoming short rains,” he said.

Alima explained that the Mwache Dam forms part of a broader strategy aimed at addressing chronic water shortages affecting Mombasa County by capturing and storing runoff from seasonal heavy rainfall events.

“The rainfall pattern in this region is characterised by intense rains occurring over short periods, followed by prolonged dry spells. This dam will enable us to harness and store the water, allowing for regulated supply throughout the year,” he added.

Beyond the dam structure, the Ministry is implementing a multi-phase water distribution programme to ensure the harvested water reaches consumers across the coastal region.

The second phase entails construction of a water treatment plant located approximately half a kilometre downstream from the dam site. Alima said the contract had already been signed, with the contractor expected to commence work within weeks.

“The water treatment component will abstract 186,000 cubic metres per day from the dam.

MTRH performs procedure to treat severe liver disease

The Moi Teaching and Referral Hospital (MTRH) has successfully performed Kenya’s first Transjugular Intrahepatic Portosystemic Shunt (TIPS) procedure, marking a major milestone in the advancement of specialized healthcare services in the country.

The minimally invasive procedure was performed by MTRH Interventional Radiologists on a patient with advanced liver disease and life-threatening complications arising from portal hypertension, a condition characterized by increased blood pressure in the vein that carries blood from the digestive organs to the liver.

TIPS is a highly specialized interventional radiology procedure that creates a new pathway for blood flow through the liver,

reducing pressure in the portal vein and preventing serious complications such as recurrent internal bleeding and fluid accumulation associated with liver cirrhosis.

The achievement was made possible through the recent establishment of an advanced angiographic suite at MTRH, coupled with years of specialist training, mentorship, and collaboration under the AMPATH Radiology Partnership.

The angiographic suite enables specialists to perform complex image-guided procedures using minimally invasive techniques, reducing the need for conventional surgery and improving patient outcomes.

Dr. Cornelius Kipchirchir, Consultant Interventional Radiologist at MTRH praised the milestone, noting it offers hope to patients who previously

had limited treatment options and highlights the potential to expand access to advanced interventional radiology services in the region.

“Successfully performing Kenya’s first TIPS procedure is a significant achievement and demonstrates that highly specialized interventions can be safely and effectively delivered locally,” he said.

Dr. Daniel Chepsiror, Consultant Interventional Radiologist at MTRH, described the procedure as a landmark achievement for the specialty.

“The availability of our angiographic suite has opened new possibilities for advanced patient care. Performing the TIPS procedure allowed us to apply specialized skills acquired over many years and represents the beginning of a broader range of high-end interventional radiology procedures that will benefit patients across the region,” he noted.

MTRH Chief Executive Officer Dr. Philip Kirwa lauded the

achievement as a demonstration of the Hospital’s commitment to innovation, specialized healthcare, and strategic partnerships.

He indicated the breakthrough reflects the transformative impact of strategic partnerships, investment in advanced medical technology, and sustained capacity building of their specialists.

“The successful performance of Kenya’s first TIPS procedure at MTRH demonstrates that highly specialized, life-saving interventions can now be delivered locally, reducing the need for patients to seek treatment abroad while improving access to quality healthcare within Kenya and the region,” alluded the CEO.

He underscored that, as they continue to strengthen interventional radiology services, they are positioning MTRH as a regional centre of excellence for minimally invasive procedures that offer better clinical outcomes, shorter hospital stays, faster recovery, and improved quality of life for patients.

KALRO trains experts from six countries to boost rice production

The Kenya Agricultural and Livestock Research Organization (KALRO) Mwea, in partnership with the Korea Program on International Agriculture (KOPIA) Kenya Centre, has trained researchers, seed growers, and extension officers from six African countries on quality rice seed production and processing as part of efforts to enhance food security and boost rice productivity in the region.

The training brought together participants from Kenya, Tanzania, Ethiopia, Malawi, Rwanda, and Zimbabwe and focused on technologies, innovations, management practices, and regulatory requirements necessary for certified rice seed production.

Speaking during the training, Kirinyaga County Executive Committee Member for Agriculture Dr. John Gachara underscored the importance of international collaborations in fostering agricultural innovation and knowledge exchange.

The participants were also taken through practical sessions at the certified rice seed processing facility at Kirogo Farm in Mwea, where they gained hands-on experience in seed processing and quality assurance procedures. KALRO Deputy Director General for Crops, Dr. Alice

Murage, commended KOPIA and other development partners for supporting capacity building initiatives, aimed at strengthening rice production systems across Africa.

She urged participants to utilize the knowledge acquired during the training to improve rice seed systems, increase productivity and contribute to regional food security.

Dr. Ruth Musila, Centre Director at KALRO Mwea, emphasized the critical role of quality seed in transforming rice production and reducing reliance on imports.

"We can double our rice production, while reducing imports through the adoption of improved varieties and

quality seed systems," Dr. Musila said.

The Director noted that Kenya has diverse rice-growing ecologies including upland, irrigated and rain-fed lowland systems.

She explained that while 80 per cent of the country's rice is currently produced under irrigation, KALRO is also developing varieties suited

for upland and rain-fed conditions. Among the improved varieties being promoted are Komboka, Mkombozi and the recently released Tongil varieties, which were developed through collaboration between Kenyan and South Korean breeders.

"The Tongil varieties can yield between six and seven tonnes per hectare and are resistant to major rice diseases, making them suitable for increasing production and farmer incomes," she added.

KOPIA Kenya Centre Director Dr. Ji Gang identified poor post-harvest handling as one of the biggest challenges facing rice farmers, particularly the practice of drying rice on roadsides.

Government to bring immigration services closer to citizens through Huduma Centres

Thousands of Kenyans seeking passports, eCitizen support, and other immigration services may soon access them closer to home as the Government intensifies efforts to decentralize key services through Huduma Centres across the country.

This initiative gained momentum following a high-level consultative meeting between the Director General of Immigration Services, Evelyn Chelugut and the Principal Secretary for Public Service and Human Capital Development, Dr. Jane

Kere Imbunya. The meeting focused on strengthening collaboration to expand access to immigration services nationwide.

The officials reviewed progress and follow-up actions from earlier discussions on the partial integration of services offered by Ministries, Departments, and Agencies (MDAs) at Huduma Centres.

Their goal is to create a more efficient, citizen-centered service delivery model. They explored operational frameworks to enhance the availability of critical immigration services including passport applications, eCitizen assistance, and consular

support through the Huduma network. This effort aligns with the Government's broader agenda of bringing services closer to citizens by reducing bureaucratic barriers, cutting travel costs, and improving efficiency in public service delivery. Huduma Centres were established as one-stop service hubs, enabling Kenyans to access multiple government services without the need to travel to different offices.

The expansion of immigration services at the county level has been a longstanding public demand due to congestion at central immigration offices in Nairobi.

Major boost for sports as Mandera stadium project takes off

The long-awaited construction of Mandera's modern 10,000-seater stadium is set to commence after the County Government officially handed over the project site to the Ministry of Defence, paving the way for the implementation of one of the region's largest sports infrastructure projects.

The project, pledged by President William Ruto during his NYOTA Programme visit to Mandera, is expected to transform the county's sporting landscape by providing a modern facility for athletes, young people, and the wider community.

The official handover ceremony was led by County Secretary, Billow Issack and County Executive Committee Member (CECM) for Social Development, Mohamed Omar, alongside officials from the Kenya Defence Forces (KDF) and the appointed contractor. Construction is expected to begin once the contractor completes mobilization.

Once completed, the facility will feature a 10,000-seater stadium, a VIP pavilion, modern changing rooms, a standard football pitch, athletics running track, car-paved parking areas, a borehole, and a canopy covering the stadium.

Speaking during the handover, County Secretary Billow Issack described the project as a major milestone for Mandera's development agenda, noting that the facility will create opportunities for young people while promoting sports and talent development.

"This is a transformative project for the people of Mandera. The county government remains committed to working closely with the national government, KDF, and the contractor to ensure the successful delivery of the stadium within the expected timelines," said Issack.

He noted that the stadium will provide a platform for nurturing local talent, hosting sporting events, and inspiring young people to pursue careers in sports.

Charity donates 300 wheelchairs to PWDs

Home Mobility Kenya has partnered with the County Government of Kitui to help bridge the mobility gap facing persons with disabilities (PWDs) across the region.

As part of efforts to improve mobility among persons with disabilities, Home Mobility Kenya has donated 300 wheelchairs, along with other assistive mobility devices.

The much-needed initiative launch was presided over by Kitui County CECM for National Gender Equality, Disability and Social Services Phoebe Mutemi alongside Michael Panther, Founder of Hope Mobility Kenya.

The event also marked the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding between the County Government of Kitui and Hope Mobility Kenya to improve inclusion and mobility for PWDs. Sharing his personal journey, Michael Panther said he became

disabled at age 10 due to illness during the South Sudan war. After a 2-year search for treatment, he reached Kijabe Hospital. The struggle took him to Machakos School for Disability Care, then to Nairobi and the US.

"The struggle gave me a passion to start Hope Mobility Kenya which endeavours to breathe hope to the disabled, because it's through hope that I got," he said.

Jack Muthui, Director of Hope Mobility Kenya, said the MoU will run for three years and will help provide services to People with Disabilities in Kitui County.

Devices provided under the launch included wheelchairs, crutches, sunscreens for albinos, walking frames and walking sticks to those in need to walk.

He added that Hope Mobility Kenya will also conduct artisan trainings to maintain the wheelchairs for better, long-term service.
